rt of the Enrollment in Grade and IX shows how this increase VII, VIII, and IX shows how this increase has affected those grades. The growth of these grades from 1910 to 1292 as may be seen on the chart, has been more regular then the growth in Total Enrollment. This is probably because the enrollment in the higher grades is less affected by the increased enrollment in the private schools. From the total in-crease of three hundred, as shown on the first chart, from 1921 to 1929 one-hundred sity-six or over fifty persent is in grades VII, VIII, and IX. 



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

Due to certain factors mentioned above enrollment already exceeds the capacity of present accommodations. Present organiza-tion and program of studies demands more and better equipped class rooms than are now available. Present conditions and tendencies indicate that there will be no relief from the present situation until the town has a new school building. A second book by Dr. Van Waters, "Youth in Conitic" was taken up by Mrs. H. Gilbert Francke. The statement that seventy-five per cent of the prisoners in Sing Sing were under twenty-one years of age shows crime to be a problem of youth and hence of maladjust-ment and Dr. Van Waterscalls upon adults to consider their share in the causation of de-linquency. Psychology, psychiatry and medi-cal opinion now place the burden where it fundamentally belongs—upon the home, upon the parents. Jealousy, hypocrisy, an-tagonism between parents may cause in their children mental retardation, physical disease, or delinquency. The Juvenile Court is a court of chancery where the state assumes duties which parents are unable or unvilling to fu-fill and deals with the delinquent as nearly as possible in the spirit of a wise parent toward an erring child. Procedure is simple, and the delinquent comes before the court on a peti-tion filed in his behalf, instead of a complaint filed against him. Many voung people fail because thei

Ion hied in his behalt, instead of a complain led against him. Many young people fail because thei arents have lost faith in themselves. In the rue "democratic" family, the family where iological requirements of each member ar nderstood, there is neither delinquency no onflict. There is balance, an interaction o orces, a "peace between equals."
