Massachusetts Holding Its Own in Keeping Down Fatalities

For every person that was killed by automobiles in this state last year Massachusetts motorists drove safely 7,695,504 miles, the equivalent of a third the distance around the world. This picture of the actual highway performance of motor vehicles in Massachusetts in made available for the first time as the result of returns from the gasoline tax compiled and analyzed by the registry of motor vehicles and the governor's committee on street and highway safety.

Heretofore there have been local figures showing the ratio of automobile data to indicate just how far those vehicles have been driven. In the new computations of gasoline consumption and mileage Massachusetts is seen as maintaining the same comparatively good record that was revealed in the statistics previously assembled.

Local Motor Fleet Has Clean Record for Six Months

Driving for a period of six months in succession without a single accident of any kind is the record made by 66 per cent of the cars in the state-wide safety contest for commercial vehicles, according to announcement of the final winners by the governor's committee on street and highway safety. In the fifteen groups for different types of fleets, eleven "dark horses" forged to the front to capture final honors, while among the victors were only four concerns that had headed their groups for any one of the monthly prizes.

Boston had the biggest representation among the group winners with a total of three, while Lynn came next with two. Western Massachusetts made a strong showing with winners from Springfield, Ludlow and Pittsfield. Cape Cod was in the picture

Cape Cod was in the pictur with winners in Yarmouthport and Hyannis The other cities on the honor roll were Fal River, Woburn, Malden, Lowell, Fitchburg The best performance in the contest wa turned in by the taxicab group and individually by the Pittsfield Yellow Cab Co. Thi concern operated its fleet of fourteen cars of a total of \$5,923 hours—the largest of a contestants without a single accident durin the entire six-month period. The taxica group as a whole had an accident frequencrate of only 3.42 per 100,000 hours of operation.

The accident frequency rate of all the competing fleets was 23.59. This was almost identical with that for the final month of the contest and well below that of 32.55 in the opening month. No comparison is available with other states because this was the first state-wide contest of its kind in the country, but the frequency rate in a similar contest held in New York City was 67.70.

A total of 453 fleets, compreted throughout the six months of the contest. These cars experienced only 4,458 accidents during 18,812,944 hours of operation. Of these accidents only 472 involved personal injury, a ratio of one in eight.

The number of individual cars which operated for the entire contest without an accident was 8919, or 66 per cent. The number of fleets which as units operated with a spotless record was 98 or 21.6 per cent of the entrants. In contrast to the low frequency rate of 3.42 experienced by taxicabs was the high rate of 40.35 for busses. The next worst group was the heavy trucking division with a frequency rate of 3.68.0 rhe municipal group with a figure of 11.42 ranked next best to the taxicabs. The rates for the other groups were as follows: Bakeries, 24.13; buildings supplies and contractors, 16.70; cleaners and dyers, 34.07; coal and ice, 17.89; dairy products and ice cream, 21.43; laundries, 20.34; wholessile merchandise, 26.39; retail merchandise, 30.09; oil and gasoline, 18.47; public utilities, 18.65; transfer, cardage and storage, 28.64.

Ranking next to the Pittsfield Yellow Cab company for individual honors was the Lowell Gas. Light company, which operated the largest fleet for the second largest number of hours. This fleet of 30 cars operated for a total of 35,184 hours without a single accident for the entire six-month period. The communities which produced final winners but had never before appeared on the list of monthly winners were Woburn, Yarmouthport, Ludlow, Hyannis and Lowell.

Trophies are to be awarded shortly to the winner in each group. Although only one was picked in each group there were many other fleets which went through the entire period without an accident, the latter to be awarded specially engraved certificates of commendation. The awards were made on the basis of the fleet that operated the greatest number of hours with the most perfect record, so that among those with clean slates, greater number of hours of operation decided the victor. Stickers were awarded to the group leaders each month. A second six-month contest is already in progress. In addition to the group were were

In addition to the group winners there were 84 fleets in 53 communities which went through the entire six-month period without an accident. Fitchburg took first honors in this respect with six firms having clean slates. Included in the list is the fleet owned by Robert Dobbie of Andover.

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

Andover Partially Completes Tree
Preservation Program

Preliminary cavity treatment of the valuable shade trees in the town of Andover has recently been completed by a group of dendricians from the Salem office of the F. A. Bartlett Tree Expert company under the general supervision of Tree Warden, Ralph Berry.

Early this past spring, the Tree Warden decided that the beautiful trees which line the streets of the town should be examined with a view to correcting the disease conditions which were rapidly developing in open cavities in the trunks and branches. With J. P. Cassidy, Salem manager of the Bartlett company, he visited the Bartlett Tree Research Laboratories in Stamford, Connoperating under the direction of Dr. E. P. Felt, former entomologist for the state of New York. In Stamford Mr. Berry witnessed the experiments being conducted in a 200 acre experimental forest of many varieties of trees. Cavities were filled with different materials such as concrete to be tested with Nuwud, the cavity material used exclusively by the Bartlett organization. 

There is a whole language of odors used bees. For example, Dr. McIndoo noted that sometimes the bees kept their scent organs from being exposed while visiting flowers. And again they would leave this smell-mark on the flower, so that after their dance other bees would not only find that they had been there, but would note that this flower and its nectar or pollen belonged to that particular hive, since the bee's individual odor and that of the hive were both found. Experiments showed that bees did not poach on flowers first visited by other bees.

Dr. McIndoo's studies proved that not only bees but ants talk to each other through odors. Some ants have a smoky odor, others a pungent and ether odor, and still others smell like lemon, geranium or oil of citronella and so on.

QUAKES DUE TO SHAKE MIDWEST

Scientists Declare That the Floods Are Unbalancing Earth's Crust.

Washington.—An earthquake of per-Washington.—An earthquake of perhaps calamitous proportions may be expected at any time in the Mississippi valley, according to documents and testimony of leading scientists just made available through publication in the Congressional Record.

Constant erosion of the soil by annual floods is unbalancing the earth's crust and violent upheavals extending all the way from the mouth of the Missouri to the delta jutting out into the Guif of Mexico are due, the scientists say.

Among the prominent authorities quoted are Dr. George Otis Smith, director of the United States geological survey; Myron L. Fuller, an associate of Doctor Smith, F. W. Sohon, S. J., of the Georgetown university seismontains and seventers. L. Vallet, associated associated

of the Georgetown university seismo-logical observatory; J. A. Joliat, asso-ciate professor of the department of geophysics of St. Louis university, and

logical observatory; J. A. Johnt, associate professor of the department of geophysics of St. Louis university, and Prof. William H. Hobbs of the University of Michigan.

Much Earth Shifting.

Their views were placed in the Record by Representatives Garber and Stone of Oklahoma, in support of the reservoir system of Mississippi river flood control against the present levee system. Mr. Stone explained that the volume of earth now being carried down the Mississippi river and deposited in the Gulf of Mexico amounts to about 400,000,000 cubic yards each year, or a quantity equal to the total excavation for the Panama canal.

"You may consider this alarming," said Mr. Stone, "but if you study the question you will find the Mississippi valley is constantly threatened with a read danger, one that demands serious consideration. An earthquake is not only possible but very probable and may occur at any time."

It is a historical fact that the most severe earthquake ever recorded in the United States occurred in 1811 with its center near the mouth of the Ohlo river. Scientists speak of it as the New Madrid earthquake, It was even more severe than the destructive shock at Charleston, S. C., in 1886. That the loss in life was small was due only to the fact that the country at that time was very sparsely settled. "Today millions reside in this district and would be directly affected should a similar disturbance visit the Mississippi valley." says the geological

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To Get Rid of Ants

House-inhabiting ants, such as the little red or Pharoah's ant, and other species that get into furniture, woodwork, etc., are difficult to eradicate because of their inaccessibility. If the nest can be located, destroy the inmates by injecting into the opening a little carbon disulphide, kerozene, or gasoline. Use an oil can or syringe. Take care, of course, to keep fire away from these inflammable materials. Dusting sodium fluoride about the runways of ants will kill them. Leave no food where ants can get at it.

In 1927 two men were drowned within the shadow of a prison wall because a guard refused to permit convicts to go to their rescue. When a like fatality was threatened at the same place last week, four prisoners were freed to form an emergency life-saving corps, and returned to the institution after accomplishing what they set out to do.
