A wind blowing 39 to 54 miles an hour is known by the Weather Bureau as a gale. When a gale does not exceed 46 miles an hour it breaks twigs off trees and generally impedes progress, but when stronger it causes slight structural damage, blowing off chimney pots and slate shingles.

The wind seldom blows 55 to 75 miles an hour inland, but such a velocity is known as a "whole gale." When blowing at a velocity of 55 to 65 miles an hour, a "whole gale" uproots trees and causes considerable structural damage, and a 64 to 75 mile "whole gale," very rarely experienced, causes widespread damage.

A hurricane, blowing faster than 75 miles an hour, makes itself known with a fury understandable only by those who have lived through such an experience.

Every citizen in Massachusetts, motorist or pedestrian, pays heavily for the presence of automobiles on the highways. If he is so unfortunate as to be an accident victim, the cost is immediate, direct and terrific, If he escapes misfortune, he, nevertheless, pays indirectly for this protection. For all this safety work, the cost of which he is helping to defray, what does he as an individual get in return?

The governor's committee on street and highway safety has answered this question by describing a typical day of the average motorist. 1930 Aulomobile Death Total Will Probably Exced 1929

Four Massachusetts cities continued to pile up more time on their remarkable record by surviving August without an automobile death and bringing their total to nine months in succession. These comminities are Chicopee, Pitchburg, Newburyport and Woburn.
They contributed a large share to bringing Massachusetts highest honors among the cities of the country, according to reports for August compiled by the national safety councils and transmitted to the governor's committee on street and highway safety. This state has 12 cities on the honor roll of 38 throughout the country, an appreciable gain both locally and nationally in communities without motor fatalities.

New Bedford was the only city of more than 100,000 population in this state to win a place on the honor roll. The other Massachusetts cities, not already mentioned, which experienced no automobile fatalities in August were Chelsea, Everett, Holyoke, Lawrence, Medford, Pittsfield and Quincy. The New England cities outside of Massachusetts that were on the roll were Hartford and New Britain, Ct., Pawtucket R. I., and Portland, Me. The only other states to have more than two cities on the roll were Michigan with four and New York with three.

Increases and decreases among cities were mixed for August, Boston, Baltimore and Los Angeles showing considerable increase. Nationally there were nearly 3000 deaths, contrasted with slightly more than 2500 in July. The total, however, is still not quite so high as in August, 1929. Some of them were painted either over their eyes or over their antennae, which are believed to be the organs of smell. Thus groups of artificially blinded files and of files deprived of the sense of smell were turned loose and watched. Zachariah, according to information received by federal educational officials, served as a waiter and rang the school bell. Frenchman First to Get Idea of Sewing Machine?

France has celebrated the centenary
of the invention by one of her citizens

that it was M. Barthelemy Thimonnier, a native of Arbresle, in the
Rhone, who first conceived the idea
of making a machine do the work of
hand-driven needles, writes the Paris

Thimonnier was a tailor, but, once he began to work on his idea, he became so engrossed in it that he neglected his own business to the point of ruin, and many of his neighbors roundly declared that he was a madman. He persevered in his experiments, which were the more difficult because he had not even an elementary knowledge of mechanics, and in 1830 took out his first patent.

An inspector of mines who happened to be visiting the region at that time realized the great potentiality of Thimonnier's invention, and installed him in a workshop in Paris.

Helium Production
