



Famous English Radical

Famous English Radical Peter Porcupine was the nom de plume of William Cobbett when he was a Tory, says an article in Path-finder Magazine. "Porcupine Papers" are preserved in 12 volumes. Cobbett was born in 1762 and he died in 1885. He was one of the most brilliant and famous political and social agitators and pamphieteers of England. At one time he was compelled to leave his own country and he continued his agi-tation in America.

The late crop, maturing in the autumn, furnishes employment to the Sioux—men, women, and children. Each day they go into the fields, following the potato digging machines. The food normally lasts until about the middle of February. Then the true hiberna-tion begins. Indian agents have made inves-tigations obtained within the cabins. It is difficult to arouse the hibernating Indian but in the cases where it has been accom-plished extraordinary conditions have been found. Trouble Asked whether cancer can occur in young people Dr. Lulu Hunt Peters replied, "Yes, cancer can occur in young people, but it is rare. There is a tumor known as sarcoma which is often referred to as cancer, because it is also a malignant growth—that is, the cells may be carried by the blood and lymph stream to other parts of the body forming new tumors, and unless removed before this happens it may cause death. We use the word benign tumor when we mean one whose cells will not be transported. I remem-ber reading a health report from Japan which had been translated into English— and he referred to these benign tumors as good-natured tumors" But these "togod-natured" tumors may cause trouble if they are situated so they press on a vital organ, such as in the brain, or if they are near the surface of the mucous membrane and cause hemorrhages. Clinics are held at the Lawrence General Hospital on the first and third Tuesdays of each month.


