propriated in a special town meeting. Water extensions, sewer installations, and road construction are all mentioned as possible means of providing employment. It is said that the price of water pipe is lower this year than for some time, and so if funds were provided for water extensions, approximately 60 percent of the money would be for labor, as compared to 45.6 percent a year ago. Two big jobs have been suggested. One would add another line to the West parish system, which now consists of only one six inch line. The new line would go from Lowell street along Greenwood road and connect in at Chandler road near the Bourdelais property. This, it is said, would eliminate the danger of the water supply for that district being cut off by a leak in the present pipe. The other plan calls for the laying of pipe from the corner of Stinson road and Holt road along Holt road and connecting in at Orchard street, and along with this the six-inch pipe at both ends of Hidden road could be joined thus permitting the laying of a pipe from Hidden road along Sunset Rock road and connecting in at the Donovan property. The West Andover job would cost at the most \$25,000, and the other about \$16,000.

It has been said that there are probably fifty miles of roads in Andover which could be resurfaced with gravel.
