



Andover People's Bookstore Closes

The closing of Bartlett's second-hand bookstalls in Boston has brought many ex-pressions of regret. The Bartletts were Andover people with a reputation of being the best of book-hunters. The New York Herald Tribune of July 14 contained the following editorial comment of interest:

"A Bookstore Passes'

"A Bookstore Passes" "Just what Boston is going to be without Bartlett's in Cornhill is hard to say. For eventy-three years Bartlett's has been one of the most famous of the world's second-hand bookstalls and thousands of bibliophiles came to know and love its musty alcoves just around the corner from the bustle of Wash-ington Street and Faneuil Hall Market. It was the aristocrat of all second-hand book-shops and dominated the other hotels of the section. Like Magg's, in London, Bartlett's enjoyed the reputation of, sooner or later, being able to track down any book in the section. Like Magg's, in London, Bartlett's enjoyed the reputation of, sooner or later, being able to track down any book in the world, and for nearly three-quarters of a century the Bartlett's of Andover and their Boston business flourished as a green bay tree; but now the shop is closing. "It is almost as easy to imagine Boston without the subway or Thompson's Spa or the tulips in the springtime Public Garden, or any of the institutions so predominantly Bostonian, as without Bartlett's. It was one of the city's cultural centers, like the Athen-aeum, to which people pointed with pride and remarked that Just as Paris had her bookstalls along the Seine, so Boston had her Comhill and Bartlett's. Now they will have to buy their books from bright young clerks, ver counters, just as in any other city. Perhaps Mayor Curley should appoint a these changing times, lest the green Boston bag should be no more and the Fenway be-come just another park. The loss of Bartlett's is irreparable, and the passing of a few more places like it would be fatal to Boston's characteristic distinctiveness."






