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# The Chain Store Problem

Andover's grocery stores are again closed on Wednesday afternoons, thanks to an awakened public sentiment here in town which finally forced the chain stores to cease making their employees work extra hours. There is plenty of room for improvement in the conduct of the chain stores, and the Wednesday closing is a commendable step forward. Like so many large scale organizations, in which the management has very little contact with the store workers or the conduct of business. A comparison of Andover's inde-pendent stores and the local chain stores brings to light many details in which our merchants far surpass the out-of-town people.

people. Chain stores are here in Andover in order to get all they can from the town and not to serve the town. In one of the huge organizations there are 16,000 stores throughout the country, all run from a central office. If they keep these stores open an extra afternoon from one to six and only make one dollar an hour in each store, the firm makes \$80,-000 a week extra. From a strictly mercenary viewpoint, \$80,-000 is worth trying for. But take a local groceryman. Keeping open an extra half-day would give him only five dollars a week extra, and that to him is not worthwhile, since it in-volves keeping his men at work when they deserve time off for working late Saturday nights. The chain store manage-Volves Reeping his heri at work when usy deserve time of for working late Saturday nights. The chain store manage-ment, however, cares little for the hours that their men work; to a man sitting in an office in a big city a worker in a small town chain store is just an automaton whose only function in life is to secure money for the firm. His health does not matter; the fact that most firms do not employ their employees more than forty-eight hours a week does not matter; the only thing that counts is the dollar. 

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
