Teacher Not Named; Publicity Is Tabled

School Board Sub Committee Reports Progress on Principalship—Decides Against Allowing Opinions to Be Made Public

The school board's sub-committee on teachers reported last Tuesday evening that it was making progress on the matter of choosing a principal for the John Dove school. This problem has been hanging fire since September when Mrs. Kimball, the former principal, resigned because of poor health. The committee had previously voted to select someone from outside the present school system to serve in this capacity, but no action has been taken on it as yet. Tuesday night the committee voted to allow Superintendent of Schools Henry C. Sanborn expense money in order that he might go to see some of the twenty prospective candidates and interview them personally. During the course of the discussion it was pointed out that the committee members should vote to admit reports. Mr. Grover asked that the secretary be permitted to give out to the papers the opinions of the members on the various issues which arose, but after discussing it at two meetings, the board Tuesday night merely decided to place the matter on file, feeling that their stand had been made definite before.

A letter from Elmer J. Grover, the Townsman editor, sent to the secretary last November was again taken up. The letter was written after the committee had voted to bar reporters from the meetings in order to effect a temporary compromise as to publicity. The committee members should vote to admit reports. Mr. Grover asked that the secretary be permitted to give out to the papers the opinions of the members on the various issues which arose, but after discussing it at two meetings, the board Tuesday night merely decided to place the matter on file, feeling that their stand had been made definite before.

Annual Report Considered

The committee voted to adopt the superintendent's annual report as its report. There was some question as to combining the report with the annual town report in order to reduce printing costs, but Mr. Lord, superintendent of research and statistics in the department of education, felt that there were certain state requirements making a special report necessary. The superintendent was instructed to submit copies of the report to the two printing firms in town for bids, and to award the contract to the lowest bidder. There was also some discussion regarding the advisability of the committee's giving its own report of certain phases of work of interest to the public. It was decided not to do this this year because of lack of time.

A letter from Sidney White regarding milk bids was read and the chairman was instructed to reply. It was reported that there had been much sickness in the schools the last month, with 65 absent from the high school, 60 from Stowe, 85 from John Dove, and twelve teachers and the dental hygienist.

The board discussed the matter of legislative bills affecting education, among which was a bill proposing that all town employees reside in the town where employed, two delegating some of the school board's authority to the selectmen or the mayor, and two removing the penalty now laid on a town refusing to provide money for school purposes. It was left with Mr. Sanborn to supply some information to the committee on these bills.

Enjoyable Time at Choir Supper

A very enjoyable time was had Wednesday night at the annual Christ Church choir supper. The Women's Guild and the Girls' Friendly society were in charge of the repast. John D. Newell, 3rd, organist and choir-master presented book prizes to the boys for excellence in attendance. Other prizes were awarded to Dora McKee, William Anderson and Robert Ferrier. A special prize was awarded to George Nicoll for attendance and for showing the greatest improvement.

Addresses were made by Rev. C. W. Henry, Mr. Clayton Monroe, Mr. Irving Southworth and David H. Munro. A rising vote of thanks was given Miss Ethel Humphreys, choir-master, and her assistants, the Misses Isabel Greenhow and Ruth Saunders and to the ladies who provided the supper.
