The pleasure Andover experienced last Friday when it was announced that the long stay of the gypsies here had ended was tempered considerably when two days later the tribe was ordered out of Lawrence as soon as it moved there. This town had to tolerate the gypsies for months, but the moment they set foot in Lawrence, out they go, with no dilly-dallying about legal technicalities on the part of the mill ciy officials.

Many Andover citizens were displeased when the police and health departments here failed to take prompt action upon the gypsies' arrival in town. The officials turned to the statute books, however, and hiding behind the covers of these volumes, announced that they had no authority in law to evict the tribe. A small riot took place in the Essex street abode one Sunday, with the police force suffering certain indignities, but still there was no statutory sanction for an eviction. 
