Workers Stirred Up at Lay-off Tuesday

C W A Men, Fearing Long Lay-off, Circulate Petition Requesting Dr. Daly's Removal as C W A Head— Was Only One Day Lay-off, However

Was Only One Day

Andover almost had a small riot Tuesday morning when some 120 men on the CWA lists were laid off for the day. Excitement prevailed for some time, and finally the large group congregated in front of the Andover Savings Bank, where petitions asking the removal of Dr. Daly as CWA head were circulated. It was planned to send the petitions to Chairman Bartlett of the State Civil Works Administration.

The excitement was somewhat premature, however, for it was merely a one-day layoff and the men received their full thirty hours this week. They would have had to lay off Thursday anyway to keep within the thirty-hour limit, but they were of the opinion that it was to be a long drawn-out layoff.

Many of the men felt that the action was taken as a result of the town meeting the single theory of the men felt that the action was taken as a result of the town meeting the some \$4000 for materials for road, water and sewer construction provided the labor could be paid for from the CWA funds. The motion as worded did not require that more money be secured from the administration, and the talk which preceded it definitely established the fact that a transfer from the funds that the town already had was what was anticipated. The plan as expressed at the meeting was to secure approval from the state on these new projects and then transfer the labor from the projects already approved. However, the workers in general seemed to feel that the town would attempt to secure additional funds from the CWA rather than merely to request a transfer ms swa tontemplated, however.

"The veterans associations have rightfully, taken the stand that they ought not to be put into the position of asking the Town for a suitable memorial. It is rather the duty of the Town to make the offer.

"The Andover Council therefore deems it a great privilege to present, of its own initiative, a motion to this effect to the citizens of Andover.

Bond Issues

Several requests for bond issues were Several requests for bond issues were made at town meeting Monday night which probably would not have been made if the provisions of the very complicated Federal Public Works act had been fully understood. The act does not require that a loan be negotiated; any town has perfect freedom to raise its restriction roat of the money involved in particular part of the money involved in particular part of the money involved in any way it sees fit, subject only to the proviso that interest paid must not be higher than four percent. A town may raise it by a loan from the federal govern-ment, a loan from a bank, from funds on hand, or from a tax levy. The smaller sums asked Monday night should have been asked for out of the tax levy rather than from a bond issue and probably nan from a bond issue, and probably ould have if the act had been understood in its entirety.

The town should most certainly not be bonded for small projects such as minor water extensions and road repairs. If a

In Defense of Ourselves

In Defense of Ourselves


