Address Given Here by President's Son (Continued from page 1) which young men would spend some time in various lines of work in order to get the other fellow's viewpoint on life.

The country still has great problems ahead of it, he said. There are still 8 to 10 million idle, and it is up to the younger generation to help solve this problem and the allied problem offered by the half million who are now living on land so unproductive that they have been on the charity of their neighbors for fifty years.

In order to demonstrate the necessity for preparedness of self, he mentioned an incident at a prize fight he attended in Rome last year when a section of the stands caved in. A man stood up, glanced at the stands, saw no one was hurt, and raised his hands to the crowd, thus preventing a panic. That man was Mussolini, a great example of self-preparedness.

Youth should first learn in school, then try the laboratory method, and finally follow up its knowledge of the past and present with some constructive idea of its own, he said. Whatever we pick, we must do our best, he concluded.
