The Lowell junction articles mention no specific sum of money, but estimates prepared by the B. P. W. indicate that the minimum cost will be close to \$24,000. # Two Prize Drills at Slattery Banquet

While the furniture has been designed for use in a modern setting, the upholstered pieces could be used with the classical turniture forms of the early 19th century. The metal furniture, on the other hand, lends itself to the decorative scheme of the average house in the more informal rooms, the solarium, recreation room, the outside porch and terrace.

Until recently the so called "modern movement" has been essentially European, beginning with the Paris Exposition of 1925. Furniture designed and made abroad, imported for the most part to this country by interior decorators, has reached a comparatively small public.

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
