Five Cent Fares

The news that the Eeastern Massachusetts street railway company has at last really made a concession to the trolley car public of Andover is very interesting to those of us who quite justificably felt that public service companies ably felt that public service companies of riding to and from the square for five cents are to be congratulated. At the same time the residents of the Porter road section who have secured the privilege of riding to and from the square for five cents are to be congratulated. At the same time the residents of Shawsheen v llage who still have to pay ten cents to ride the mile to the center of the town must be given more consideration than the street railway has given them. The company may feel that by making one concession it is going far enough, but it must be admitted that both the Hill and the village have equally good cases against the dime fare, and if a reduction is made in one case it should be made in both.

It is just one mile from Shawsheen village to Andover, an nice walk as many of those who have been forced to boycott the street railway have found out. The trip is not worth a dime, and that it would have if it established a reasonable rate. Merchants everywhere are finding out that arbitrarily fixed high prices usually carry with them ascarcity of customers and it is about time that the street railway pare pairs that it to expect that it can charge any rate it wishes, with the seemingly select that fact. Merely because it has of necessity a monopoly business is no reason for it to expect that it can charge any rate twishes, with the seemingly always willing co-operation of the public utilities commission. Monopolies often find that they must compete with the public's ability to pay; maybe someday the street railway wall find that three Shawsheen to Andover customers at five entre each will net them more than one at ten cents.





men need of a stronger central government than the articles of confederation afforded, and were alarmed at the centralized tendency manifested by Hamilton and the Federalist party. To this moderate party was given the name of Republicans, about 1792. During the French revolution extreme sympathizers with the new French republic formed so-called "democratic clubs," the fundamental principles advocated by these clubs being equalitarianism and the extreme of liberty for the individual. Though not in complete accord with the Republicans, adherents of these views were forced to act in harmony with the Republicans in opposition to the Federalist measures, and were eventually absorbed by the party which came to be known as the Democratic-Republican, the later official designation of the Democratic party.—Indianapolis News.
