Mr. Cum-mings was over 96 years of age, and for over a year had possessed the Boston Post cane as the oldest man in Andover. Public services were held at the grave in Hebron, where he was buried. Rev. Wynn Fairfield of Newton-ville, Mass., an old family friend, officiated, and Granville F. Wheeler of Bristol was director. Bearers were relatives. Prof. Cummings' parents, Jotham and Mary (Cheney) Cummings, settled in Groton over 100 years age, and here Prof. Cummings was born July 5, 1838. He studied at Kimball Union academy, Meriden, and at the time of his death was the oldest living alumnus of Dartmouth college, from which college he was graduated in 1860.
