Influence of Minority Groups

"Organized minority groups" was an expression heard frequently in the addresses of the three speakers at the Andover Regional Dinner of the Massachusetts Federation of Taxpayers' associations at the Country Club Tuesday night. The speakers stressed the power that these groups have on the legislature, not so much because of their own influence as because the general public is too indignant to present its views to the legislators, with the result that our representatives are able to obtain only a very distorted view of public opinion.

In a smaller way every town faces the same problem, and that is why there should be a taxpayers' association in every town—in other words, a group organized to produce "efficient government at the lowest possible cost." Every year at town meeting there are numerous articles inserted for the benefit of little groups which are personally interested in the particular projects, go to town meeting organized to put their plan through. Too often the articles pass, just because there is no organized effort to defeat them and so benefit the whole town.

Even outside of town meeting local governmental officials feel the pressure of the small organized groups. A recent example of this took place a few weeks ago when the school committee met to discuss the closing of the North school, which at present is being operated for eleven pupils at a cost of around \$2,000.

whereas the total cost of transporting them to the West Center school would be about \$150. A maximum saving of about \$1850 could be realized by closing the school, and this would have helped the pocketbooks of every taxpayer in town. But a group of residents of the North district banded together, asked for a hearing, and were given it. They put forth all kinds of arguments for closing the school, but no argument could refute the fact that Andover is spending \$1850 more than is needed. The result was that several of the school board members, feeling that they had been elected to do what the people wanted and having been told of what only some of the people wanted, fought to keep the school open. A vote was passed whereby the school is being kept open temporarily, until the end of the present school year, and unless the people of Andover make known to the members of the school committee that they would prefer to save the \$1850, the chances are that next September a new teacher will have been appointed for that school, more fuel will have to be bought, electricity will have to be paid for, and money will have to be spent for cleaning the school.

Minority groups have a right to be heard, but very naturally, when their voices are the only ones heard, officials are prone to lean the wrong way. Majority groups have a right to be heard, too, but until such groups lose their indifference, the minority groups will hold control.

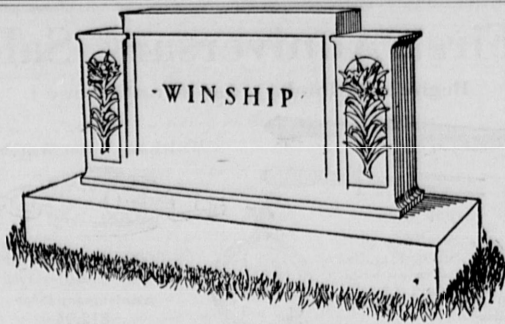
