Our Guest Editorial -

I suppose that even the most shiftles, shameless bamlet, even the dingiest Gopher Prairie or Swamp Gity, has its "boosters." who shout for it because it is theirs,—a poer thing, but their own. Those of us who love Andover, however, have countless reasons for our locations, our long list of distinguished men and women, our foremost position in the field of education. While we need not be noisy about it, we are justified in maintaining a decent dignity. Andover loyalty should keep us working for the good of the town as a whole. After all, the elements which compose this community are interdependent. Each contributes its share, and if one weakens or fails in its responsibility, the others eventually suffer. The formation of cliques or conspiracies aimed at the welfare of certain sections is much to be deplored, for we can profit most, not by fostering internal dissension, but by presenting a united front. Many situations have arisen, and will arise, necessitating the abandomment of partisan issues and petty prejudices in an effort to promote the common good. Town Expenditures Have Increased Twice As Rapidly as Valuation Since 1900

A 318 percent rise in valuation, a 590 percent rise in town expenditures, and a consequential 188 percent rise in the tax rate have taken place in Andover in the past 35 years, figures compiled recently reveal. In the same period there has been a rise of 222 percent in the number of poll tax payers.

The valuation in 1900 was \$5,070,000, and for last year it was \$16,192,000. Expenses in the meantime have risen much faster, jumping from \$81,572 in 1900 to \$479,462 in 1935. There were 1496 poll tax payers in 1900 and 3327 last year.

The years 1915-1925 showed the greatest increase in expenditures. 
