Alphabet From Greek

Letters Alpha and Beta

The word "alphabet" is derived from the Greek letters alpha and beta, corresponding to our a and b. The Greek alphabet is one of the oldest in the world and all modern European alphabets are derived from or founded on it. The English alphabet is practically the same as the Roman, which was derived from the Greek.

The earliest Greek alphabet containing only 19 letters, having no f and ending with the letter t. The letter t and the six letters following t, viz. u, v, w, x, y, z, came by a process of evolution at long intervals. There was no u in the Greek alphabet until the Ninth century B. C., and for more than 1,000 years after u and v were different forms of the same letter, one being used at the beginning and the other in the middle of a word.

It is not until the Tenth century A. D., states a writer in the Indianapolis News, that the two letters were differentiated into u as a vowel and v as a consonant. There was no separate letter w until the Eleventh century A. D. Prior to that the sound was expressed by uv or uv, but finally the two u's were linked together, making double u.

Some other letters got into the alphabet by a curious process of evolution. The letter z, for example, comes from the Latin through the Greek. This letter was introduced into the English alphabet in the Fifteenth century. It was the sixth letter in the Greek alphabet. It used to be pronounced zed or isard, and is sometimes so written and printed in England.

Egyptian Women Long Ago

Were Users of Cosmetics

The beautiful women of Egypt have been indulging in the use of cosmetics for at least 3,000 years. It may be that kohl and henna were in vogue for thousands of years before that, as well as the ointments, unguents and the coloring made from various herbs and vegetables, according to a writer in the Los Angeles Times. But we are certain that they were in vogue when King Tut was not a mummy. In the Valley of the Kings where the Egyptian ruler had slept for 30 centuries, undisturbed, in his gold sarcophagus guarded by a giant cat, were the little alabaster jars containing the cosmetics he might need in his deathly peregrinations. The faint and musty perfume of antiquity still clung to the delicate jars of alabaster.

The art of personal decoration has not always been peculiar to women and sissies. The men of those far-off days cultivated curls and beards, anointed themselves and were arrayed in true masculine splendor.

The Yucca Plant

Yuccas are strangely dependent for continuation upon artificial pollination. The pollen never becoming dusty as in the case of other flowers. It is a thick gummy mass scraped into small globules by a night-flying female moth. She flies with the pollen to another plant and thrusts it down the stigmatic tube of a flower, thus effecting cross-pollination. She then thrusts her ovipositor into the ovary at the base of the flower and therein deposits her eggs. These hatch into worms, or grubs, and feed upon the seeds that, except for her act, never would have been. Less than one-half of the seeds are eaten and some of the remainder continue the race of yuccas, though some are devoured by desert rodents. But perpetuation of the plants is entirely dependent upon the moth.

Mystery Springs in Queensland

Fifty miles southeast of Boulia township, in the far west of Queensland, are two mystery springs. One, known as Elizabeth spring, consists of a circular hole four or five feet in diameter in which tepid water is continually bubbling up and overflowing. The water, which is perfectly clear, is peculiar in that the human body cannot sink in it owing solely to the force of the water bubbling up from below. About 50 yards away is another called Lubra spring. Its water is always icy cold and is jet black. The human body sinks like a stone in it. According to the aborigines of the locality, the water in this spring turned black ages ago when a lubra (native woman) jumped into it and was never seen again.

Discovered South Africa

The early Portuguese navigators were the first to reach the vicinity of South Africa. In 1486 Bartholomew Diaz rounded the Cape of Good Hope, and 11 years later Vasco de Gama made the same voyage. The first vessels to anchor in Table Bay were those of the expedition headed by Cornelius Houtman, a Dutchman, in 1495. In 1648 a Dutch ship was wrecked in Table Bay and all on board safely reached land. They remained there five months until the next vessel arrived. This was the beginning of the idea of colonizing the country. The pioneer settlers in Cape Colony arrived in three Dutch ships on April 7, 1652.

Medieval Mongolia

In many respects Inner Mongolia is a "Land of the Middle Ages." Mongol horsemen lasso wild ponies with slip nooses on long poles, and a reception for the Dalai Lama attracts rainbow-hued, silk-robed princes across hundreds of miles of rolling plains. The Mongol chiefs prefer to live in felt yurts, or tents, as did their ancestors, and visitors of note are received not in permanent buildings, but in yurts which are entered through a wooden vestibule.

Seaweed for Food Purposes

The scientific cultivation of seaweed for food purposes is a project now under consideration by the Philippine government, the Manila office of the Commerce department reports. If such are found government legislation is anticipated to protect the industry.

The natives that rewash the seaweeds as food not only eat them fresh, it is said, but dry them in the sun for future use.

BANK LIFE INSURANCE ATTRACTING ATTENTION

"The Massachusetts system of Savings Bank Life Insurance, established by the Legislature, in 1907 under a plan proposed by the Hon. Louis D. Brandeis, now Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, is attracting increased attention throughout the Nation as well as in Massachusetts," said Deputy Commissioner Judd Dewey, of the Division of Savings Bank Life Insurance at the State House Wednesday. The current issue of The Consumer, issued by the Consumers Division of the United States Department of Labor compares the cost of ordinary insurance in a number of companies over a ten year period beginning in 1924 using the dividends actually paid by the savings bank insurance departments. The current issue shows an average net cost of \$5.25 for a policy of \$1000 of straight life, in nine large companies as compared with an average cost of \$2.29 in the savings banks, adding that a comparison of Savings Bank Insurance and industrial (weekly premium) insurance as sold by the companies would show costs even more favorable to the banks. The savings in cost in the savings banks as compared with the companies, The Consumer says, "have been achieved by very much lower operating expenses; also by a more favorable mortality ratio, and by higher returns on invested assets." The editor points out that during the 22-year period 1909 to 1931 "ordinary insurance salaries and commissions took five times as high a share of total income" as did salaries in the insurance departments of the savings banks and that "industrial insurance salaries and commissions (took) 9 times as large a share as salaries took from savings bank insurance income." The article further points out that policies in the Massachusetts savings banks contain more liberal terms than the policies of the companies in the way of earlier cash and loan values.

Brundrett avenue and a section of River road were closed to traffic because of the impassable mire.

Safety precautions were taken at the pumping station to guard against possible pollution of the water. The amount of chlorine in the water was increased. Officials stated that there was no real danger from this source, and that the measure was only taken as a precaution.

FIRE LOSS LESS

A total of 18 more alarms were answered last year by the local fire department than the year before, according to the fire chief's annual report. There were 35 more bell alarms and 17 fewer still alarms. The ambulance made 274 calls as compared to 259 the preceding year.

The fire loss decreased however from \$22,410 to \$16,340.50. The value of the buildings where fires occurred was \$190,250 as compared to \$220,625 the preceding year.

Ancient Roman Acqueduct

The only Roman aqueduct still in use is the "El Puente del Diablo," which carries water into Segovia, Spain. This remarkable structure, which is ten miles long and at one point crosses a valley at a height of 102 feet, was constructed 1,900 years ago of rough-hewn granite blocks, laid without lime or cement.—Dr. William B. Burns, Dorchester, Mass., in Collier's Weekly.

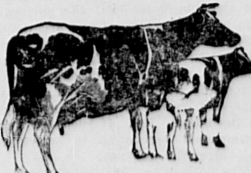
Shapes of Macaroni

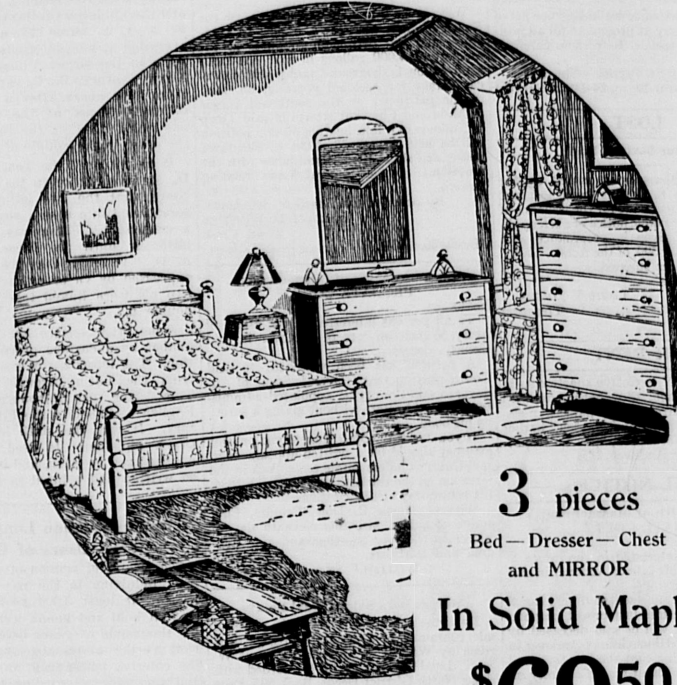
