## Manslaughter Case Out As Woman Improves

The police received some welcome news Monday from the Lawrence General Hospital, where Mrs. Marie Houle of Manchester, N. H., has been lying semi-conscious at times since August 20, when she was injured in an altercation with her escort after a dance in Shawsheen Village. Monday the hospital reported that her name had finally been removed from the danger list, and police made ready to question her to prepare their case of assault against the 31 year old painter. Two weeks ago on a Saturday night, hospital authorities had to report that things looked black, that she might not survive the next day. She pulled through, thus saving the town another manslaughter case.

## Submit Petition on Pine St. Job

As plans went ahead rapidly this week for the coming town meeting, another petition for a special article was submitted, this one for a sewer in the Pine street section. At the same time another petition is now being circulated for the establishment of a cemetery in West Andover at the Lithuanian Farm. This latter matter requires two preliminary steps, first the approval of the state department of health on the drainage and secondly a public hearing before the local board of health. The land in question consists of ten acres between Greenwood road and Chandler road.

W. P. A. approval of the Pine street project and the County road water project has not yet been asked for, it is understood. It usually takes eight weeks to obtain the final approval.

While no announcement has been made as yet about the projects to be brought before the coming meeting, both public and official sentiment is leaning away from such projects as gravel roads and brush-cutting and toward such things as water and sewer extensions. If gravel road work and cutting back brush are carried on hereafter they will probably be done as filler projects in the winter when more substantial jobs cannot be handled inexpensively.

## Samuel H. Bailey, Former Selectman And Representative, Reaches 90th Birthday

A tall, thin man who looked very much as if he could still go out and mow a field of hay without any trouble, was the center of attention Sunday down at the Bailey home on Porter road. Samuel H. Bailey was observing his ninetieth birthday, and his many relatives with many friends, including fellow-members of the Grange, the Odd Fellows, the Rebekahs and the Masons, came down to wish him health and happiness. Many bouquets of flowers decorated the little living-room which overflowed with well-wishers.



Off to one side there's a little room in which hang two pictures, the committee on agriculture of the state legislature in 1914 and 1915. At the top is the picture of Samuel H. Bailey, eminently fitted for his position on the committee by virtue of having been born in West Parish and having spent most of his days in farming. He was a charter member of the Grange, and a past

### For Representative

Gordon R. Cannon, candidate for representative, was born in Lawrence and moved here in 1897, graduating from Phillips Academy in 1902. After a year in practical mining, he joined his father in teaching and conducting Cannon's commercial college. He has taught Sunday school classes and been interested in Scouts. He is a past master of the Blue Lodge of Masons, and of the Lawrence Council of Masons, and past commander of the Knights of Templars. He is a member of the Grange and the South Church.

An active Republican, he has been a precinct officer for many years. In 1936 he was elected to the state convention, and in the fall primaries he was requested to run on stickers for representative by the Lawrence Republican city committee. He polled a large vote in November of that year.

### For Representative

Peter Joseph Dugan of 150 Bailey street, Lawrence, is a former resident of Andover, and is at present employed by Phillips Academy at the gymnasium. He was brought up here and educated in the local schools. He enlisted in the Navy and saw duty overseas, being aboard the U. S. S. Vernon when it was torpedoed. He is married and has four children, two of whom are attending the academy. He states: "The only qualified experience that is needed for this office

### For Representative

James J. Darby is the only Andover resident campaigning for the Democratic nomination for representative. He states: "The fact that there are 18 candidates from South Lawrence makes this an excellent opportunity for Andover to be represented in the General Court by a native son. If I am given the support of the entire Democratic voters of Andover it is obvious this end can be attained for the first time in a good many years."

He was born in Andover, the son of the late Thomas Darby and Mary (Harkin) Darby. He attended the local public schools. Engaged locally in the trucking business, he resides with his mother at 94 Maple avenue.

### For Representative

Cornelius Twomey is one of the most likely of the South Lawrence Democrats seeking the representative nomination. Born in Lawrence 30 years ago, he graduated from Lawrence High in 1925 and from Bentley School of Accounting and Finance in 1929. He is now in his second year at Suffolk Law School. He is married and has one son.

He was elected a delegate to the Democratic convention in 1934 and in 1936, in the latter year topping the district. He has been in the ice and fuel oil business for the last eight years.

## For County Commissioner

Wallace Bell of Lawrence, brother of David Bell of Magnolia avenue, is the only candidate for county commissioner on the Republican ticket who has run for this position before. He ran in 1932, 1934 and 1936, placing second to the nominee in each instance.

## For Representative

Attorney Peter W. Connors of South Lawrence is campaigning for the Democratic nomination for representative, and he has a strong local committee working for him. He worked for 12 years in the Lawrence mills, studying law nights, and for the past four years he has been a practicing attorney, following his graduation from Suffolk Law School. He advocates increased weekly benefits for the unemployed under the unemployment compensation act.

**Candidates Answer League's Questionnaire**

Only four candidates for repre-  
sentative, all of them Republican,  
answered the questionnaire recent-  
ly sent out by the local League of  
Women Voters to all candidates.  
They were William Beaulieu, Gor-  
don Cannon, Peter Dugan and Paul  
L'Antigua.

The answers follow:

1. Do you favor (a) retention of  
the present law giving absolute  
preference to veterans on eligible  
lists in the civil service? (b) modi-  
fication of the present law to pro-  
vide a bonus of 5 points for able-  
bodied veterans and 10 points for  
disabled veterans? (c) abolition of  
veteran preference so that all can-  
didates for civil service positions  
compete on an equal basis?

Beaulieu: I favor modification.  
L'Antigua: as a youth who feels  
that war is a service and service  
a duty, I believe in modification  
(choice b, above). Cannon: veterans  
in office or World War, or Spanish  
War? There are many new phases  
coming up constantly. For all three  
choices, the answer is efficiency.  
Dugan: (a) No. There are a lot of  
young men that were not old  
enough to serve in the war that  
are being deprived of their rights  
to civil service jobs. (b) Yes, No  
preference should be given to able-  
bodied veterans, because he has  
already received a bonus from the  
Government. As for a disabled vet-

eran the Government should take  
care of him. (c) Yes.

2. Do you favor civil service ap-  
pointment of women being made  
entirely on the basis of merit re-  
gardless of economic or marital  
status? Beaulieu: I do. L'Antigua:  
unemployment conditions could be  
greatly relieved if married women,  
living in comfortable circumstances,  
gave some concern to the plight of  
those who are close to poverty, be-  
fore they accepted civil service  
positions. Cannon: economic, yes;  
marital, no two of family in same  
or allied division. Dugan: No.  
Where women are married and  
their husbands are holding good  
positions I believe the jobs should  
be left to the single women only.

3. Do you favor jury service for  
women? Beaulieu: Yes. Cannon:  
As for judgment, yes; as for mor-  
ality on criminal, no. Dugan: Yes.  
As a voter and a taxpayer she is  
entitled to equal rights.

4. Do you favor a general sales  
and use tax? Beaulieu: No. Can-  
non: I would have to give this sub-  
ject more study to see if the so-  
called hidden taxes on the neces-  
sities of life could be eliminated.  
Dugan: No. At present I think the  
people are staggering under too  
much taxes.

5. Do you favor special courts  
for juvenile offenders? Beaulieu:  
Yes. L'Antigua:...a worthwhile

contribution to the betterment of  
society. Cannon: Yes. Dugan: Yes,  
as no child of minor years should  
be compelled to have his name  
spread on court records as a crim-  
inal when he has only committed  
a minor offense against the law.

6. Do you favor retention of the  
present savings bank life insurance  
laws? Beaulieu: Yes. Cannon:  
Question of limit. Not committed.  
Dugan: Yes, as it is a saving to  
anybody that cares to take advan-  
tage of this form of Life Insurance.

7. Do you believe that the teach-  
ers' oath law should be repealed?  
Beaulieu: No. L'Antigua: I believe  
in deportation of all aliens who  
openly show disrespect to our flag  
and constitution, but I can not see  
the effectiveness of a bill requiring  
teachers to take an oath to teach  
good Americanism when after all  
investigations of subversive activi-  
ties show that oaths mean little to  
communists. Cannon: This ques-  
tion should go to referendum. Du-  
gan: No. I believe all oaths taken  
should be lived up to.

8. Which do you favor, and which  
do you oppose of the recommenda-  
tions proposed by the Special Com-  
mission appointed to investigate  
so-called subversive activities in  
Massachusetts? Beaulieu: I fully  
agree with this commission. I think  
they did a good job. L'Antigua: I  
feel certain that no party has done  
more toward making the people  
communitic-minded than the  
Democratic party...If we are to  
investigate those people who se-  
cretly flout the Constitution and  
seek to overthrow our institutions,  
then let us launch a campaign of  
investigation against the party  
which has openly disregarded the  
Bill of Rights and has openly di-  
rected assaults against the...Con-  
stitution. Cannon: In my opinion a  
full report of the Dies investiga-  
tion will greatly influence these  
recommendations. Dugan: Not  
knowing what the commission has  
recommended I cannot answer.

Both Cannon and L'Antigua quali-  
fied their answers with:

Cannon: If I am elected to repre-  
sent in General court the people of  
my district I will legislate for the  
wish and benefit of the majority of  
the District so far as I am able to  
ascertain their desires regardless  
of my own opinion.

L'Antigua: ...if elected to the  
position I seek, when questions  
arise of which I am not certain  
how my constituents wish me to  
vote, I will endeavor to have them  
convey me their direction.

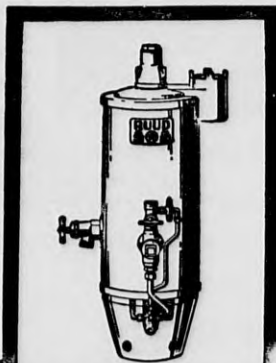

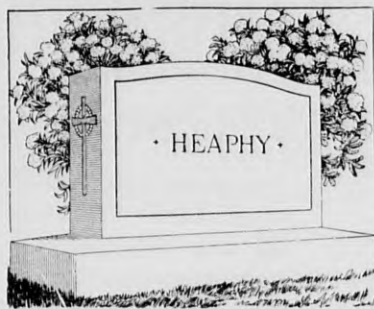

### Follow the Specifications

An incident came up at the recent school board meeting which would seem to demand an addition to the duties of the local building, wire and plumbing inspectors. It was reported at that meeting that a business man had complained that a fellow business man was not following the specifications on a job on which he had outbid his competitors, and naturally it being a lay committee, there were no members really qualified to examine the job to see if the specifications were lived up to, or whether something cheaper had been substituted. The same situation occurred a year or so ago when a roofer complained to the selectmen that the firm roofing the Richardson school was not following specifications.

Specifications should be lived up to, in order to be fair to the town and to be fair to the other bidders. If a man bids on a job, gets the contract by reason of a low bid, and then substitutes inferior materials he is not playing fair with the town or with the other men who bid on the higher specifications with the obvious intention of following them. And a board which passes over such matters lightly is not playing fair with the town, either. There's only one thing to do, and that is to have the various town inspectors make frequent visits to town contract jobs in process, not merely to see that statute requirements are lived up to, but also to see that the board's specifications are followed rigidly.

### Only One Way To Save Themselves

If a vote were taken in Andover today on license, and if the voters could vote on (1) restaurants and on (2) package stores, the result would be a decided "No" on the first, a decided "Yes" on the second. When Andover first voted license four years ago, there probably wasn't a liberal-minded person in this town who wouldn't have been proud to see Andover prove itself big enough to carry on the liquor business in a way that would do the town justice. Today they look back on the experience, and they can say truthfully: "The three package stores and the light beverage package stores have done a splendid job, but the restaurants haven't."

That would be the vote today, after a few incidents which aren't what we like to think would ever happen in a town like Andover. What the vote will be in November no one knows, but this much is certain: that the fifteen or twenty men who frequent the Main street in a not too stable condition, are plunging the restaurants, if not over, at least dangerously near the brink of "No license." It would be well for these licensees to get together and for their own interest as well as the town's, to

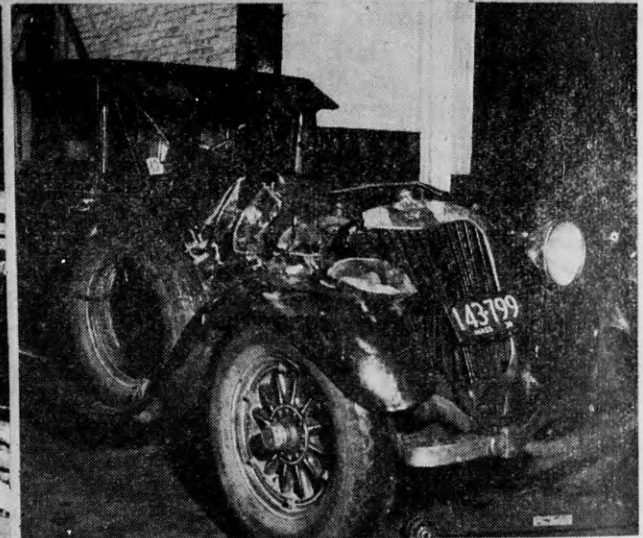
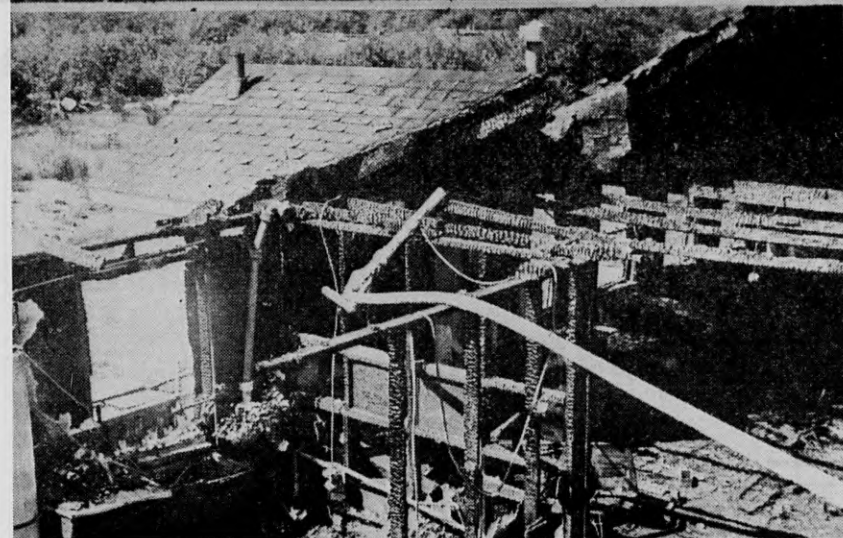
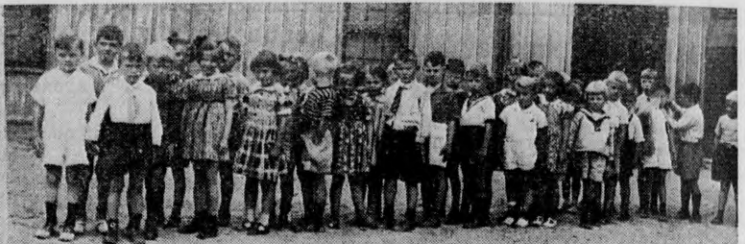
