League Group Opposes Sales Tax; Suggests Women Pay Poll Tax

A group has met six times in November and December with the Government in Operation chairman

Government in Operation chairman of the League of Women Voters, to study taxation in Massachusetts. The outline prepared by the State chairman, Mrs. Fritz Marx, was in-valuable and the interest aroused by it was evidenced by the enthusiasm of the members in investigating and reporting on very diffi-cult tax problems.

The first meetings were given to a study of the Massachusetts Tax system and tests of a good tax system. Then came the study of special taxes.

The first conclusion was that the subject is one requiring much more consideration than could be given in six meetings, but the group offers the following suggestions. As public welfare expenses are bound to increase for a few years and extra revenue must be secured, we suggest working for: 1. A study of reorganization of state and municipal government with a view to coordination and economy; 2. A constitutional amendment to permit a graduated income tax; 3. A poll tax on women; 4. An excise on registered trailers in lieu of a local tax; 5. An increased tax (making 4 cents) on each gallon of motor fuel, to be used for public welfare. This tax to be repealed if a gradu-

ated income tax is adopted.

The general sales tax was considered and the group as a whole agreed with the league stand in opposing it, as not fulfilling the tests of a good tax, largely because it falls heaviest on those least able

Snow Removal **Fund Again Nil**

If it's a white Christmas in Andover, it may be very, very white. Apparently no money can be spent for removing the snow until the selectmen declare an emergency, and it is a question as to just how severe a snowfall has to be before it can be called an emergency.

Last Thursday night the Board of Public Works invited the selectmen, finance committee, town counsel and selected representatives of the Taxpayers' association to a meeting to discuss the problem. In immediate results the meeting only had one: the decision on the part of the finance committee to transfer another \$540 to take care of snow removal bills which were in excess not only of the original appropriation but of transfer number one. At present the department is without funds for snow removal, the reserve fund is so far depleted that it cannot be counted on any longer as a source of money, and the only recourse now is to have the selectmen declare an emer-gency, which they will not do until they see an emergency.

Shall We Save \$4200?

A saving of \$4200 on an expenditure of \$7100 is something that the ordinary businessman would grab at with little delay. That same possibility the school board now has before it, and at its next meeting, the first week in January, it will take action one way or the other on closing two of the outlying schools to effect this saving.

A few years ago the board considered closing the North school, which then had but nine pupils, but there was such a storm of pro-test that the board decided to forget it. Since then the school has grown, and now has about 20 pupils, and yet this increase does not necessarily justify the board's action or lack of action two or three years ago. If a group of pupils, whether there be 9 or 29, can be educated at less cost and with better results elsewhere, the board owes it to the town and to the children to close the school.

There will probably be protests again this time, especially so since the question now is not only closing the North school but also the West Center school. There were pro-Center school. tests when the Bailey and Osgood schools were closed, but there is no doubt that the town saved money in doing this. In the present question there are very definite savings possible, mainly because of a drop in enrollment in elementary grades which has left the elementary staff overmanned. It would mean dropping a couple of teachers, and that requires courage on the part of a board. It would mean voting against the wishes of the parents who prefer to have their children taught nearer home, and that too requires courage.

has been reported that the children, some of whom now have to work under a teacher who has

six grades to teach, would receive Baptist Preaching six grades to teach, would receive a better education if they were transported to the Shawsheen or Indian Ridge schools where the teachers would be better able to give their grades the individual treatment they need. This argument cannot be contraverted. If something costs a little more, and the children were to get a better the children were to get a better education, there is no doubt what action the school board would take: they would immediately vote to do

If the school board closes these schools, it will mean that the children, who are the primary con-cern, will be getting more and the town paying less. Obviously then the course of action is clear. The board must summon up its courage, make the decision to close up the schools and then carry out the various savings that this closing up will mean.
