## School Board to Return \$3,000

A balance of possibly \$3000 will be returned to the town by the school department at the close of the year, it was revealed at a special meeting held Tuesday night. This sum, the only balance of any size returned in the past six years, is made up mostly from savings effected during the year.

Tuesday night it was decided to purchase some lockers for the high school. Principal Nathan C. Hamblin was present at the meeting to explain the need which has been felt for many years. There have been numerous disappearances of clothing from the open coatrooms in the basement, while there have been no such complaints from the junior high where each child has a locker.

## Change Bus Stop To Town Hall

The bus stop in front of the Musgrove building was discontinued today, and hereafter all buses will stop in front of the town hall. The new route for Lawrence buses will be the loop around Punchard avenue, Bartlet street and Chestnut street onto Main again. Formerly they came down Park street. The entire front on Main street from Park to Barnard street is to be reserved for buses. Passengers may wait in the town hall foyer.

## Give the Workers a Chance

Into our office the other day there came a man who was considerably worried, for he claimed that he had been told by a public works official that the Taxpayers' Association was going to cut the public works budgets so that very few of the present staff would secure work. The man wanted to know if that were true. Since the Taxpayers' Association has taken no action on any budgets yet, the remark seemed a little premature, but knowing the purpose of the association, it's easy to see that the remark has no substance whatsoever.

The Townsman, and we think the Taxpayers' Association too, is not against men working; it's against any department paying men who don't work. It's not against doing necessary projects; it's against doing them in an unnecessarily extravagant way. It wants to keep men working, and it wants to do every job that the town needs to have done, and no amount of misrepresentation on the part of anyone under whose nose waste exists can possibly change this.

Monday night a group of men, with a payless Christmas staring at them, went to the Board of Selectmen because they had been laid off by the public works department. Obviously, they had been told to go to the selectmen by someone in charge, but it was not the selectmen's problem. They could do nothing but refer them back to the public works department, and this is really where the trouble lies. One can say that the town meeting didn't appropriate enough money, that the Taxpayers' Association wants to keep expenses down, that the Townsman wishes to stop the work of the public works department—but it would be merely trying to lay the blame on someone else for something that was caused by waste. This year to date a large sum has been spent for the rental of the Iron Mike, for instance; that money could have kept those men working until the end of the year, and would have given them more work during the year. That's just an example. The same number of men can be given more work if a real attempt is made to cut out wasteful methods and policies.

## Legion Conducts Children's Party

Santa Claus was a very busy man last Saturday afternoon as some 100 youngsters flocked around him at the annual party sponsored by the Legion and its auxiliary. Each youngster received a gift, candy, ice cream and an orange.

The play is outstanding, and has been successfully given on the professional stage, both in this country and in England, where it ran for many months.

The cast was selected with discrimination as to the requirements of each part; and the very simplicity and naturalness of acting which depicted the every-day life of a group of medical students over a period of years, was an achievement very difficult to attain by amateurs, as anyone at all familiar with stagecraft understands.

Slap-stick to procure a laugh, and the interpretation of clever dialogue with natural action, are far apart, so far as good theatre is concerned.

Each member of the cast entered into the spirit of the play and entirely lived the part assigned—which is always a joy to the producer. The striking episode in the third act depicted the sharp contrast between a right attitude toward life, and the ultra-modern freedom now so prevalent. The moral was obvious, and the clever acting of an extremely difficult part deserves great credit. The simple, characteristic setting of a students' lodging house was interesting, and the Scotch landlady was inimitable.

All credit to the Adventurers and may they continue to keep their standards high.

Unfortunately circumstances surrounding the writing of the article, which had to serve as a substitute for another which had been expected but which did not arrive, made it impossible to go into sufficient detail about the work of individual members of the cast, about the very fine job the scenery crew again did in producing the desired atmosphere, the weeks of devoted labor they all put into it, the hours and hours which Mrs. Lyman Cheever, director, spent in bringing the cast to perfection in their difficult roles.
