Salvation Army Appeal Now Underway

At a meeting held last Thursday at the Andover National Bank, the local committee working under general chairman Edward A. Anderson in the interest of The Salvation Army Andover Appeal, met and discussed plans in general. It was decided to commence the appeal immediately in view of the fact that all the ground work had already been laid. Adjutant Charles Johnston in charge of the work of the Army in Greater Lawrence and Andover is assuming full charge of the campaign.

Twenty-eight workers are canvassing the regular contributors and special givers to the work of the Army, and while it is generally known that the Army appeals to all at the Seasonal period of the year, such as Christmas, yet only once does the Army petition for the funds in which to maintain its work throughout the year. It is hoped, therefore, that those who contribute for seasonal relief, will also manage to "share in the good works program," the slogan adopted in the Andover appeal with the added insertion "WILL YOU SHARE?" The quota set for Andover is \$1,500 and with the united efforts of all, plus a spirit

of giving to such a worthy cause, it is felt that this amount is not a hard task or goal to reach.

In a statement issued to the Townsman Adjutant Johnston said, "I would like it to be known that none of these funds go to Boston, but are used solely for the work in the communities which come under my care and jurisdiction. I would also like to emphasize the fact that the supervision amount sent to our divisional headquarters is only ten percent, this caring for all printing materials, correspondence, and service which the local unit cannot render."

May Recommend \$25,000 for River

A recommendation that \$25,000 be appropriated for flood control of the Shawsheen river may be made by the ways and means committee of the state legislature shortly, it was learned yesterday. The committee may suggest that the Town of Andover pay half, or \$12,500, although opposition would probably arise against this plan.

If the work were to go ahead this year, the plan would necessitate the calling of a special town meeting, and since the \$12,500 would mean nearly another dollar on the tax rate the chances are that it would not be appropriated. It is generally felt that the condition of the river, while it damages Andover property, is not caused by Andover but rather by other Massachusetts communities.

Abbot Trustee

Passes Away

Judge Marcus Morton, 76, a native of Andover and a trustee of Abbot Academy for many years, passed away Monday at his home in Boston, just a few days before his rumored retirement was to take effect. He was appointed an associate justice of the state superior court in 1909, his father and his grandfather having been chief justices of the same court. The present Morton street in Andover was named after his family, and the present Thompson house at the corner of School and Morton streets, now owned by Abbot Academy, was his birthplace.

Graduated from Yale in 1883, he received his law degree from the Harvard University Law school.

Funeral services took place on Wednesday at the Trinity Episcopal church in Boston.

You Can't Do Anything About It?

At the opening of the town meeting last week Chairman Howell F. Shepard made a statement which was a bitter pill that you had to swallow. He told you, in effect, that if you spent the same amount as last year you would still have a tax rate two dollars or so higher than last year's, and you couldn't do a thing about it, not a thing.

And it was true, absolutely true. The excessive state budget of the past year was largely responsible for this year's threatened tax rate increase in Andover. The Boston newspapers for the past few years have carried tales of the squandering which has been going on at the State House. It may have seemed none of your business at the time, but a week ago you found out that it was very much your business, that the squandering was coming out of your pocket-book.

So, you can't do anything about last year's expenditures now, but you can do something about this year's. You can do several things. First of all, on April 4th, at 10:30 in the Gardner auditorium at the State House a public hearing will be held on the budget before the Ways and Means Committee of the state legislature. The people who want the money spent on them will be there; how about the people whose money is being spent? You have just as much right, more right in fact, to be there and voice your will, and unless you want to be told next March that the tax rate is going up another two or three dollars because of state expenditures, it would be a good idea for you to attend that hearing. The Massachusetts Federation of Taxpayers' associations has secured special excursion rates from the railroad for that day.

Then there is one other thing you can do. You have a telephone, and if you don't you can mail a letter. We have three people representing us at the state legislature; let them know how you want to be represented. The people who want the money spent on them again in this case will let them know; why don't you? Senator Babcock lives down in Bradford, representatives Twomey and Casey live in South Lawrence. They're only too glad to hear your views, and if they hear enough of them, they're bound to vote wisely for sane, economic government.

Inter-Church Missionary Rally Attracts Goodly Audience

In spite of bad weather conditions, a goodly audience attended both sessions of the Inter-Church Missionary Rally held last Thursday at the South Church. Mrs. Lillian Cole Gould presided. After short opening exercises, Mrs. Gould introduced Mrs. Oswald Tower, who described the work for the blind of Greater Andover. It was through such work undertaken by the Lawrence Woman's Club that Mrs. John Phillips became interested in founding an Andover unit under the Academy Benevolent Society, with Mrs. Tower as chairman. Mrs. Harold Leitch, Mrs. Sutton, and others in the town have also rendered devoted service to this labor of love. Various Academy faculty members have at various times addressed the group at their Peabody House meetings.

"The Church Can Hold its Youth" was the subject ably discussed by Rev. Samuel Overstreet. His church, the Baptist of Andover, had just been visited by sixteen very live young collegiates whose avowed purpose was to stimulate the young people of the congregation. Mr. Overstreet feels strongly that there is no such thing as a Youth Problem; rather, it is the problem of those of the parent age who have let themselves become smug and self-complacent. Youth calls for an all-inclusive program: devotional, recreational, vocational. All ages must work together; the family pew is still very important.

Mr. Overstreet's half-hour was the prelude to a number of reports from various Andover Sunday schools. Mrs. Christison spoke for the Free Church, saying that it could easily double its church school of 200 were teachers available. Mrs. Savage said that two experienced teachers had charge during the church hour of the primary and beginners, whose parents were thus set free to attend divine service. Mrs. Noss commented that classes now sought out their own teachers, whereas the opposite used to be true. A letter from Mrs. Myron Clark, now of Bedford, reported on the experiment called a Junior Seminar, comprised of boys and girls under a series of leaders each serving one to two months only.

The last number in the morning session was a talk by Mrs. Franklin Field of Boston entitled "Christian Education for Women." She begged the women of our churches to undergird their lives with Christian principles, educating themselves as individuals, as members of families, as citizens, and as members of world-citizenry, that they may present a Christian front to the world. To effect this in many churches the small study-group is being tried out, resulting in the creation of local leaders.

After an hour or more of recess, the afternoon session opened with four choral selections by the Abbot Academy Choir under the direction of Miss Friskin. This made a beautiful prelude to the solemn devotional service conducted by Miss Fannie Davis. She based her comments on Habakkuk's waiting in the watchtower to see what the Lord should say to him. To know His will, we too must keep silence before Him.

The events on the program reached their climax in the memorable hour given over to Dr. James Dexter Taylor of Johannes-

burg, South Africa. This missionary veteran has for the past forty years been a circuit-rider on the Rand, covering about seventy miles, with nine churches and more than seventy out-stations in his care. He described vividly the different types of miners, many of them raw natives from the bush. The slogan of the African church is "Every man an evangelist." These simple people accept Christianity in childlike faith, being cheerful givers toward the building of churches and hospitals.

The last half of the hour was devoted by Dr. Taylor to an account of the wonderful Madras Conference, which he attended while en route to America. Many of the 470 present had learned English on purpose to be able to follow the program intelligently. More than fifty percent of the delegates were under 50 years of age; 15 were from Black Africa. Dr. Taylor spoke with deep feeling of the Communion Service early Christmas morning; of the mutual forbearance of the Chinese and Japanese delegates; of Kagawa's address on the Cross of Christ. Two ideas emerging from the Conference were: First, Evangelism—the Church has a gospel, a message and a movement; second, The appeal of the so-called Younger Churches to be given a free hand locally, yet not to be forsaken financially.

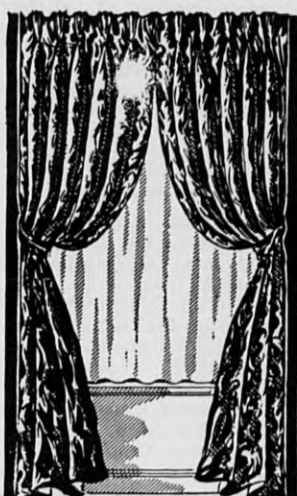

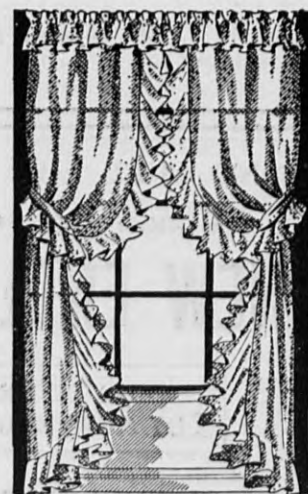
