Officers Arrest

Officer After

Auto Crash

Officers James Walker and Carl Stevens had a distasteful task to perform early Tuesday morning, but they did it. According to police reports a car came along through Shawsheen Square and crashed into a lamp standard on the west side of the street across from the Mall. When Officer Walker arrived he found a brother-officer William R. Shaw, at the wheel, with a few small cuts about his face.

The two officers placed their brother-officer under arrest on three charges: drunkenness, operating under the influence and operating to endanger. He will appear in District court tomorrow morning when his case, which was continued from Tuesday when he pleaded guilty to all charges, will be heard.

The selectmen also had a distasteful task to do, and they did it. Officer Shaw has been indefinitely suspended. If convicted tomorrow, he loses his license for possibly a year. Whether the selectmen will take more drastic action is not known.

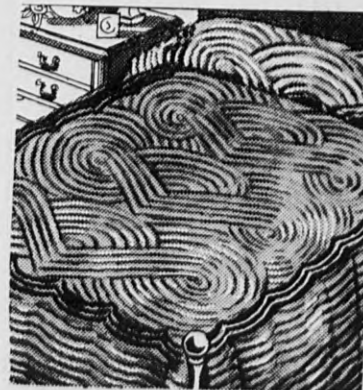

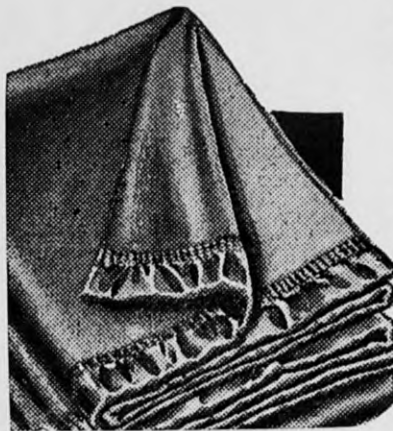

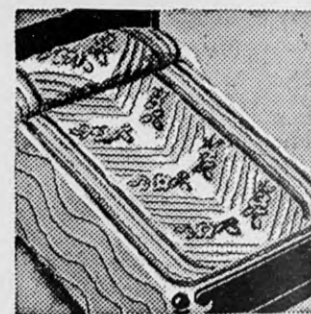

Practice What You Enforce

Vacation-time is coming, and since police officers also have vacations, Andover's residents will for the next two or three months see its group of young reserve officers on almost constant duty. He can't demand respect unless his personal conduct commands respect.

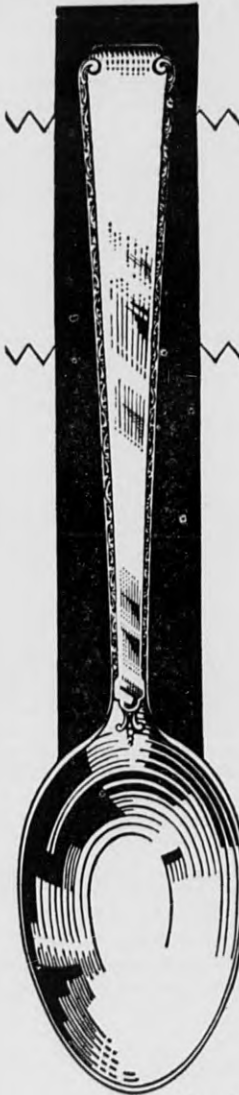

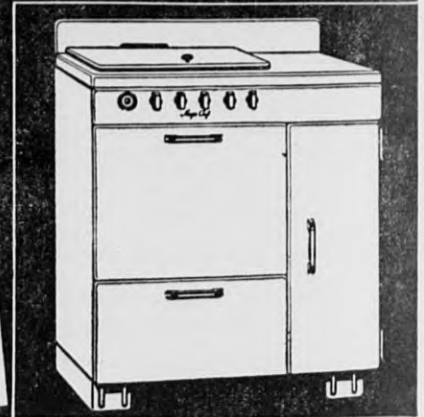

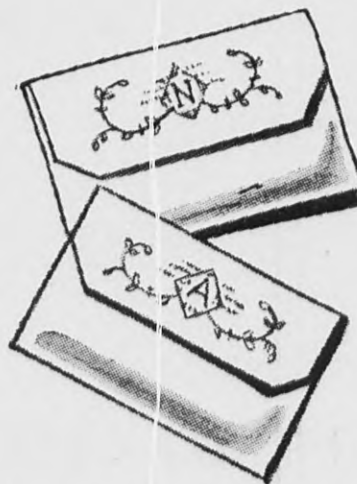
