

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

Practice What You Enforce

Vacation-time is coming, and since police officers also have va-cations, Andover's residents will for the next two or three months see its group of young reserve of-ficers on almost constant duty. They are nearing the completion of their second year on the Civil Ser-vice list, and sooner or later one of them will have to be chosen to fill any vacancy that may take place in the department.

The selectmen will undoubtedly have friends of the young officers put in a good word for them, but the present board of selectmen sel-dom pays attention to such person-al intercession. They will have the civil service marks to guide them-selves by, and they will have the knowledge of each officer's record as a reserve. There is one question. a very important one, which they should and undoubtedly will ask themselves when they consider each officer, and that is: will he at all times conduct himself in such a way as to prove a good ex-ample to the people over whom his badge gives him a certain de-gree of control?

It's not an eight-hour job. It's a 24-hour job. You wear your uni-form only while on duty, of course. but when you're off duty you're bound to obey the same laws that you yourself try to enforce. An ofwho doesn't do this, whose comportment is such as to lessen a person's respect for him. is of use to a police force, for he has little influence in making other people obey rules which he breaks. He can't demand respect unless his personal conduct commands respect.
