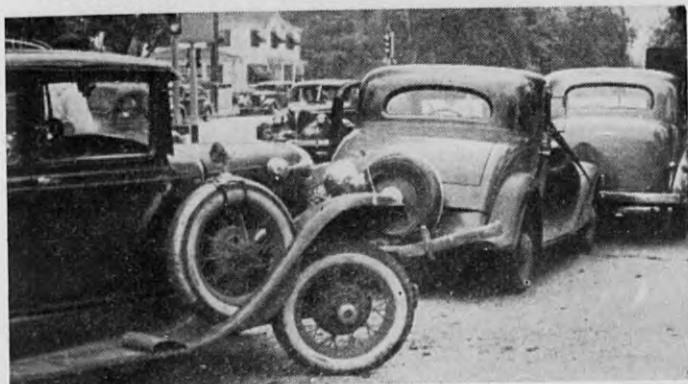

Elm Block Fire Forces Out Six Families

Six families were forced to flee from the Elm Block about 2:15 Friday morning when fire broke out on the second floor of the big frame block, causing damage fixed by fire authorities at about \$3500. The splendid job the fire department did in extinguishing the blaze in the drought-dry wooden structure has earned it much deserved praise.

Box 18 was sounded at 2:15 and at that time flames were leaping high in the air and the glare was visible for miles around. A few minutes later the glare could no longer be seen and within a very short time the fire was under control.

Several persons called the fire department on the blaze at the same time, among them being Mrs. Ida Frankheart who lives on the third floor, filling station proprietor John White and the telephone operator, the exchange being just across the alley from the fire. John Joe McGrath, one of the occupants of the second floor, awoke to find his place in flames and the front stairs cut off by a locked door. He managed to dash through the flames and down the back stairs, then down Post Office avenue to Sergeant Saunders, and officers McBride and Dufton. The three policemen ran into the building and aided the occupants in making their escape. Mr. White also assisted and William Lowe of Essex street managed to get one lady out who was trapped in one of the rooms. The occupants, most of them in night clothes, some with-

out shoes or slippers, were offered clothing by neighbors, and Alex Beedie, caretaker of the Square and Compass club house, set up ten beds as a much-needed accommodation.

The McGrath apartment, where the blaze apparently started, was badly gutted as was Mrs. Ida Frankheart's directly above. The front of the building escaped much damage, and the two apartments above the A and P store were not badly damaged. The Andover Market, directly under the MacGrath apartment, escaped the blaze, but there was some water damage. The Lundgren funeral service room in the rear, housing caskets, etc., also was not touched. A. W. Badger of North Andover, owner of the Andover Steam Laundry, was present keeping an eye on his property neighboring the blaze.

Of the estimated \$3500 loss the building itself is covered by insurance, and \$2800 will be saved in this way. However, personal effects lost by the families were not covered.

Two families had their vacations spoiled by the fire. They were Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Paterson and daughter Alison of Chicago, and Mr. and Mrs. John Drummond and son Jack also of Chicago. Says Haggetts Contains More Bacteria Than Should Be Expected In A Public Supply Of Water

State Commissioner Of Public Health Recommends Study Of Filtration

"The water contains a large amount of bacteria, more than should be expected in a public water supply," State Commissioner of Public Health Dr. Paul J. Jakmauh says of Haggetts Pond in a report to the Andover Board of Public Works. The pond is subject to pollution from the highway, from the camps along its shores, and from those who use the pond for boating and fishing.

Dr. Jakmauh recommends that boating and fishing be prohibited, that the quality of the water be improved by diverting the drainage from certain streams of the watershed, and that consideration be given to the filtration of water, the present sole reliance on chlorination being undesirable.

Portions of the Commissioner's report follow:

"Recent examination of the water at the pond showed that it was subject to pollution by drain-

age from nearly a mile of public highway and from a number of camps located near the shore . . .

"The resultant examination of the highways shows that the pond is also subject to pollution by those who frequent its waters in boating and fishing . . .

"The results of a bacteria examination of samples of water collected from sections of the pond showed that the water contains a large amount of bacteria, more than should be expected in a public water supply . . .

"Further, the sole reliance on chlorination for the protection of water consumers is undesirable and the department again recommends boating and fishing be prevented. . .

"The department has recommended that consideration be given to the filtration of all water pumped from the pond for the purpose of removing micro-organisms and preventing odors and taste in the water for the purpose of furnishing a further safeguard in connection with this water supply."

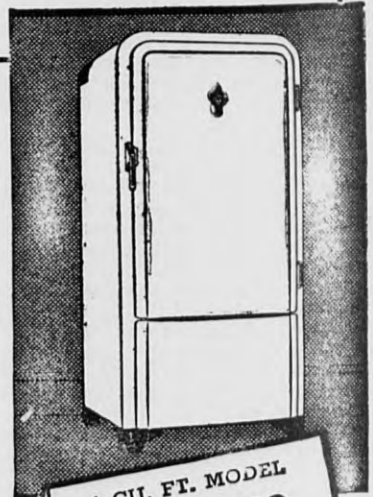

Aqua Not So Pura

It's about time for another editorial on drinking. This time however the criticism will be levelled at what is drunk by even those who are the strictest teetotalers.

Don't you enjoy very much going to the faucet on a scorching hot day, turning it on to get a nice refreshing drink of Haggetts Pond water, and finding that what you had expected would be crystal-clear water is actually muddy, rusty or dirty in appearance and oily, fishy or vegetably in taste? It's enough to drive a man to drink. If it were something that happens only once a year, it probably wouldn't even be worth thinking about, but lately it seems that we have a week of good water and two of bad.

When the state commissioner of public health declares after an analysis that Andover's water contains far more bacteria than should ordinarily be expected in a public water supply, when he talks of pollution from the watershed and from boating and fishing, it's time for a residential town like Andover to do something about it. Dr. Jakmauh suggests filtration. It would be an expensive job, but it might be worth it to get a good, healthful drink of water.

Late Tax Rate

Forces Borrowing

Late establishment of the tax rate is costing the town money, but thanks to a low interest rate, it's not costing very much. This week Town Treasurer Thaxter Eaton had to borrow \$50,000 with which to meet the town obligations. He negotiated the loan with the Andover National bank at 1/10 of one percent. It will run four months.

Mr. Eaton states that he has not received the sum which the Commonwealth was supposed to send the town out of the highway fund.

Usually by this time the town treasury is pretty well replenished by income from the real estate and personal tax.

The Board of Public Works and Selectmen took action last Thursday night and the school board Monday night. Chairman Shepard pointed out that Mr. Cronin is a resident of Andover, is a property owner here and pays excise taxes on his trucks which he garages here.

All the coal is to be weighed on the town scales before delivery.

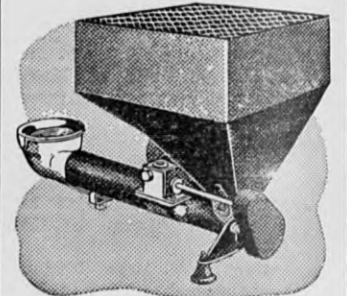

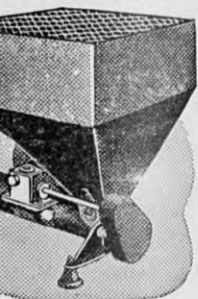

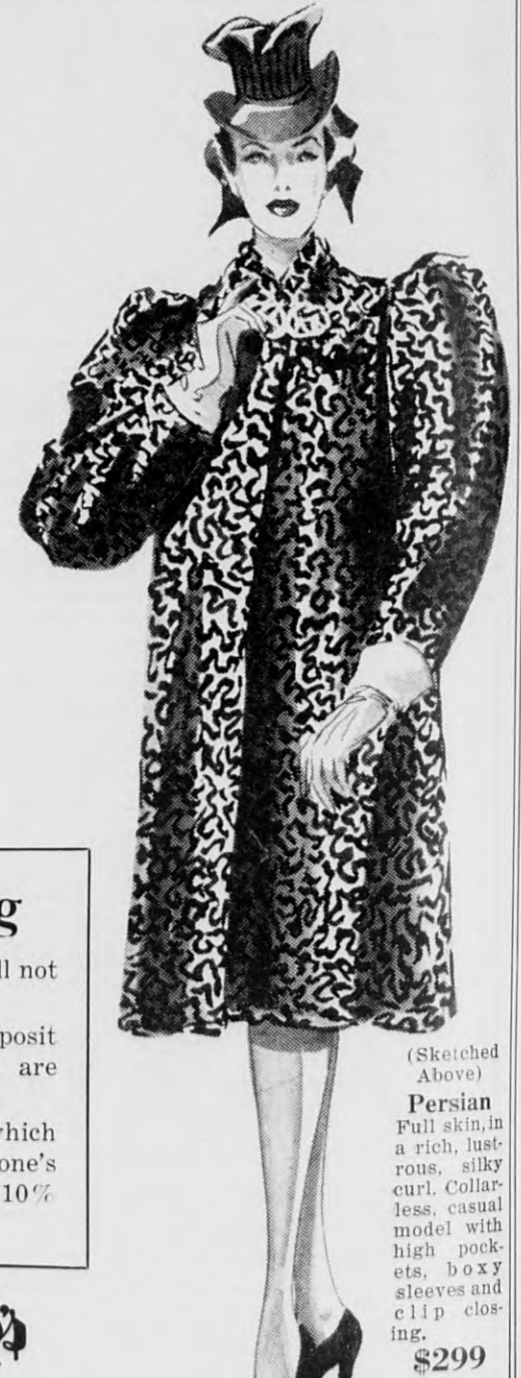
