## Academy To Present Concert Series

The Andover-Exeter Musical clubs will present a concert in George Washington Hall, Saturday evening, at 7:15. The admission price of twenty-five cents includes the movie which will follow.

Next Tuesday evening at 8:15, in the Cochran Chapel of Phillips Academy, there will be a concert which should prove of more than ordinary interest to the concert-goer and music lover. A brass ensemble of twenty pieces will play compositions ranging from the xviiith to the xxth century. There will be numbers by the old English composers Adson and Holborne, and by Henry Purcell; by the Italians Gabrieli and Monteverdi; by the old Germans Pezel and Reiche, and by Bach; also by the modern Hindemith. It is very seldom that the opportunity presents itself to hear this type of music, including old airs, old dances, tower-music, and the funeral music of Queen Mary, also played at Purcell's own funeral. The concert is presented by an alumnus of the school, and the public is cordially invited to attend.

During the intermission, Mrs. J. C. Angus and Dr. Pfatteicher will play several of the fugues of Bach's "Art of Fugue" in a four-hand piano arrangement. This work, Bach's last, has been called the most powerful composition in Occidental music. The numbers will also include Bach's very last composition, the chorale which he dictated on his death bed in his blindness to his son-in-law: "Before Thy Throne I Tread Herewith."

## Wit And Good Sense Overcome Social Barriers In Adventurers Spring Production

Chock-full of gay dialogue, which makes just as much sense whether you are rooting for the Seton name or for Holiday-dreams, the Adventurers' production which will be presented next Tuesday evening in the auditorium promises to be great fun. Alica A. Waterston is particularly convincing as the gushing, snobbish Laura Cram and supplies as much humor in her fluttering way as the merry Potters do in theirs. Stephen Whitney as Nick Potter is having such a good time with his part that he sometimes ad libs to add extra zest and jests. His colleagues are used to it, though, and they carry on as if it were all in the book.

The vivacious lines are not without their under-current of something not easy to describe but

nevertheless necessary to be understood. Directress Fran Cheever has not allowed this to be overdramatized, but it is always there and you are allowed to make up your mind which side of the struggle is more justifiable. Mrs. Cheever is following out her theory that directing is largely an instinct which aids in developing the talent recognized in the actors and has allowed the talented "Holiday" cast much freedom in the interpretation of their parts. And they have not missed.

A luxurious set is the background for the controversy and the committees and stage crews have outdone themselves in creating the allusion of a Fifth Avenue mansion. Wall-papered flats are being used for the first time...but you must see for yourself! It is too good to miss.

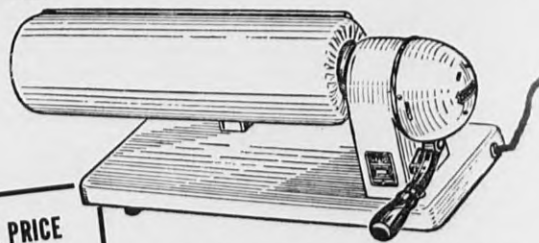

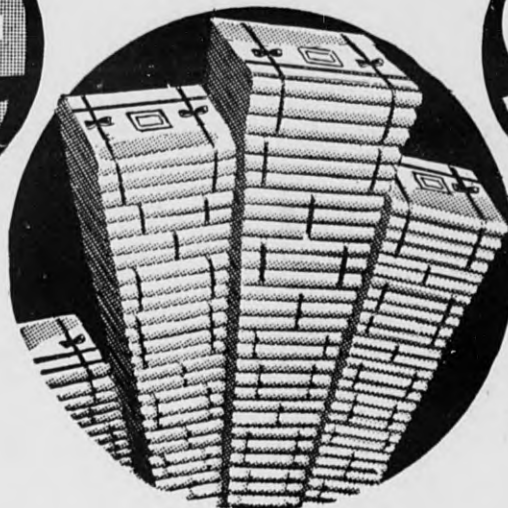

Isn't modern progress wonderful? Take the radio, for instance. Remember about the War of 1812, when Andy Jackson was fighting the Battle of New Orleans days after the war had ended because methods of communication were not speedy enough to inform him of the cessation of hostilities?

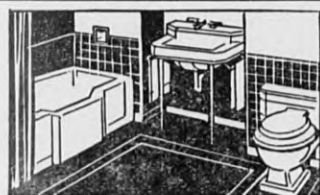

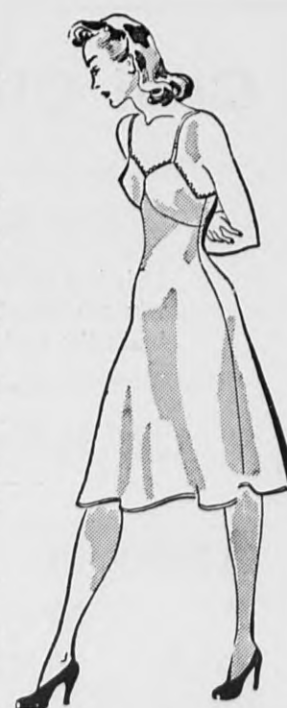
