EDITORIAL



They found peace. They went across imbued with patriotism, feeling that their effort would mean a new order for the World, and when they laid down their lives, it was probably with the hope that in doing so they were insuring peace for their families back home.

Memorial day morning we pause over their graves to breathe a prayer of gratitude for what they did. How many, this year, will mingle with that prayer a thought that those boys failed to bring peace to us? How many will say to themselves: "Soon more of our boys will have to go over to see if they can find peace for us." And then, how many, not having allowed their reason to be overcome by war hysteria, will say: "Those boys didn't fail; let us not fail them."

Memorial day should give us cause to think. We should perhaps wonder why those boys had to die, and if we find the proper answer for that, we will do everything in our power to save today's young men from the same fate. From their sacrifice we should have learned a lesson; Europe didn't, the United States must.

Over their graves the star-spangled banner will wave on Memorial day. There are thirteen

stripes on it, thirteen colonies which over 150 years ago declared their independence of Europe. The leader who made that independence possible urged in his farewell address that the United States safeguard its independence, its freedom, by keeping out of European affairs, and the only worth while modification since then has been Monroe's dictum that Europe should keep out of American affairs. Strangely enough, the same thought emanated from Germany following President Roosevelt's Sunday night talk. The leaders there commented, in gist: "We have never given America any cause for fear; America is for the Americans, and Europe is for the Europeans."

Let's keep faith with those who died. Let's follow the Monroe doctrine by building adequate defense to keep Europe out of our affairs; let's follow Washington's suggestion by keeping out of Europe's affairs. We have no reason for sending our young men over there to be killed; the present mess was caused by failure of the European nations to learn a lesson from World War I.

If we act as we should, on Memorial day in the future, we will have no more soldier dead to honor than we have today.


