## Changes To Be Made At Central Schools

Several changes are to be made in the Central Grammar schools, with the old John Dove school being destined to serve mainly as a manual arts building. Miss Stack's and Miss Burke's rooms will be moved to Stowe's two remaining vacant rooms. The shop will be located in Miss Stack's room, with Miss Burke's to be a demonstration and class room. The present gymnasium room in John Dove will be made into a Lumber and Finishing room. The present Lunch room and Mrs. Tate's room for the special class would remain in the present locations. The plan would provide more room for academic work in the already capacity-filled Punchard and Junior High schools.

The manual-training students will take care of the necessary alterations.

At Tuesday night's school board meeting a number of routine actions were taken in addition to approving the John Dove plan: Miss Gates reappointed cafeteria manager; janitors reappointed; authorization for obtaining bids on summer work, milk, etc.; appointment of Dr. McTernan as school dentist, without salary.

## Abbot Graduates Class Of Fifty-five

Fifty-five students graduated from Abbot academy Monday morning, with Rev. Vivian T. Pomeroy, D. D., of Milton, giving the commencement address. Steering carefully away from heavier topics such as the 1940 commencement address favorite, "War," Dr. Pomeroy pleased his audience with an informal talk which started out with that retiring person, father, whose inferiority is marked by his failure to mend the radio as well as 12-year-old Charlie, or play tennis as well as 16-year-old Pauline, plus his inability to drive and dress as his children think he should.

Father lost his exalted position when he gave up his beard, the speaker said, for the beard was the symbol of authority and the sign of superiority. This observation naturally led to King George V, and so to the only advice which Dr. Pomeroy wished to impart: two mottoes found in the late King's study after his death: "The secret of life is not doing what we like but liking what we have to do," and "Teach me never to cry for the moon nor over spilled milk."

The principal, Miss Hearsey, presented the diplomas. E. Barton Chapin, president of the board of trustees, presided and Rev. Winthrop Richardson of the faculty gave the invocation.

Preceding the commencement, the tree and ivy exercises were

held, with Elizabeth Travis, president of 1940, presenting the spade to Emily Mills, 1941 president, and Jeanne Cowles, '40, presenting the trowel to Josephine Hartwell, '41. The tree song was by Priscilla Williams.

## Red Cross Seeks To Meet New Doubled Quota

When the American Red Cross made its initial appeal for a War Relief fund of \$10,000,000 no one could foresee how the situation would change in three short weeks. It is impossible to describe the plight of the millions of sick, wounded, hungry and homeless refugees in France. The tragic course of events has made it necessary for the Red Cross to ask for increased funds and the goal has been raised from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000. This figure is a minimum. The only maximum limit is the generosity of the American people.

The people of Andover have responded splendidly to the appeal. The initial quota of \$2400 has already been substantially exceeded. Only a few hundred dollars is necessary in order to enable the Andover Chapter of the Red Cross to meet its doubled quota. The total amount received by treasurer Ripley through Tuesday is \$4027.33.

### Conduct Annual Alumnae Day

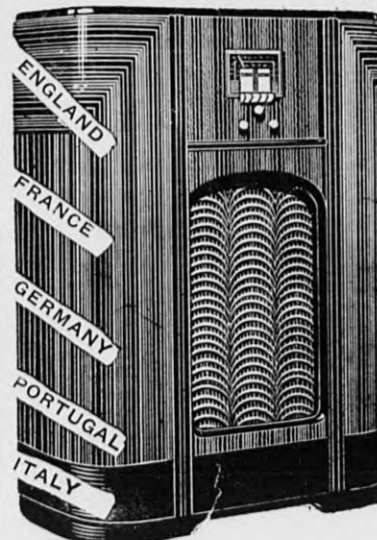

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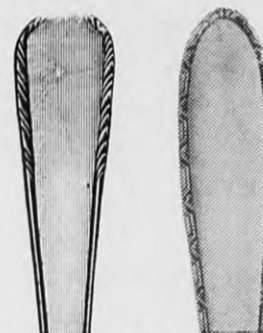

Will President Roosevelt be re-elected for a third term? For the past few years straw polls have indicated cyclical variations in the trend for and against a third term, but at present since the invasion of Holland and Belgium many people are conceding his victory even before he has cleared the air by announcing whether he would or would not accept the nomination.

Of course the reason for this change is obvious. In our headlong hysterical haste to defend ourselves against invasion, many felt that it would be unwise to make any changes. But as we look over the whole defense situation, aren't there many questions that can be asked, not about the necessity for defense, but about several serious phases for which the Roosevelt administration is directly responsible?

For instance, we've come upon our rainy day, and we didn't save for it. Taxes have to be raised, the national debt limit boosted another three billion dollars. Of course, we all realize that this must be done, but still we wonder why these expedients had to be resorted to. In other words if the Roosevelt administration had not been haywire for

the past seven years, if the President had not indulged his every fancy at the public's expense, the United States today would be in a better position financially to take care of today's emergency. If the statutory national debt limit had not already been raised at the President's request well beyond the size of the debt that he in first running for the office criticized as being too big, and if he had not hastened to run the debt right up to that limit, there'd be some leeway there today, a margin which in the next few years might prove very important. And if he hadn't year after year, upon promising a balanced budget, gone ahead and indulged in deficit financing, there'd be a surplus today upon which we could draw to prepare ourselves.

In other words we don't believe that the present administration has by its domestic policy prepared the country financially for preparedness. We believe that it went ahead, regardless of the chaotic

conditions it must have seen coming, to indulge itself in the most wasteful administering of the largest amount of public money that any administration has ever spent. It probably felt that when today's defense emergency came, the people would just let them increase the debt and impose higher taxes. They were right, of course; defense is necessary, we're willing to pay for it, and maladministration makes these two forms of financing the only ones available.

But there is something we don't have to do. We don't have to continue this administration in power after January. It has proved itself incapable of properly administering the country in peacetime; certainly it cannot be counted on to be the wisest administration in possible wartime. England shifted from Chamberlain to Churchill, France from Daladier to Reynaud in the middle of the stream, and both countries are stronger for it. The United States can well profit by their example.

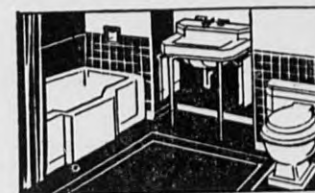
### Mrs. Isabelle F. MacLachlan
