

# JE Ranch Rodeo At Topsfield Fair



Dolly Eskew, one of Texas' most noted horsewomen, will demonstrate her trick and fancy riding skill in the JE Ranch Rodeo.

The atmosphere of the old west will pervade the Topsfield fair grounds during the 119th annual Essex County Fair, September 4 through 8, Wednesday through Sunday, when the JE Ranch championship rodeo will be the premier attraction.

The largest traveling show of its kind in the country, the JE rodeo will bring more than 200 head of stock and 100 cowboys, cowgirls and Indians to Topsfield. Bucking bronchos, wild Brahma bulls and steers and untamed calves will engage the cowpunchers in riding, roping and bull-dogging competition. There will also be exhibitions of trick and fancy riding and roping. American-version bull fights, horsejumping contests and other sports of the western plains. Two and onehalf hour performances will be staged twice daily, Wednesday through Sunday, and the show will be enlivened by a rare novelty an all-Indian military band.

Special holiday performances of the rodeo will be held Labor Day, September 2, in the afternoon and evening at 3 and 8. During the fair the rodeo will be presented twice daily at 2:30 and 7:30. On Sunday Sentember 8 final

On Sunday, September 8, final day of the Fair, a gala stage show featuring outstanding radio artists, model airplane contests and other new attractions will be offered.

The agricultural and educational exhibits will be more numerous and varied than ever. This year's Guernsey cattle show will be one of the best in the east; the famous flower show will contain several new and unusual departments; the goat, poultry and pigeon shows have been enlarged. Mink growers of the County will exhibit their valuable animals for the first time. The photography show, which made such a hit last year, will be almost twice as big.

Note-Certainly, here in Andover it can't be because the church-goers are afraid of the preachers, because this town has about as splendid a set of clergymen of all denominations as any town can boast. It's difficult to explain why church-goers congregate at the rear of the church and leave the pastor lonely at the front. The best solution of course would be to find some way to convince people that going to church is a very im-portant part of their lives, and once that is done the newcomers will take up enough of the pews so that there'll be no vacant seats anywhere.)



All indications at present are bat the United States' first peacetime draft will be soon enacted into law, based on the theory that under present totalitarian policies of surprise attack without declaring war it is best to train men ahead of time than to try to train them in war time. It's a serious matter for the million men who will be conscripted, and it is up to Congress to make their contribution less of a personal sacrifice.

The pending bill did at least carry a pay of thirty dollars month-ly, which is an increase of nine dollars over the first figure. However, is that enough? What hap-pens to the family life of a man who has been making \$35 to \$45 a week, who is building a little home, buying a car, trying to pay for a refrigerator, trying to put a little aside for his children's education. Must they be made to suffer? If a person is to be taken out of private employment to be trained for the PATRONIZE OUR ADVERTISERS

army, he should not have to make such a sacrifice. A just policy, for that year's training, would be to give the draftees, within reasonable maximum and minimum limits a salary equivalent to what he would be making had he not given up his private work, with due allowance for meals. Costly? Oh, no, it isn't but even if it were, why should not the people of this Nation share in this sacrifice instead of heaping it upon one million who had the misfortune to be born within certain years and to have built up a

But it wouldn't be too costly. In the first place there would be one million jobs vacated in private industry and for that year one million other people would have to be employed. This would wipe out WPA, PWA, CCC, and all the other public welfare projects. That money would all be saved. In the second place payment of a just wage now would eliminate any justifiability

for a bonus later. Furthermore, their jobs should be guaranteed to them when they re-turn to private life. No loophole should exist for substitution of anybody else, and whoever does fill in the place of a draftee should be told that his job lasts only so long as the regular employee is in train

ing. If a draft is necessary, let's make it fair. Let's all bear the burden


