Why doesn't our Congress give our Weygands a chance? Why,

Having asked these mili tary and naval heads what the needs of an adequate defense pro gram are, it is the duty of Congress to ratify these plans with out a moment's delay, becaus angess exceptions the

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motorized units-and American industry can do this so fast that any
or all of the totalitarian countries would do an awful lot of thinking before they would even dare say anything the least bit undiploma-

What the defense needs are-
that's the Army and Navy's job. How to supply them-that's indus. try's job. And what is the job of Congress? As our representatives,
their job is to say to the Army and Navy and to Industry: "Go ahead. You've done it before. We your can do it again."
