Phones To Remain In Status Quo
Another "Finis" has been writ ten to the telephone toll question The Department of Public Utilities, apparently basing its decision on the own polu rather than the privately conducted poll, turned down petitions for an abolition of time in the past fifteen the fourth time in the past fifteen years.
The commission reported that the telephone company expressed itself as willing to supply the type of service that the majority of people in Andover wanted, but the commission's poll showed that a majority desired the present setup.
The seven-page report of the commission went over the case in detail, and then explained the reason for toll charges: toll service being a service used by a minority in the exchange, a special service and as such one which should be paid for only by those using it. "If special services of any type are not charged for in accordance with the cost of maintaining such services, then the minority would eventually benefit at the cost of the majority." In the Andover case, as shown by the poll, "it is the minority who would have been the recipients of the benefits of a change," the commission concluded.
