Sale of Paintings at The Addison Gallery

The Christmas shopping problem is here again and with the current shortages of stock in the department stores and the annual shortage of ideas, it is worse than ever. The Addison Gallery of American Art presents as its Christmas show, from November 24 to December 27, a sale of paintings, drawings, lithographs and silk-screen prints, all priced between \$5 and \$50, in an effort to solve this problem and to suggest that the ownership of original work is not the exclusive privilege of successful businessmen and endowed institutions, but that pictures of surprising good quality can be brought within the reach of every man. Accordingly, this Christmas exhibition presents an opportunity of finding something to fit over the side-board of mother's new dining room or to satisfy the natural desire to own something "real", not just a reproduction, with the added hope that the experience of buying a picture will reveal in it qualities and pleasures somehow never discovered in hasty moments spent in a museum. Owning a picture, living with it, seem to develop a familiarity, a pride, and an affection—all of which are attitudes most conducive to realizing its merits whether of technique or of feeling.

Seal Sale Has 220 Replies on First Day

The money raised for the sale of Christmas Seals is used throughout the country to fight tuberculosis. This year, with the return of the service men and women the need is greater than ever and the generous response in Andover is most gratifying.

It has been asked just how many replied to letters sent out. In 1942, 1502 letters were sent out with 1239 replies, over 110 with money. The total returns were \$1517.56. In 1943, 1517 letters were sent out with over 1300 replying and the total returns was \$1660.12.

This year 1540 letters have been sent out. It was interesting to receive 220 replies the first day, one seventh of the total number. Not all replies contained money but those which did were most encouraging. One man sent "one dollar for seals, one dollar for good luck." Another with his annual gift of \$10 note "Best wishes for the success of the campaign." Others write a thank you note for the seals as well as give a contribution.

Four Names Added To Casualty List

One Andover boy is missing in action, another was wounded in France, another is an internee in Switzerland and a fourth is a prisoner in Germany, according to information received this week.

Private Kenneth H. Hart of 28 Wolcott avenue has been missing in action since November 3. His wife now resides in Providence, R. I., and it was there she received her notice on Thanksgiving night. Private Hart came to Andover from Ardmore, Penn., to become the Lawrence branch manager of the Kraft Cheese company. His preliminary training was at Camp Croft, S. C. He served with the infantry in the First Army in France and Belgium.

Pfc. Francis W. O'Connor, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeremiah J. O'Connor of 9 Barnard street, was seriously wounded in France, according to a Thanksgiving day telegram received by his parents from the War Department. His sister, Helen, received a letter dated November 14 from Paris, in which the local soldier stated that he had been wounded in the left arm and that the nerves in his fingers were twisted. An earlier letter to his parents had described the wound as slight, and he expected to go back to the front in a month. The later letter said that he was expecting to be shipped back to England.

Czech Pianist to Present Recital

Andover music lovers will be interested in a recital to be given under the auspices of the American Friends of Czechoslovakia, Friday evening, December 8th at Jordan Hall in Boston. The distinguished Czech pianist, Rudolf Firkusny, will present a program which will include Chopin's B minor Sonata; Bach's C minor Toccata; works by Mozart and Smetana; also first performance of Martinu Fantasy and Rondo.

Before coming to this country, Firkusny had a distinguished record in Europe. Ever since his arrival in the United States, he has taken rank among the elect. Recitals and orchestral appearances in New York, Chicago, and other large cities emphasized his brilliant qualities, both as virtuoso and interpreter.

On his recent South American tour of Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Chile, and Peru, as a result of sold-out auditoriums the quota of recitals was augmented—notably in Buenos Aires, where, instead of the originally scheduled four, he gave fifteen concerts.

Dr. Vera Fishova Beck of the Abbot Academy faculty is actively interested in the recital, and on the committee for the musical program is Mr. Philip R. Allen, prominent Phillips alumnus, and father of Major Philip K. Allen, on leave from the Phillips Academy faculty.

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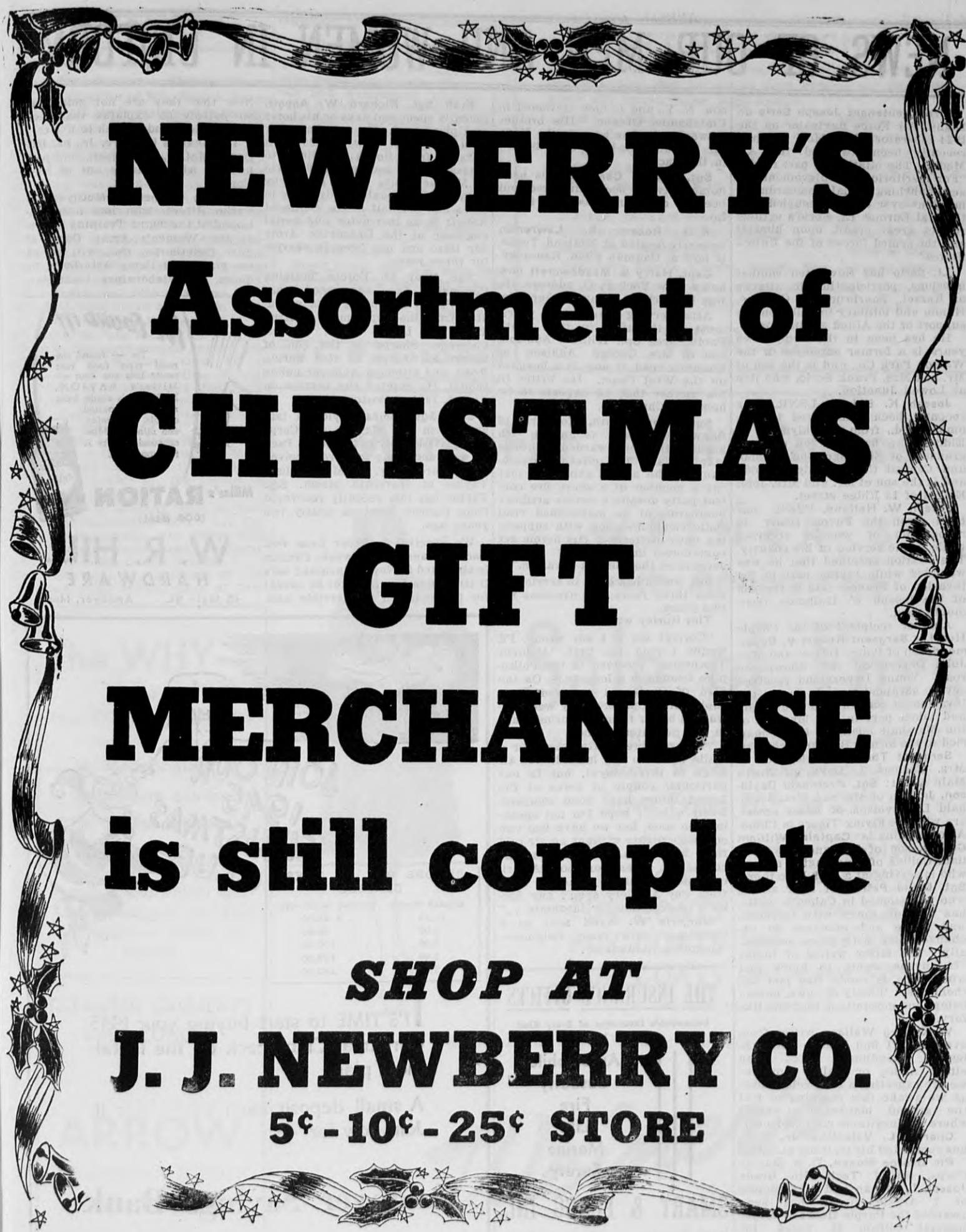

NEWS OF OUR MEN AND WOMEN IN UNIFORM

First Lieutenant Joseph Serio an Eighth Air Force navigator on the B-24 Liberator "Tung Ho," has just recently been awarded the Air Medal. The citation in part reads: "For meritorious achievement in accomplishing aerial bombardment missions over enemy occupied continental Europe. Lt. Serio's actions reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States."

Lt. Serio has flown ten combat missions, participating in attacks on Kassel, Saarbrücken, Cologne, Hamm and military installations in support of the Allied ground forces. He has been in the Army two years, is a former employee of the Watson Park Co., and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Serio, who live at Lowell Junction.

Joseph K. Eldred, USNR, has recently been transferred to Solomons, Md., from Brooklyn, N. Y. Eldred is a fireman, 2nd class, a graduate of St. Augustine's school and Central Catholic high school, and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Eldred of 18 Ridge street.

Joseph W. Holland, USNR, has been given the Purple Heart in recognition of wounds received while in the service of his country. The citation specified that he was wounded while taking part in the invasion of France. He is the son of the Joseph W. Hollands, Dartmouth road.

Another recipient of the Purple Heart is Sergeant Robert V. Deyermund, son of Police Officer and Mrs. John Deyermund of Shawsheen road. Young Deyermund received severe shrapnel wounds during the invasion of Saipan and previously had taken part in the invasion of the Marshall Islands. He is married to the former Barbara Schirner.

Sergeant Thomas Doyle, son of Mrs. Thomas J. Doyle of North Main street; Sgt. Archibald Davidson, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Archibald L. Davidson of Essex street, are with the Flying Tigers in China. Also in China is Captain William Collins, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Collins of Washington avenue who is serving at a B-29 base there. Sgt. David Petrie, of Poor street, who is stationed in Calcutta, India, has been in touch with Davidson and Doyle and manages to exchange notes with them occasionally. The latter writes of India: "If anyone wants to know just what India is really like just tell them this: 'Plenty of cows, human beings and mosquitoes that bite like fury.'"

W. O. Reg Wallace writes from overseas: "I find France better in beauty, friendliness, etc., than either Africa or Italy. However we are expecting a long cold winter as we awake this morning to find the ground blanketed — except where the inevitable mud prolongs."

Charles L. Valenitne, Jr., USN, has completed his training at Sampers. Pfc George Monan, U. S. Marine Corps, son of Tech. 5th Grade Joseph L. Monan and Mrs. Monan of 7 Argyle street, has been awarded the Purple Heart by Major General Clifton B. Cates, for wounds received in the battle of Saipan and Tinian, South Pacific area.

son, N. Y., and is now stationed in Clatskanie, Oregon. His brother Edward, who has been in the Navy for two and one-half years, is now in the Pacific.

Sgt. Roger Corriveau is back home, having been mustered out because of wounds received at St. Lo.

F/O Robert S. Lawrence, formerly located at Midland, Texas, is now at Gadman Field, Kentucky.

Capt. Harry S. Meadowcroft now has a New York P. O. address. He was formerly at Camp Rucker, Ala.

After serving nearly three years, most of the time in the South Pacific area Cpl. William Addison, son of Mrs. George Addison of Chandler road, is now in a hospital on the West Coast. He writes to his mother that he expects to be home for Christmas.

Sgt. Henry Smith, formerly of Shawsheen road, technician 4th grade, has been awarded a bronze star medal. The citation accompanying the award explained that "as a member of a shore fire control party despite a severe artillery bombardment he maintained vital radio communication with supporting naval batteries. His heroic act contributed immeasurably to the success of the Sicilian invasion."

Sgt. Smith has been in service almost three years and overseas for two years.

Tim Hurley writes: "Correct me if I am wrong. I'll wager I read the first 'Andover Townsman' received in the Philippine Islands in a long time. On the 23rd of October I received three copies of the paper. They were forwarded by air from our former base in the Schouten Islands.

"Things were pretty warm for a while when we first landed, (128 air raids in three days), but in our particular couple of acres of the Island things have been comparatively quiet. I hope I'm not speaking too soon, but we have had two complete nights without an air raid from 9:30 p. m. to 4:00 a. m. Of course the flares from both American and Jap Infantry and the blast from our Artillery aren't any doctor's prescription for insomnia."

Marjorie W. Kydd sent us a Christmas card from Belgium — "Gelukkig Nieuwjaar".

Staff Sgt. Richard W. Abbott, recently spent two days at his home on Upland road. He was a member of a crew that flew a B-25 on a mission from South Carolina to Massachusetts and return. The trip to Massachusetts was made by radio beam through cloudy skies in three and one-half hours. Sergeant Abbott is an instructor and aerial engineer at the Greenville Army Air Base and has been in service for three years.

The Army Air Forces Training Command has announced that Pvt. Frederick Sharpe was graduated from the Department of Armament of Lowry Field, Denver, Colorado. Sharpe is the son of Albert E. Sharpe, 58 Red Spring Road, and attended Andover public school. He entered the service on Aug. 2, 1944 at Boston, Mass.

Staff Sgt. James Taylor, a tail-gunner in the Marine Air Corps has arrived safely in the South Pacific area according to word received by his parents Mr. and Mrs. William Taylor of Haverhill street. Sgt. Taylor has just recently recovered from injuries received nearly two years ago.

Her father, who served as mayor was one of the former owners of the Lawrence Opera House before becoming the city's chief executive and one of the outstanding figures in the world of theatricals.

Upon her retirement from the stage a few years ago, Miss Grant became interested in Red Cross work. She gave lectures, radio broadcasts, taught and traveled in the interests of the Red Cross. She was also interested in the housing problem in New York, and worked on these war-time projects up until about a year ago, when her health became impaired. She was a member of the Theatrical Junior League in New York.

Miss Grant's mother and one brother, Alexander L., of Wickford, survive. The funeral was held in St. Paul's Church in Wickford, R. I., with Canon Flisher of the Episcopal Cathedral, Providence, officiating there, and also at Bellevue Cemetery, Lawrence, where interment took place.
