

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
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MERRIMACK COLLEGE OFFERS PUBLIC LECTURE PROGRAM

One of the important books to be added to the library is "Ordeal of the Union," by Allan Nevins, educator, historian, biographer, and since 1931, Professor of American history at Columbia university. The book, in two volumes, opens with the period from the Spring of 1838, when American troops streamed back from Mexico, where victory after victory had added \$50,000 square miles to the Union. For the first time the national domain stretched from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Everything pointed to an era of peace, wealth and happiness. Teachers' Wage Increase Urged **Bv** Federation Pitkin Says Group **Purchasing Power Under 1941 Figure**

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"The purchasing power of teachers' salaries now is 13.8% lower than it was in January 1941," Fred E. Pitkin, research director of the Massachusetts Teachers Federation, and former superintendent of schools in North Andover announced recently. "While the cost of living, according to the index of the Massachusetts Department of Leben and Industries has rises." Labor and Industries, has risen 56.8%, teachers' salaries have increased 35.1%," stated Mr. Pitkin. In comparison to this, factory workers' wages in Massachusetts have increased 95.4%. The per capita income in Massachusetts is estimated to have risen 71.0%.

'While teachers' salaries have increased in some instances," said Mr. Pitkin, "the teachers as a group are still at the bottom of the list." He points out the He points out that school boards are now compiling their 1948 budgets, and if the crisis which still exists in education is to be overcome, they must take cognizance of these facts and stresses that it is time to take action.

While some teachers may be better off, the average teacher has actually lost ground. It is noteworthy that in many places maximum sal-ary scales have increased and in many communities single salary schedules have been adopted. However, emphasis must still be placed on the fact that teachers' salaries are still shamefully low.

"According to the 1947 report of the U. S. subcommittee on the Teacher in America," said Mr. Pit-kin, "salaries are low in relation to the importance of their work and low in relation to earning possibili-ties in other fields. Teachers' sal-aries are low not only in relation to earning possibilities in other professions, but in relation to earnings in fields which require far less preparation."

He commented that if our schools are ever to come back, we must give our immediate financial sup-port to them by providing salaries in keeping with the rising cost of living and worthy of the preparation and training of the teacher





Calling upon a military career man to assume its leadership, Phillips Academy has announced through its board of trustees the election of Col. John Mason Kemper of the U.S. Army General Staff, as 11th headmaster of the 169-yearold school.

Appointment of the 35-year-old West Point graduate and noted historian to succeed Dr. Claude M. Fuess, distinguished scholar who has served 15 years as headmaster and 40 years as a member of the faculty, is a sharp break in tradition for Andover, which, in the past, has sought men of New England background and education.

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EDITORIAL . . . More Christmas Thoughts

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We recently heard a phonograph recording of the great day Sun and for many years past was employed by the Christian Sc.-Dickens' masterpiece, "A Christmas Carol", and heartily recommend listening to this classic on records, or a re-reading of the story. This, if anything, is bound to break down any resistance to the kind of a Christmas spirit that is so valuable in our town. modern times.

Are there still Scrooges in our world today? Well, some, Melrose. even now. But their method of operation is strictly a "short term" type of doing business and in the long run, they are very likely to become casualties. What a blessing for them if the "ghosts" would only visit them as they called on Scrooge that Christmas Eve so vividly depicted in "A Christmas Carol". What was it that finally turned Scrooge from a hardened cynic to a warm, human being? It was the remembrance of his boyhood, of his sudden realization of the plight of others not so fortunate, and the awakening of his own spirit to the happiness that he might have if he would only be a friend to those who needed his help; and change he did to his own great joy and the happiness of others.

What Dickens so beautifully put into this story has made it immortal and an inspiration to millions. We are not going to miss its radio broadcast which has been a Christmas-time feature for years. We only wish that the flood of happiness that came to Scrooge might be something that we all could experience on Christmas, whether we are "Scrooge-like" or not. It can be, if we will think and behave generously and get the spirit that the churches and the Andover festivities should arise in us. If it does, then as Tiny Tim would say "God Bless Us, Every One!"
