# SANTA CLAUS MAIN FEATURE OF ANDOVER'S CHRISTMAS PARADE

*School Band, Floats, and Old Fashioned Vehicles To Make the March Down Main Street*

The parade on Tuesday afternoon, December 23, one of the features of Andover's Old Fashioned Christmas, will assemble at the corner of School and Main streets about 3 p. m. proceed down Main street, make a circuit of the square, and wind up in front of the town hall. Santa will lead the line of march, the school band will be in full regalia, and the floats entered by various groups of young people, to be exhibited in the various stores from December 21 to December 23, will be included.

Dr. Nathaniel Stowers, chairman of the parade committee, is on the lookout for old sleighs, wagons, carriages, or automobiles, and anyone in possession of an old-fashioned vehicle is asked to communicate with him.

The committee in charge of costumes, headed by Irma Beane, is scouting around for old-fashioned regalia to be worn by salespeople in local stores from December 21 on. Everyone in the spirit of the Festival will also don antique garments in which to do those last minute shopping details.

The Andover Historical society will award a prize for the best old-fashioned costume, to be judged at 9:00 p. m. on December 23, in front of the town hall.

The pageant intitled "Symbols of Christmas", by Miss Ethel Tewksbury, which will be presented by children from all over town on Sunday afternoon, December 21 in the Memorial Auditorium at 3:00 p. m., will be broadcast over a local radio station. The pageant is sponsored by the Parent Teacher associations in town.

Christmas doorways will also be judged on Sunday, December 21. The Garden Club offers a prize to the nonmember with the most original doorway, and contestants are asked to contact Mrs. Charles H. Hollis, 69 Salem street. The November club has offered a prize for the best decorated storefront, and the judges will be making the rounds over the weekend, December 19, 20 and 21.

The Shawsheen Village Woman's club has offered a prize for the best decorated inside Christmas tree, and the judging on this competition will take place on Tuesday afternoon, December 23. Entrants should communicate with Mrs. Edwin Bramley or Mrs. Carleton Shulze.

Donald Dunn is acting as intermediary at the schools between the Christmas committee and the various groups entering floats in the competition sponsored by the merchants, and Carl Gahan and Mr. Hinckley have been supervising the work on decorations carried on in the school work shops.

Bundles for Andover, England, may be deposited in front of the town hall starting on Monday, December 22, with special emphasis on money donations which will be used by the committee to buy CARE packages to be sent to Andover, England. Douglas Byers heads this committee.

Sketches of old Andover are daily being broadcast over the air

waves at 10:30 in the morning. One of the programs tells of John Woodbridge coming from Boston to buy "Cochickewick" from the Indians for six pounds sterling, or approximately thirty dollars, (plus a worn coat!) an area which today includes both Andover and North Andover. Another sketch tells of the founding of Abbot academy, and another, of later origin, describes the selectmen of the town in their capacity as the chamber of commerce, offering 20 acres of land to anyone willing to set up a mill on the Shawsheen River.

The story of the writing of "Holy Night" is told to the strains of favorite Christmas carols, and the advent of the Christmas card of today, originated in 1875, has been related.

The Christmas tree at the north end of Elm Square, sponsored for many years by the Andover Service club, was lighted for the first time last Friday night, and the town hall lights and decorated tree were ablaze with color the same night.



## MERRIMACK COLLEGE OFFERS PUBLIC LECTURE PROGRAM

During the coming winter and spring a series of public lectures under the auspices of Merrimack College will be delivered in St. Mary's Auditorium, Lawrence, Mass., it was announced by the college president, Very Rev. Vincent A. McQuade, O. S. A., Ph. D. It is hoped that the lectures will become a regular yearly feature of the college's extra-curricular activities, and it is anticipated that many persons in the entire Merrimack Valley will derive a great deal of enjoyment and intellectual profit as result.

## "Ordeal of the Union"

One of the important books to be added to the library is "Ordeal of the Union," by Allan Nevins, educator, historian, biographer, and since 1931, Professor of American history at Columbia university. The book, in two volumes, opens with the period from the Spring of 1838, when American troops streamed back from Mexico, where victory after victory had added 850,000 square miles to the Union. For the first time the national domain stretched from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Everything pointed to an era of peace, wealth and happiness. Yet within thirteen years, the country was plunged into the bloodiest civil war of history. And why? It is to answer this question that "Ordeal of the Union" has been written.

This thrilling narrative of a colorful period of American history was awarded the Scribner American History award.

## New Books

**Our Flowering World** Platt  
Chapters one through four are introductory and lay the foundation for the rest, which tell the story of the formation of the plants of our day through the Coal Age, the Drifting Continents and the Ice Age. The last eight chapters deal with the pattern of our countryside today, showing how our trees and flowers have traveled around the world to reach their present location. There are 168 photographs by the author, thirty-eight of which are in full color.

**Prophet in the Wilderness** Hagedorn

A vivid and sympathetic biography of Albert Schweitzer, an intellectual giant of our times. One of the greatest organists of Europe, foremost living authority on Bach, doctor of medicine, theology, philosophy and music, and above all else a Christian who believes that the only happy man is he who seeks and finds how to serve mankind.

**Speaking Frankly** Byrnes  
A full report of Byrnes' efforts, as Secretary of State, to get a people's peace through international conferences. Here are the things said at Yalta, and Potsdam,

and the London Conference of 1945, at the Moscow and Paris conference and the Council of Foreign Ministers in 1946. Personal, humorous, much of it made public for the first time, it offers a way out of the international tangle.

**Off My Sea Chest** Conarroe

A book "written for everyone who has ever yearned to take 180 pounds of uniformed red tape, and push; a composite and hilarious gripe by a man who knows what he's griping about." It is actually a book that debunks certain aspects of the Navy, and is intended for everyone who meant to write something like it "after the war."

**Marriage Is on Trial** Sbarbaro

How can marriage be made to last? This book is the answer as seen by a judge on the divorce bench of the largest court in the world — Cook County, Illinois. He stresses similarity of background — racial, religious, educational — as one of the strongest features. He admits he is a die-hard when it comes to dissolving marriage ties for those who come before him. Plenty of practical common sense, based on sound thinking and long observation.

**Father and the Angels** Manners

A man's portrait of his father as it cuts its impression in his boyhood. An unusual book of the relationship of young and old, sincerely expressed.

**Changing the Curriculum** Miel

An outlined attempt to close the gap between theory and practice

## Teachers' Wage Increase Urged By Federation

**Pitkin Says Group Purchasing Power Under 1941 Figure**

"The purchasing power of teachers' salaries now is 13.8% lower than it was in January 1941," Fred E. Pitkin, research director of the Massachusetts Teachers Federation, and former superintendent of schools in North Andover announced recently. "While the cost of living, according to the index of the Massachusetts Department of Labor and Industries, has risen 56.8%, teachers' salaries have increased 35.1%," stated Mr. Pitkin. In comparison to this, factory workers' wages in Massachusetts have increased 95.4%. The per capita income in Massachusetts is estimated to have risen 71.0%.

"While teachers' salaries have increased in some instances," said Mr. Pitkin, "the teachers as a group are still at the bottom of the list." He points out that school boards are now compiling their 1948 budgets, and if the crisis which still exists in education is to be overcome, they must take cognizance of these facts and stresses that it is time to take action.

While some teachers may be better off, the average teacher has actually lost ground. It is noteworthy that in many places maximum salary scales have increased and in many communities single salary schedules have been adopted. However, emphasis must still be placed on the fact that teachers' salaries are still shamefully low.

"According to the 1947 report of the U. S. subcommittee on the Teacher in America," said Mr. Pitkin, "salaries are low in relation to the importance of their work and low in relation to earning possibilities in other fields. Teachers' salaries are low not only in relation to earning possibilities in other professions, but in relation to earnings in fields which require far less preparation."

He commented that if our schools are ever to come back, we must give our immediate financial support to them by providing salaries in keeping with the rising cost of living and worthy of the preparation and training of the teacher

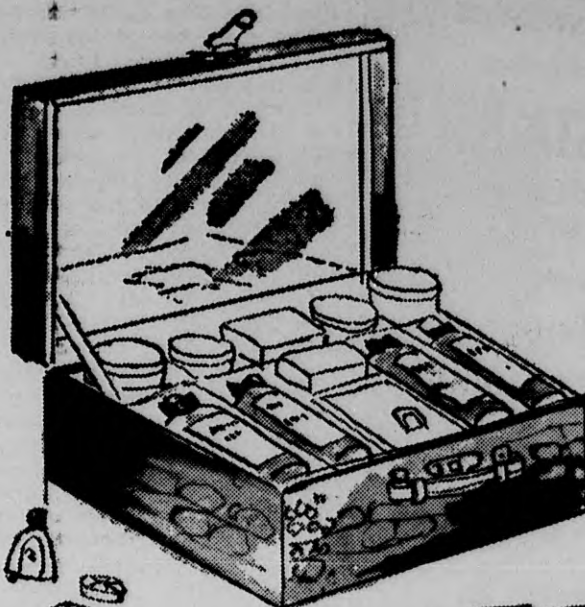

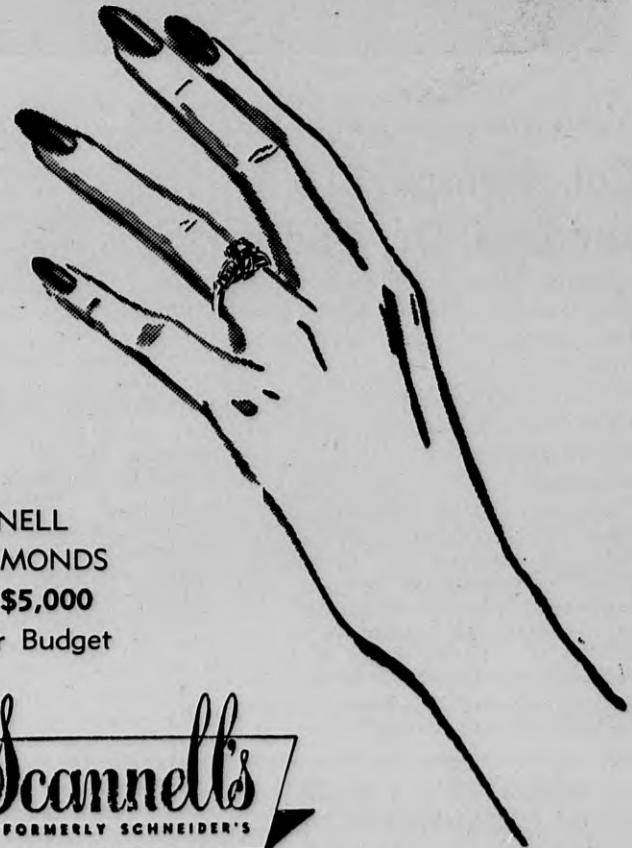

# Academy Elects New Headmaster

## Col. Kemper To Succeed Dr. Fuess

Calling upon a military career man to assume its leadership, Phillips Academy has announced through its board of trustees the election of Col. John Mason Kemper of the U. S. Army General Staff, as 11th headmaster of the 169-year-old school.

Appointment of the 35-year-old West Point graduate and noted historian to succeed Dr. Claude M. Fuess, distinguished scholar who has served 15 years as headmaster and 40 years as a member of the faculty, is a sharp break in tradition for Andover, which, in the past, has sought men of New England background and education.

Announcement of the election of Col. Kemper by the trustees at a meeting December 4, was made by Bishop Henry W. Hobson of Cincinnati, president of the board of trustees. Acceptance of the appointment will depend upon the War Department's acceptance of Col. Kemper's resignation.

Col. Kemper, a graduate of the United States Military Academy in the class of 1935 is executive assistant to the chief historian, Historical division, Special Staff, U. S. A., and is chiefly responsible for the organization of the War Department's historical program, which involved the coordination of the work of some 500 historians.

Col. Kemper, who was born at Fort D. A. Russell, Wyo., in 1912, is the son of Col. and Mrs. James B. Kemper, U.S.A. He received his early schooling on various Army posts and his secondary education at Manchester, N. H., Manila, P. I., and Washington, D. C. He was cadet regimental adjutant and president of the Class of 1935 at West Point.

After Army service for three years, during which time he organized a coaching school for enlisted men at Fort Benjamin Harrison and taught mathematics, his-

tory and English, he spent a year at the Fort Benning Infantry school, and then returned to West Point in 1939 as instructor in history. Meanwhile he received the degree of A.M. in history from Columbia university, and did graduate work at Harvard in Far Eastern history. At the beginning of World War II, Col. Kemper was assigned to the Military Intelligence division and was personal assistant to Gen. George Strong, then assistant chief of staff for Military Intelligence.

In the spring of 1943 Col. Kemper became secretary of the committee which set up the War Department's historical program and in that summer, when the program was established, he became its director, an office which involved coordinating all historical work of the Army, and preparing a large-scale history of World War II. By 1944 the historical division, largely through his efforts, had placed field historical teams totalling nearly 300 men in all theatres of operations to accompany ground and air forces and to collect source materials by the then novel technique of interview in the field.

By the end of 1946 a preliminary series of 12 monographs on combat operations had been pub-

lished; still others are nearing completion, and, for the first time, the United States will have a full and adequate history of recent military experiences and problems. Col. Kemper's colleagues are unanimous in their praise of his skill and leadership in coordinating this huge effort. Dr. Charles H. Taylor, Lea professor of European history at Harvard, said: "I have never in my personal experience worked in a group animated by better morale and the key of this spirit was his (Col. Kemper's) leadership."

Late in 1944 Col. Kemper was assigned at his request to overseas combat duty, and was appointed head of the Analysis and Methods office of the Mediterranean theatre of operations. For the successful performance of this major administrative task, he was awarded an Oak Leaf Cluster in lieu of a second Legion of Merit medal. Col. Kemper brings to his new position not only the practical experience in classroom problems which he acquired before the last World War, but also the administrative skill which he demonstrated in supervising the vast work of research, correlation and production of the War Department's historical division.

## Seal Committee Receipts Increased Over Last Year

Mrs. Elbert Weaver, chairman of the Andover Christmas Seal committee, announced today that during the first twelve selling days of the Christmas Seal sale \$1,468.10 had been received for the anti-tuberculosis work of the Essex County Health Association. This amount is an increase of \$37.85 over that received during the same time last year. Mrs. Weaver said she was pleased with this increase and hoped that the generous Christmas spirit of Andover people would carry the Andover campaign to a successful conclusion.

Mrs. Weaver also reported that according to an article in the Newark Sunday News, the design of this year's seal, which will be sold throughout most of the English speaking world, was born in an attic studio in an 100-year-old house in Bergen County, N. J.

"Raymond Lufkin, a quiet, unassuming man with a remarkable resemblance to President Truman," the News article continues, "designed the little adhesive poster which will travel throughout the world to help say Merry Christmas."

"From the front door of the Lufkin home up to the garret studio the home-like charm reflects simplicity, the theme of this year's seal. Seeing Lufkin in his surroundings and then seeing the seal, which shows a pair of oxen pulling across a snowy slope a sled laden with Christmas trees, one feels immediately the simple, unaffected touch is so apparent everywhere in the colonial house at 116 West Clinton avenue" in Tenafly.

"Lufkin was given the commission to do the 1947 seal about 2½ years ago, to allow time for revision."

"Asked how he arrived at the decision to sketch oxen pulling Christmas trees as the theme for the 1947 tuberculosis campaign seal, Lufkin said: 'That is hard to say. One does not just decide. Something clicks and comes to mind.'

"He told of recalling vividly how as a small boy he visited an uncle in snow-covered Nova Scotia and found that the great oxen in the barn were not frightening animals as he first assumed but rather gentle beasts of burden, a necessary part of farm life, and that among their duties was pulling Yuletide trees and greens from the forest across snow-laden lands to the firesides."

## FIREMEN SEEK REDUCED HOURS

Local firemen are circulating petitions to reduce their 70 hour week to a 48-hour department work week, following a meeting held at the fire station on Thursday, December 11, when the majority of fire department employees voted to seek the reduced work week at the annual town election in March.

A spokesman for the department stated Thursday that the petition were put into circulation on December 15, but that a concentrated effort in obtaining signatures would not be made until it will be necessary to secure the signatures of ten per cent of the town's voters in order to have the matter placed on the

ballot. The town has 6,290 eligible voters.

These petitions must be submitted to the town clerk, on or before January 29, 1948, in order to have the matter, Section 58B Laws, placed on the annual ballot.

Lawrence voters accepted the shorter work-week by an overwhelming majority at last week's election.

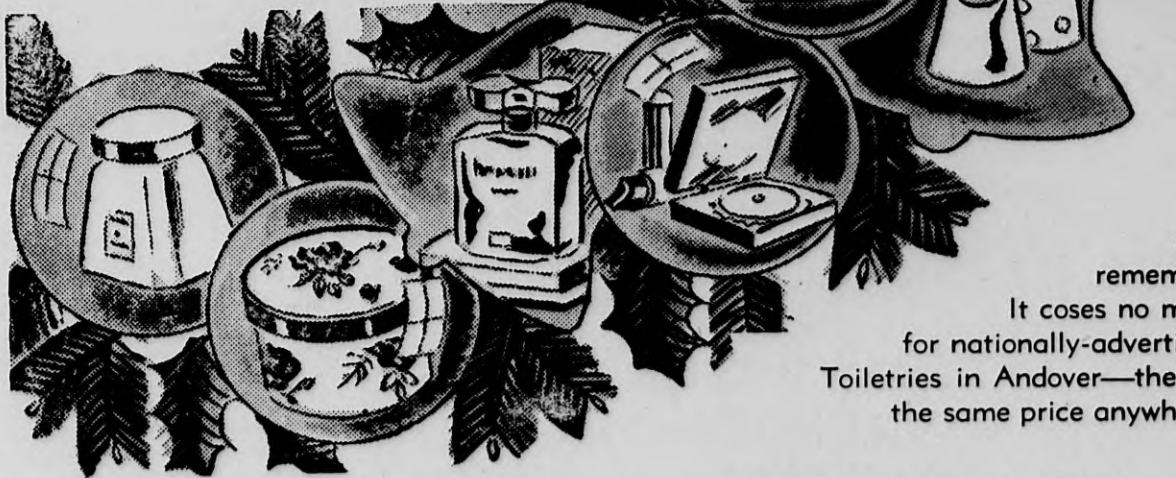

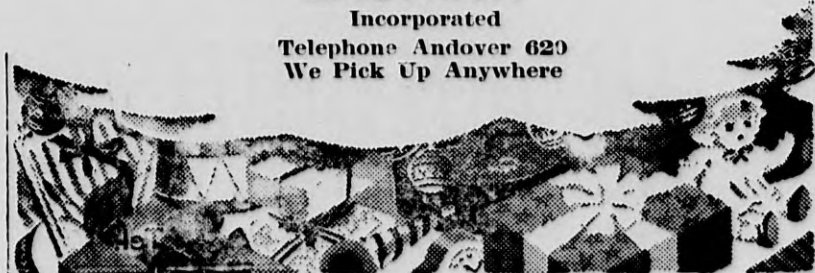

## EDITORIAL . . . More Christmas Thoughts

We recently heard a phonograph recording of the great Dickens' masterpiece, "A Christmas Carol", and heartily recommend listening to this classic on records, or a re-reading of the story. This, if anything, is bound to break down any resistance to the kind of a Christmas spirit that is so valuable in our modern times.

Are there still Scrooges in our world today? Well, some, even now. But their method of operation is strictly a "short term" type of doing business and in the long run, they are very likely to become casualties. What a blessing for them if the "ghosts" would only visit them as they called on Scrooge that Christmas Eve so vividly depicted in "A Christmas Carol". What was it that finally turned Scrooge from a hardened cynic to a warm, human being? It was the remembrance of his boyhood, of his sudden realization of the plight of others not so fortunate, and the awakening of his own spirit to the happiness that he might have if he would only be a friend to those who needed his help; and change he did to his own great joy and the happiness of others.

What Dickens so beautifully put into this story has made it immortal and an inspiration to millions. We are not going to miss its radio broadcast which has been a Christmas-time feature for years. We only wish that the flood of happiness that came to Scrooge might be something that we all could experience on Christmas, whether we are "Scrooge-like" or not. It can be, if we will think and behave generously and get the spirit that the churches and the Andover festivities should arise in us. If it does, then as Tiny Tim would say "God Bless Us, Every One!"

## FIRE PREVENTION STRESSED BY SERVICE CLUB SPEAKER

*Disposal of Matches and Cigarettes Cause the Largest Percentage of Fires*

Percy Bugbee, general manager of the National Fire Prevention association since 1939, was the guest speaker at the dinner meeting of the Andover Service club, held at the Andover Inn on Thursday, December 11. Dinner was served at 6:15 p. m.

Two new members were welcomed into the club at the meeting, Ralph A. Kimball, Appletree lane, and Frederick M. Kimball, 66 Bartlet street.

Mr. Bugbee brought to his audience a wealth of information on fires and fire prevention which stimulated a lively question period and made the meeting one of the most interesting enjoyed by the club in recent months.

In full charge of the administrative affairs of the NFPA, he has visited the principal cities of the United States and Canada and obtained a thorough working knowledge of fire protection and fire prevention through personal contact with officials in numerous parts of both.

In his discussion of fire prevention methods he stated that the greatest causes of dwelling fires are the disposal of the lighted match and the cigarette butt. The dwelling loss of 750 million for 1947, he pointed out, is the largest in history, with 4500 fires every day, of which 1000 are in homes, with most deaths and injuries to women and children.

Hotels experience their greatest difficulties with inebriates and cigarettes, he said, adding that it was not uncommon for some of the larger ones to have as many as six or seven hundred little fires in the course of a year.

Most fires are caused by simple things, he declared, and it is difficult to make most people realize it because of the it-won't-happen-to-me attitude which they assume. It is unfortunate, he added, that it still seems to take serious losses to make the public realize many of the hazards, which, if eliminated, would have prevented disasters.

Mr. Bugbee graduated from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1920, entering the employ of the association in April, 1921. He was appointed first field engineer in 1924, when the field service was initiated.

In this capacity, he visited the principal cities throughout the United States and Canada, obtaining a working knowledge of fire protection and fire prevention work through personal contact throughout the entire North American continent. He has been connected with the publication of "Firemen," the NFPA paper which he developed, since 1933.

During the war, in addition to carrying on the activities of the association, Mr. Bugbee took an active part in war work in Washington, serving as chairman of the War Department Advisory Council on Fire Prevention and as a member of a special board on fire prevention appointed by the Under Secretary of War. He also served as chairman of the Industrial Protection Council of the United States Office of Civilian Defense.

In addition to holding office in numerous national, international, and local fire groups, Mr. Bugbee is the author of many articles on fire protection in popular and technical publications, and has made lectures and addresses on fire protection and prevention in all parts of the United States and Canada.

Harold Haseltine, chairman of Andover's Old-Fashioned Christmas committee, made a report on progress of the local festival to date. The Christmas program, which was initiated in the Service club, has really caught fire, according to the chairman, and everyone in town has proved very cooperative in furthering the plans of the committee. He mentioned the collection of donations of money and clothing which will be sent to Andover, England.

"For being late for a battle, Thucydides was 'cashiered' and exiled to enough leisure and objectivity to give us the earliest known critical history as distinguished from the chronicles and compilations usual before his time. His uncompleted 'History of the Peloponnesian War' (to 411 B.C.) is concerned with the twenty-seven years of strife (431-404 B.C.) between Athens and Sparta. By his accuracy, he hoped to extract lessons useful for the future. 'I have written my work,' he says, 'not as an essay to win the applause of the moment, but as a possession for all time.' His history has lived and set the standard for good historical writing."

This is the way Robert Kingery, readers' adviser of the New York Public Library, describes the background of the book to be read in a discussion group here at the Memorial Hall library early in the new year. Mr. Alston Chase of the Phillips Academy faculty will lead the group. Any person interested is urged to call the library for further information, Andover 314.

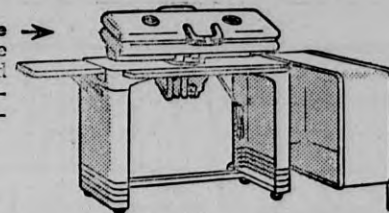

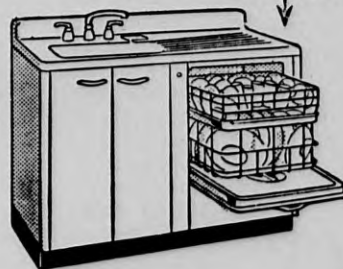

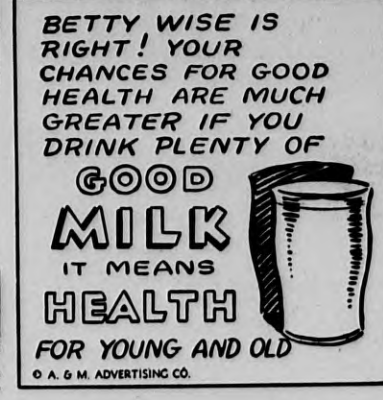
