PLAY AND PAGEANT OPEN CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL



Program Enjoyed by Capacity Audience

Before a large appreciative audience Andover's first real old-fashioned Christmas festival program was opened Sunday afternoon when pupils of the various public schools presented a play and pageant in the Memorial auditorium.

The capacity crowd that was attracted to the presentation included various town officials, members of the school committee, presidents of the Central, Ballardvale and Shawsheen Parent-Teachers associations, and the P. T. A. council, Miss Ethel H. Tewksbury, who wrote the pageant, "Symbols of Christmas," and Vincent Treanor of the Christmas committee. They occupied a reserved section in the auditorium.

Members of the Junior high school dramatic club under the direction of Miss Mabel Marshall presented the three-act play "The Birds' Christmas Carol," by Kate Douglas Wiggin. This group displayed unusual talent in the various roles, while Lucille Spinella was outstanding in the part of Mrs. Ruggles. The play was very well received and elicited much favorable comment from the audience.

The pageant by Miss Tewksbury was presented by pupils of the Stowe choral society under the direction of Miss Catherine Barrett, assisted by the teachers. The musical part of the program, which was broadcast, was under the direction of Mr. Marion McArdle.

Talented singers of the school, which comprises fourth to sixth grade pupils, were exceptionally good in their singing and speaking parts and held the attention of the audience as they progressed through the various stages of the scenes which built up to the closing Manger scene. The costumes of the girls in pastel shades, and those of the boys as shepherds in more somber hues, added a colorful backdrop to the presentation.

Shawsheen Woman's club — best decorated Christmas tree—won by Mrs. R. W. Maynard, 1 Jensen road,

YOUNGSTERS THRILLED BY SANTA'S VISIT

Swarm About Him As He Arrives In Town With Gifts

Santa Claus arrived in Andover Tuesday afternoon and amid the hubbub of exciting gasps and cheers from starry-eyed youngsters, proceeded to take the leading role in the town's old-fashioned Christmas festival.

And what a reception he received!

Carrying a great pack of good things the jolly old gentleman landed safely on Main street at Chapel avenue just at 3 o'clock where he received a hearty welcome from townsfolk who had eagerly awaited his arrival.

Of course he did not have his famous reindeer with him on Tuesday's trip, for he had left his legendary team of Dasher and Dancer, Prancer and Vixen, Comet and Cupid, Donner and Blitzen, at his North Pole workshop to rest up for the big workout of Christmas eve.

Old King Winter heard of Andover's celebration too, and he co-operated by spreading a flaky white blanket of snow over the town to add a real Christmas-card winter setting to the festivities.

His contribution was greatly enjoyed by the young folk but it was a little too deep and blustery for certain features that had been planned.

The Punchard high school girls' band had to cancel its appearance, but Harold Phinney supplied a sound truck for the occasion. Several horses were to have been used on the old-fashioned car-

riages but as they were unprepared for snow and were without caulks it was decided not to use them.

But Santa was welcome, just the same, as he came prepared to do something special for his little friends in Andover, even though it was two days before Christmas.

With a merry laugh and a wave of his hand he hopped into a ready pung and started down Main street with an escort that comprised the sound truck, townspeople in vehicles of ancient vintage, and an array of floats made by school boys and other organizations.

That part of the parade made of the groups in costume riding in antique carriages added a distinctive old-fashioned touch to the festivities, but again the driving snow and wind curtailed some of this feature, as several persons in somewhat flimsy creations of the past could not brave the elements under those conditions. However, an old-fashioned opera coach, a doctor's buggy, a Brougham, a Victoria, and a Democrat was moved along in line, other vehicles having to be left out because of the decision not to use horses.

But as Santa came along he was surrounded by a swarm of young admirers who followed him as he circled the square and returned to the town hall. Here he established temporary headquarters and as the youngsters gathered around him, he opened his pack and drew forth packages of fruit and candies which he distributed with lavish hand.

His actions were cheered to the echo by the hundreds milling about him, but as they drew their gifts they slowly started homeward allowing Santa to hurry back to the North Pole to get ready for his big journey on Christmas eve.

Subjects included during the instruction periods are those for automotive mechanic, second echelon; boilermaker, carpenter, heavy construction steam-fitter, rigger, ships carpenter, amphibious truck mechanic, marine engine mechanic, shipfitter, locomotive mechanic, diesel or steam; and marine oiler.

The ordnance school at the Aberdeen proving grounds, Md., is also available. Among the subjects offered are; machinist, combination welder, ordnance parts clerk, watchrepairman, small arms weapons mechanic, track and wheel vehicle electrician, light artillery mechanic, fire control repairman and fuel induction mechanic.

Old-Fashioned Festival To Be Annual Event

Its Varied Features Contributed To Making Christmas a Merry One

Andover's first real old-fashioned Christmas festival has successfully passed into history with a memorable program that contributed in a large measure to make the 300th Christmas since the founding of the town an outstanding community event.

Sponsored by the Andover Service club and gotten under way only a few short weeks ago, the idea quickly spread, as numerous groups including churches, schools and clubs caught the spirit of the affair and joined with the sponsors with an enthusiasm which resulted in the delightful community Yuletide festival enjoyed by young and old alike.

A gaily decorated Main street and town house, attractively decorated stores and homes, Christmas carols, church services, radio programs, a pageant and play, townspeople in old-fashioned costumes, and, last but not least, the arrival of Santa Claus, all blended into an enjoyable program that sponsors enthusiastically predict will mark the first of a series of such annual events.

Preliminary stages of the program included a series of radio broadcasts from Stations WLAW and WCCM which brought to surrounding communities word pictures of the town's historic past and glorious present, and stirred up among neighboring towns considerable interest which attracted many visitors to the festivities during the past several days.

The festival program actually got underway Sunday afternoon with a play and pageant by pupils of the public schools in the Memorial au-

ditorium. The musical part of the program was broadcast by Stations WCCM and WLAW, and was re-broadcast Christmas morning.

In the evening the different churches held Christmas services which terminated at eight o'clock when all gathered in front of the town hall to join in singing Christmas carols under the direction of Mrs. Marion McArdle, assisted by Miss Jean Murray. The singers were accompanied by music from the organ in the Masonic Lodge hall in the Bank Building across the street, played by Irving Wilkinson.

As the group broke up they left the square by different routes singing carols to the shut-ins as they wended their ways homeward.

Monday was Children's Carol Singing Day. Starting at 10 a. m., with a group from the Pike school, various groups from the Stowe, Punchard, Barnard, Shawsheen and Ballardvale schools accompanied by their teachers, raised their voices in the many beautiful carols of Christmas under Mrs. McArdle's direction. The group singing in the morning and again in the afternoon drew much favorable comment from the hundreds who stopped at different times during the day to enjoy the concert.

In the evening a similar program of carol solos was sung by Irene Yancey and Mrs. Benjamin Lawrence, accompanied by Irving Wilkinson on the organ.

Monday also brought to the attention of the townspeople and others attracted to the business section, a group of clerks and residents of the town in the old-fashioned costumes of many years ago. Their presence in various stores and frequent

appearances along the streets in the gay rigs of great-grandmothers' days lent some of that Currier and Ives' atmosphere to the festival that rivaled the co-called "New Look" of 1947. The persons in costume wore their antiquated garments during the last three days of the festival, and from the remarks heard on all sides it is safe to say that in another year more attics will be rummaged for similar heirlooms to enable more townspeople to join in the festival spirit of the occasion.

Then on Tuesday Santa Claus came to town! The appearance of this jolly old gentleman high-lighted the festivities and brought great numbers of youngsters and their parents to witness the welcome he got as he made his way along Main street to the square and the town hall, where he held an impromptu reception and distributed favors among the horde of his young friends who were there to greet him.

Owing to the over-exuberant co-operation of Old King Winter the carol singing Tuesday night was postponed. Announcement of the various prize winners was broadcast Wednesday morning.

The floats entered in the Santa Claus escort by school children, presented numerous ideas and drew much favorable comment from spectators. The floats were restricted to a length of five feet by two-and-a-half feet wide, and a limit of \$10 for expenses in making them. These were constructed by the manual training class, and by other special organizations.

The school department, through the co-operation of Supt. Kenneth L. Sherman aided in the seasonal decorations of Main street and the square, by constructing the big stars that were used to trim the tops of electric light poles, and providing the backdrop for the bleachers at the town hall. This work was supervised by Carl Gahan and Irving Hinckley with the co-operation of Eugene V. Lovely, principal of the High school, and Milton Nelson, principal of the Junior high.

Chief Buchan and members of the fire department aided materially in the work of providing a Christmas setting for the festival by assisting in the wiring of all decorations and setting up the big Christmas tree with the ladder truck. The police department under Chief George A. Dane co-operated in every phase of the program and did their usual good job at various times and places where crowds gathered.

On Tuesday night the committee in charge of the Bundles for Britain sent a cablegram to the Mayor and Mayoress of Andover, England, giving the town's greetings to its overseas namesake and informing them of the anticipated arrival of the money and packages of food gathered and forwarded during the Yule season. The cablegram was as follows:

Mayor Young and Mayoress Sainsbury, Andover, Hampshire county, England:

The townsmen of Andover, Massachusetts, all join in wishing a Merry Christmas to all your townspeople, with hopes for a better and brighter New Year. Please expect a small token present for the needy of your town which

The outstanding success of Andover's first old-fashioned Christmas festival was due to the co-operation of several groups. It was sponsored by the Andover Service Club and funds for the project were raised by public subscription, and from merchants and interested people of the town. Harold E. Heseltine was chairman of the committee. He was assisted by Vincent Treanor, Donald B. Look, Dr. Nathaniel Stowers, Mrs. Ida M. Rackel, John M. Murray, Stanley Swanton, Edward Romeo, Irma Beene, Thaxter Eaton, Mrs. Marion McArdle, Miss Mary Angus and Jean Murray.

The Bundles for Britain committee included the Rev. Henry B. Smith, O.S.A., the Rev. John G. Gaskill of the West Parish Church, and Douglas Byers. The Finance committee comprised Chester W. Holland and Louis S. Finger; while J. K. Lilly III and Miss Betty Buchan took care of publicity. George Baker did the wiring for Christmas lights along the business section; Phillips Academy donated the bleachers used in front of the town hall by the carollers; Mr. and Mrs. Glen Grant donated the sleigh used in front of the town hall for donations; and Mr. Dinsmore donated the many old-fashioned vehicles used Tuesday afternoon in escorting Santa Claus along Main street to the square and back to the town hall.

The Garden Club donated prizes for the best doorway, one for a member and one for a non-member; the November Club offered an award for the best interior store decoration. A cup given by the Merchants Committee will be a perpetuating prize, to be passed along from year to year. The Andover Historical Society donated prizes for the best costumes, one for the best man's and one for the best woman's. Cups for the four best floats in the Santa reception were donated by the Old-Fashioned Christmas Committee.

All in all it added up to make the 1947 Christmas season a real merry one.

The Judge's Story Morgan
Using an old theme of a judge ruined by a rich man's conniving, this philosophical novel of the struggle between good and evil, set in the 1930 period of English life, is a quiet but compelling story. Charles Morgan wrote "The Fountain" and "Sparkenbroke."

Unconquered Swanson
Although the story opens in a small London Village, it gains in momentum until the climax breaks in the siege of Fort Pitt. This long sweeping novel of the Ohio River region in the mid-eighteenth century is the most vivid picture of the Pontiac conspiracy and the bitter days when Pennsylvania was a battle-ground for the colonists, fighting to save their families and homes from the Indian raiders. The author is well-known for his historical novels, among which are "The Judas Tree", "The Phantom Emperor" and "Forbidden Ground."

Mortimer Steel, the little waterfront boy, found a tremendous power could be his if he joined forces with the sea to build himself a fortune.

Came A Cavalier Keyes

This Is Pearl! Millis

Navy Establishes New Study Units

Navy education service units have been established in seven overseas branches of the United States Armed Forces Institute to speed up the service and better accommodate a more than doubled percentage of Naval personnel participating in off-duty classroom and self-study courses during the last year.

The Navy units, each under an officer in charge, have been established at USAFI branches in Tokyo, Manila, Guam, Honolulu, Seattle (for Alaska), Balboa, Canal Zone, and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Currently, about 12 per cent of all Naval personnel participate in the educational program through organized classes aboard ships and stations, through self-study courses, through USAFI correspondence courses, or through correspondence courses offered by 59 co-operating colleges and universities.

Prior to assuming duties at branch offices, Naval officers so assigned are indoctrinated in testing methods, counselling techniques, and general educational procedures.

Lone Gunman Kidnaps Four

Also Assaults Lawrence Man

A lone gunman kidnapped a local policeman, a Lawrence couple and their three year-old daughter in Shawsheen square early Monday morning after brutally assaulting a Lawrence motorist with whom he had hitchhiked a ride.

After a night of terror with the wild-eyed gun toter through Lowell, Littleton and Lexington to West Boylston and Worcester the four were released unharmed.

The apparently purposeless abduction climaxed a series of events which started shortly before 2 a. m. when Frank Wholey of Law-

rence stopped his car at Broadway and Essex street. Lawrence, to give a young hitchhiker a ride.

According to the motorist, he had gone no further than the O'Leary bridge when the young man leaped into the back seat and started hitting him over the head with the butt of a revolver. He hit Wholey several times. Reaching Shawsheen square the motorist jammed on his brakes, opened the door and leaped from the car, which went up over a curb.

Officer William J. Stewart was making his rounds in the square and saw the car go up on the curb just as another auto with Mr. and Mrs. Michael Sarkissian of Lawrence, and their daughter approached and stopped.

Believing an accident had happened Officer Stewart and Sarkissian went to help Wholey when the gun-waving hitchhiker stepped from around the car, put his weapon into the officer's back and disarmed him, then at gun point forced Sarkissian, his wife and child into Sarkissian's car. Making the Lawrence man take the wheel the gunman directed the drive until they reached West Boylston where in a lonely wooded area he put officer Stewart, and mother and child out of the car and drove off with Sarkissian. The latter he dropped at Worcester. The car was later found abandoned in Concord.

Wholey was taken to the Burke Memorial hospital in Lawrence where 20 stitches were taken to close the wounds on his head. His condition is reported as fair.

A state-wide police search is underway for the gunman.

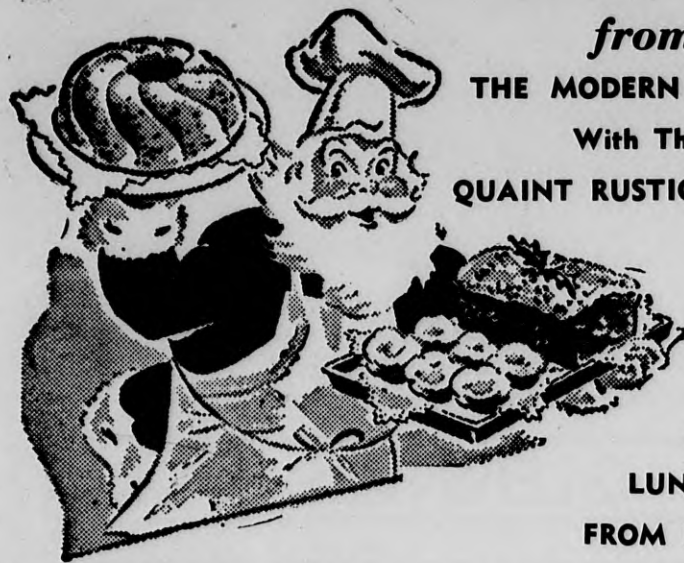

All individuals, partnerships, associations or trusts, and corporations, residents of, or owning property located in, this town are hereby notified that they are required to bring in to the Local Board of Assessors in the form prescribed by Henry F. Long, Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31, 1948

TRUE LISTS OF POLLS AND PROPERTY, as follows:
ON FORM OF LIST 2
POLLS — MALE INHABITANTS above the age of 20 on January 1, 1948, whether citizens of the United States or aliens, are liable for a poll tax.

Males between the ages of 20 and 21 are to be reported by, and in the place of residence of, their parents or guardians. If such a male minor has no parent or guardian in Massachusetts, he is personally liable for a poll tax as if he were of full age.

Any male inhabitant 21 years of age or over who is under guardianship is to be reported by his guardian in the place where such guardian is taxed for his own poll.
PERSONAL ESTATE—ALL PERSONAL PROPERTY SUBJECT TO TAXATION is required to be listed under the items given on Form of List 2.

RESIDENTS need not include INTANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY the income from which, if any, is included in a Massachusetts Income Tax Return filed in the same year.

NON-RESIDENTS, including certain foreign insurance companies, and foreign corporations which are engaged exclusively in interstate commerce, are NOT entitled to an exemption on account of TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY, which includes ALL MERCHANDISE, TOOLS, EQUIPMENT, FURNITURE and FIXTURES.

Note.—A person is not entitled to any abatement of a tax on personal property unless a list is seasonably filed, except as provided in General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 61.

REAL ESTATE — ALL REAL ESTATE SUBJECT TO TAXATION in Andover on January 1, 1948.

Sworn statements which may be made by mortgagors or mortgagees under General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 34, must be filed on or before January 31, 1948.

In the case of any person claiming exemption under General Laws, Chapter 59, Section 5, clauses 17, 18, 20 or 23, a full list of all such person's property, both real and personal, must be filed with the assessors.
