Propose New Increase For Town Employees Selectmen Favor Making Present "Cost of Living" Bonus Permanent, Plus New \$4.00 Bonus

Living" Bonus Permanent, Plus New \$4.00 Bonus Inclusion of the present \$4 per week "cost of living" bonus into the basic pay of those town em-ployees now receiving it, plus a bonus of \$4 weekly for all town employees, is proposed by the board of selectmen who voted at a recent meeting to lead the move-ment for such an increase at the town election. The present "cost of living" bonus was put into effect last year in order to assist town employees to keep pace with the rising costs. It was only a temporary measur-due to end April 1. It did not apply to policemen or fireman, as a permanent \$5 per week increase-was given them, nor did it apply to the school teachers who re-ceiving it.
