


## What do Wage Increases mean to the Eastern Massachusetts?



They mean that recent wage adjustinents will boost our payrolls by at least $\$ 1,000,000$ in the next twelve months.
that payrolls will aggregate more than $\$ 9,350,000$ a year, as compared with $\$ 3,500,000$ in 1941. That's an increase of nearly $165 \%$ in eight years
Wages of operators have risen from $88 \phi$ an hour in 1941 , to $\$ 1.421 / 2$ an hour under the new agreement . . . an increase of $62 \%$ over 1941. On January I, the rate will go to $\$ 1.50 \ldots$ an increase of $70 \%$ over 1941. (A similar increase is effective with respect to mechanics.)
Maintenance costs have more than tripled in that period . . . and our gasoline bill is almost five times as great.
Yet during this time, our average fare ins: ;g has been less than $15 \%$.
If we are to continue to furnish transportation service without disastrous financial losses, an increase in fares is unavoidable.
