Last week we took up the Division of Appraisals and Review, Corporate Organization and Registration, and Corporations. Continuing in our study of the Department of Corporations and Taxation, we come next to the Division of Excise taxes.

Division of Excise taxes.

This division, under a Director, handles the gas tax, alcoholic beverage taxes, and the State motor excise tax. The latter is differentiated from the motor vehicle tax which is collected by cities and town on cars principally garaged in those cities and towns. The Excise Tax Division collects the tax on cars which are principally garaged outside the Commonwealth, but which bear Massachusetts license plates and, of course, the tax on motor vehicles used in inter-state trucking. The amount collected under this excise is insignificant.

The gas tax imposed by the

The gas tax imposed by the State of three cents on every gal The gas tax imposed by the State of three cents on every gallon, however, brought to the State in the fiscal year of 1947-1948 some 23 millions of dollars. The alcoholic beverage tax brought in 18 millions. The basis of this last tax is now two dollars a pallon on spiritous liquor. Distilled wine is taxed on the basis of ten cents a gallon, while sparkling wine is taxed forty cents per wine gallon based on fifty percent by volume. The question of all of the taxes collected by this department will be discussed in a later column, but at this time it might be noted that the question of allocating the entire proceeds from the gasoline tax to the Highway Program requires a constitutional amendment and will be presumably settled by 1950 when the question will appear on the ballot. The question has already been passed on by this year's legislature.

The United States finds itself in a clever squeeze play. If it gets out of Berlin, it loses not only face but a tenuous strategic position. If it tries to buy off the move, it selfs itself short. The Soviet knows that depression in the United States would preclude further aid to Europe. Perhaps we hang on because we know that all is not well with the economy of Eastern Europe. For while the Communist front in Europe may sound confident, a more acute ear might discern rumblings of discontent. The Communists may protest too much and too loudly. An examination of economic conditions in the Soviet bloc may reveal dangerous weaknesses. They are worth looking into.







PROTECTING YOUR EYES

A timely warning to sun bathers has been issued by the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness. It states that irreparable damage from sunlight and the misuse of sun glasses can be done.

The warning seems worth repeating, although the summer is fast waning. "Few people realize," the statement says, "how little protection is given by even an expensive pair of sun glasses from the dangerous burning heat rays of the sun. In fact the main danger of sun glasses is that the darker they are, the more they give you a false sense of security. Because the light yn, you feel that your eyes are safe, but actually you eyes are less safe in many cases than without glasses. Normally the amount of light entering the eye is automatically controlled by the iris, the colored window of the eye which closes down in strong light to a mere pin point. But when dark glasses are worn and the bright light is cut down, the iris opens wider, but the glasses do not cut down the dangerous invisible heat rays, against which most sun glasses are no protection at all."

A FREE PRESS

What makes a free press possible?

In every country where freedom of the press is lacking, or curbed, you will find totalitarian government, or something that approaches it. Under such a regime government owns the basic industries. There is no incentive for constant improve ment in order to appeal to the buying public. There is no particular reason for telling the public about all manner of products, such as is commonplace in the United States, in order to build business. The people have to take what the government offers and like it — there is no competition.

No country in the world has 12,000 rural daily and weekly spapers, in addition to the metropolitan press, except the United States. No country in the world has a newspaper in so many small towns. Their income is derived from private enterprise — thousands of competing industries, from the greatest railroad and public utility to the smallest bakery and laundry. They all advertise to popularize their services or products and win public favor and business.

It has often been charged that advertising controls the American press. This is not so, because competition is so varied that no branch of business is powerful enough to dominate the press. Volume and variety in advertising makes possible a free




