The recent fall of Premier Marie's government after 33 days in office may open the way for a general election, de Gaulle, and serious strife within France. That it took Schuman nearly a week of negotiations to form his new government only accentuates the difficulties of French politics. Since the General resigned as President-Premier in January 1946, there have been six governments in the past thirty months. For a country that needs political and economic stability, these freuent shiftings of government look like national suicide.

Were the effects of such changes limited to domestic politics they would still be serious enough. But governmental upsets are obviously reflected in international politics, disrupting negotiations on vital European and world issues. A government of either Communists or de Gaulists could well occasion civil strife within France, with most serious repercussions on the international seene. Why, then, cannot Frenchmen act moderately (Continued on Page Six)





EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

A NOISY NUISANCE

Residents who live on streets near Punchard High school are trying to have the town authorities do something about putting a stop to the noise made by model airplanes that fly several times each week on the Andover playstead. Petitions have been circulated and they will be filed with the proper authorities within a few days, those behind them declare.

The planes themselves are probably harmless enough. The fact that they make such a noise when they fly is the disturbing element. Certainly if a man, or a woman, wants to sit on the front porch of an evening, or a Sunday afternoon, he should not be disturbed by unnecessary noises.

There is no doubt but what those who fly those little planes get some fun out of it; otherwise, they would not fly them. And it is also probable that some of them do not realize how annoy ing their toys — because they really are toys — can be.

If the proper authorities would advise those who are cre ating the nuisance to fly their planes in some outlying section of the town it might put an end to it. But, if such a warning does not put an end to it, then more drastic steps should be taken. There is little doubt but that those zooming planes create a disturbance of the peace.

Compromise Governments

Don't Last

By their very nature, coalition governments of several parties are doomed to collapse sooner or later. Such governments are only by ignoring major difference of opinion and belief. They a formed only because the differen parties in the cabinet agree to ignore issues on which they dis-agree. Consequently, while they can work for a time within their restricted area of agreement, the near future must soon bring them into conflict on issues which can-not be ignored but on which they cannot agree. Of course, the day-to-day details of government are handled by professional officials and civil servants. And it must be said that cabinet changes look curiously like a mere shifting of seats around the cabinet table. The French people are apparently not disturbed by the system. It has been normal throughout the life of the Third Republic. Par-ties have taken stands on their ssues, they explain themselves to he guardian President of the French Republic, he listens and then asks one of the party leaders to form a new government.

But the trouble comes when a serious issue is to be faced. And sooner or later the "moderate" coalition must split on an irreconcilable difference. M. Schuman Catholic Popular Republican, was forced out of office by the Social ists, part of the coalition support ing the Popular Republicans. The issue was the Socialist amendment to cut military appropria-ions. A few days later Andre Marie. Radical Socialist, became he leader of an uneasy coalition of the Popular Republicans, the Socialists, and the Radicals. Again the Socialists pulled out. Marie's government col-

Free Enterprise vs. Controlled

Economy

The basic trouble is that the politically important parties to the right of the Socialists—the Radical Socialists (politically con-servative)—generally favor free enterprise, while the Socialists vant a controlled economy. Each roup claims that its program is the solution to the economic troubles of France, rising prices. For months prices have risen while wages have not kept up while wages have not kept up with the cost of living. The labor unions, whatever their political color, have demanded higher wages. The Republicans and Radicals favor the pegging of




