
From whatever angle we look at the Chinese puzzle we are bewildered. If we send aid to Chiang we merely prolong the struggle indefinitely and fail to assist the mass of Chinese torn by civil war. If we leave Chiang to his own fate, then communism wins. It is almost certain that no amount of United States', aid can help Chiang to win back what he has already lost. If we use American troops, the Rusians would doubtless actively support the Communists, and that could precipitate war between Russia and the West. If we help individual Kuomintang generals who, it is rumored, have not been adequately supplied by Chiang, then we encourage warlordism, break China into pieces, and make the communists job even easier. Our problem is made even the more difficult because a prosperous Japan must depend upon raw materials from Manchuria and North China.

All indications are that Chiang

All indications are that Chiang and his government are through sooner or later. Inflation is spiralling to heights that the average American cannot even comprehend. In the last six months the issue of almost unlimited paper money has sent its buying power down to 1/1200 of its former value, or from 5,000 Chinese dollars for the American dollar to 6,000,000 Chinese dollars to one American. Small wonder that food riots are widespread. Prices go up every twenty-four hours. This is economic chaos even in China. 

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

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

But there is an element of danger in skating that cannot be overlooked. Thin ice has taken a heavy toll every year. Nature works in the same way that man labors. It can do small jobs much more quickly than it can finish big tasks. It doesn't take very long for nature to freeze a shallow sheet of water so that it is perfectly safe for skaters, but it often requires a considerable time to put a safe surface on deep waters, or on rapidly moving currents, such as on rivers.

People often cannot be sure that the ice on a pond, or a river, is thick enough for safety, and many times one doesn't even stop to think. Hence, so many accidents.

Chiang or the Communists win, some form of government control, perhaps socialism is enevitable. The pressure of population itself is enough to make necessary regulation of the essentials of life. Critical though Chiang may be of the Communists, he has recognized the gravity of the economic situation and advicates not only govern ment planning of people's liveli-hood but also control of their wants. In simple terms, he will decide what they are permitted to want. Actually Chiang's basic domestic problem is almost in-superable—the acquisition of ade-quate and cheap food. The Communists control essentially agrisolidate their position, but to avoid the problem of feeding the whole country. What now goes on inside the Communist lines is a the Bently School of Accounting to suggest that China without controls is practically impossible.



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


