### Holds Parents To Blame For Juvenile Delinquency

Parents are to blame for most of the juvenile delinquency today. This is the opinion of Police Chief George A. Dane who has seen the problem develop during the past years to its present alarming proportions.

"Moving pictures and comic books have a lot to do with it," he added, "but all these things that contribute to juvenile delinquency go right back to the homes."

Chief Dane had just had five juveniles "on the carpet" for numerous thefts of toy pistols, knives, doughnuts and similar articles that are displayed on store counters, when he made his remarks.

"Youngsters of today don't have the same home life as we had years ago. They have baby sitters to take care of them now, and some have no one to take care of them. The fathers and mothers run out too much. They are interested in their own pleasures, whether its the movies or the night clubs, and let their children shift for themselves most of the time."



Pay increases averaging about eight cents an hour were granted Tuesday night by the board of public works to all employees in the department.

At the same time the hours were reduced from 47½ a week to 45 for all employees except the engineer at the pumping station and two other members of the department who take care of extra work Saturdays and Sundays.

### RECORDINGS **OBTAINABLE** AT LIBRARY

Of all the diverse activities that have broadened the scope of service given at the Memorial Hall library none has grown faster in popular favor than the recordlending section where borrowers last year obtained 2498 records.

Made up mostly of instrumental recordings of standard music the catalogue also contains some of the familiar selections for voice and a few choice pieces of poetry. Included, too, are some Cortina Spanish records for those wishing to learn that language in that manner.

This music section came into being after Miss Mary F. Zecchini of the library staff some few years ago saw a somewhat similar library collection while in Washington, D.C., and also looked over a music section in the Quincy library.

1947, the intervening time being taken up with cataloguing, developing a system of classification will be arreaded and getting cards typed. However, with borrowing in effect, Andover became one of the first libraries in this area from which recordings could be obtained. in this area from which recordings could be obtained.

From the beginning the record section grew, not quite by leaps and bounds as no appropriation had been made by the town to buy but additional albums were obtained from time to time until today 80 volumes, or about 400 records, are available.

Since the borrowing started two years ago only four or five rec-ords have been broken and the borrowers gladly paid for the replacements replacements

Any registered adult borrower may obtain six records at a time on his or her card. However, if an album something like the Pirates of Penzance is taken out, naturally the complete album of 11 records may obtained at one time. The same system applies to "The Messiah" with 19 records or "Elijah" with 16.

Records circulate for one week with no renewals or transfers. As the collection grows, however, it may become possible for the li-brary to allow them to be renewed once. Every record is checked for scratches and cracks before it goes out and when it comes back.

The library has limited its rec-ordings to standard music simply because it lacks funds to include everything. Eventually it hopes to have a more rounded collection.

Since April, 1947, the library has subscribed to a young people's record club. From this it received two records a month, one for the pre-school age and one for the elementary school child. These records are kept separate from others, being strictly young

people's records. However, they circulate only to adults. The col-lection is small, the number to be taken at one time is limited to

From the time the section was put into operation borrowers have been most enthusiastic about it. The response to the innovation from the beginning was good. In 1947, a total of 1461 records were circulated, and in the next year the numbed jumped to 2498. This does not include the young folks'

does not include the young folks' recordings.

Miss Zecchini does all of the selecting and purchasing. For se-lection she relies a great deal on published reviews and is still limited by lack of funds.

This checking is required by law, but it is really nothing more than a safety precaution. Unless a car is checked periodically, an owner can never be sure that it is safe to operate.

The earlier in the month car owners attend to this duty the better. It is senseless to put off until the last minute something that you should want to do, even though the law does not require it.

#### GRASS FIRE SEASON

There are more grass fires at this time of year than at any other. For the most part such fires are of a minor nature, but a fire, however small, is always a fire, and one can never be sure when it is going to spread. The smallest of fires have been known to spread unexpectedly so that buildings and even lives have been endangered.

Of course there is a lot of stuff in back yards that people want to get rid of after the winter season, and the best way to the perhaps, is to burn it. But, before you strike a portance for one reason. Its rugmatch and light a fire near your house be sure you are going to have everything under control.

Never make a fire too near a building, and never light a fire when there is such an accumulation of waste matter that it may blaze too high, or may send up sparks that may travel some distance and, possibly, ignite other fires.

And—this is the law—before you light a fire in the open: telephone the fire department and ask permission. Chances are that the necessary permission will be granted, provided it is not a windy day.

Whatever you do, play safe.

#### BALANCED MILITARY POWER

It is a human failing to look for easy solutions to difficult problems. As an example, a good many people seem to be holding the hope that the military security of this nation can be guaranteed by air power alone, and that such traditional arms as navies and ground forces are largely holdovers from

This view, however, does not find much credence in informed circles. When an AAF plane recently completed a nonstop flight around the world, President Truman was among the first to point out that this dramatic achievement did not indicate that we no longer need overseas bases. The plane was refueled in the air four times — roughly, at 5,000-mile intervals. In time of war, it could only be refueled where our own or allied power held the ground. And to hold land beyond our borders means that there must be strong ground forces — and those forces must be supplied by sea, which demands powerful navies to protect the transports and freighters and to fight off enemy

Without discounting in the slightest the great contribution to victory made by allied air forces, the navies and the ground armies were indispensable in finally turning the tide and destroying the Axis' power of resistance. Nothing has happened since to change the picture.
