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## EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

THE BUILDING BOOM
Recards iust released from the office of Building Inspector Ralph W. Coleman reflect the very healthy building boom which is in progress here.

The number of permits issued for new homes in June bring to 79 the total for the first half of the year. Already this is more than the 77 issued for the entire year of 1949.

The estimated cost of the new construction and that of the additions and alterations being made to local property has reached the impress ive figure of $\$ 898,800$ for the first six months of the year. This is nearly double the $\$ 450,000$ for a similar period a year ago.

As Banker and Tradesman observes in its review of the real estate market of New England, there are plenty of customers for new hames and the production of homes is setting a fast pace. The emphasis is still on the small, relatively low-cost house but the market for the larger, higher-priced houses is being felt out cautiously with good results in spite of the rising building costs.

Here in Andover there is little doubt that the town is growing. New areas are being developed and new dwellings are being completed to add several hundred thousand dollars more to the town's valuation.

Should this activity continue as it has started out, it will make 1950 a banner year in the annals of home construction.

## WE CELEBRATE THE FQURTH

The first real Fourth of July observance the town has experienced in recent years has drawn much favorable comment from those who shared in its various attractions.

Sponsored by the relief associations of the police and fire departments it presented a diversified "Night Before"' program which drew many out-of-town visitors, first to see the parade through downtown streets and then to pack the playstead where a week's carnival opened with an outdoor show, a grand display of fire works and a midnight bonfire.

The crowd at the playstead, conservatively estimated at 7000 , was evidence that there were many who preferred to stay at home over the holiday rather than get into the long lines of that cluttered the highways.

The attraction may have had something to do with the lack of arrests and the absence of fire alarms, both of which were appreciated by public safety officials.

There appears to be no doubt but that the relief associations will put on a similar show next year.

The thing that for a long time kept the electorate behind the planners and the speechmakers has been the promise of gain without work-of something for nothing. It is nothing more than iust a promise. Everett $(\mathrm{Pa})$ Republican.
