Veterans' Homes Near Ready For Occupancy

In preparation for the opening of the veterans' housing project the Andover Housing authority has appointed J. Edward Manning of 85 Main st., as maintenance man.

Mr. Manning, who has worked for Atty. Samuel Resnik since 1928, and has taken tickets at the Andover Playhouse for so many years that he is known to all the youngsters of the town as "Eddie," has had considerable experience to fit him for his new duties.

A veteran of World War II he has been maintenance man at the theatre for a number of years and has also collected rents. He will occupy an apartment in one of the 12 buildings off Morton street, and will take care of the boilers, collect rents and have general charge of maintenance of the new buildings.

Work on the project is nearing completion and veterans to whom the units have been allocated will be notified as to the exact date they will be ready for occupancy.

Due to unavoidable delays the buildings have not been opened as early as was anticipated. They are now in the final stages of construction so that the first occupants should soon be notified when they can move in.

A survey report of the entire state just made available by Gov. Paul A. Dever, indicates that 141 veterans' developments have been approved by the state housing board, and that 1996 dwelling units, 56 of which are in Andover have been completed or are under construction in Essex county. Also there are an additional 400 units approved for Essex county.

Building Activity Continues Brisk

The estimated cost of new buildings for which permits were issued during the month of July, by Building Inspector Ralph W. Coleman is \$143,200, and for additions and alterations \$7400.

This July total of \$150,600, is in keeping with the pace set in building operations during the first half of the year and brings the 1950 total to date up to \$1,049,400.

Taylor Joins CPA Society

2 Auto Plates For Cars In '51

Two number plates for automobiles will be provided for all cars registered in 1951.

Persons holding low-numbered plates may have them reassigned for next year provided the applications properly filled out are returned with the required fee to the registry on time.

For plates numbered 1 to 10,000; and from K1 to K1,000 the applications must be returned during the period Sept. 1 to 29. Applications for plates numbered 10,001 to 100,000, and K1,001 to K10,000 must be received on or before Oct. 15.

Registration applications from owners of motor vehicles holding number plates other than those mentioned will be received through the mail beginning Oct. 9. No advantage is to be gained by filing such applications before that date.

**Object To Low
Water Level
At Ballardvale**

A delegation of Ballardvale residents appeared at the meeting of the selectmen Monday night to protest against conditions caused by the low water at the Shawsheen river dam.

The remonstrants felt that the water should be kept at such a height that mud banks along the river would not be exposed.

They were advised that their protest would be taken under consideration and that the board would do what it could to improve the conditions.

Control of the water above the dam has recently been acquired by the American Woolen Co.

Remonstrants from the Vale included Robert Mitchell, Frank Serio, Mrs. Clarence Wormwood, Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Wormwood and several campers.

Another meeting is planned with representatives of the American Woolen Co. The Vale delegation intends to advance a plan for the town to buy the adjoining property to the dam so that it can control the rights and keep the water to a higher level.

It is understood that the reason the water is so low at this time is because certain repairs are being made at the dam.

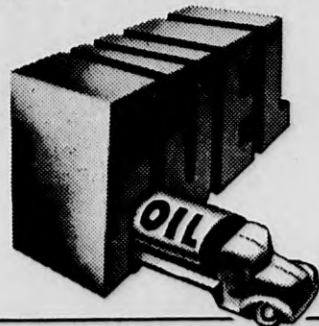

Information For Veterans

Q—My doctor told me that I should have my tonsils removed, but I can't afford it. As a World War II veteran, can I have this operation performed at a VA hospital, even though my condition is not service-connected?

A—Yes, if VA doctors deem surgery is necessary and if you sign a certificate stating you are not able to pay for the operation. But you will have to wait for a bed to become available, for in VA hospitals first priority goes to emergency cases; second, to those with service-connected illnesses and disabilities, and third, to those with non-service-connected ailments.

Q—I am a retired regular army officer drawing career compensation retirement from the army. Is it possible to get disability compensation from VA at the same time?

A—Yes. When you apply to VA, you will be required to state the amount of your retirement pay. After your case is adjudicated, VA will notify the army of the amount of compensation or pension granted. The army, then, will deduct an equivalent amount from your retirement pay.

Q—I enlisted in the navy recently, but I am afraid I won't be able to keep up premium payments on my commercial life insurance policy. Can anything be done about it?

A—Under the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Relief act, you may

apply to VA for protection of your insurance. If your application is approved, VA will guarantee your premiums until you get out of service. But after your discharge, you must repay the indebtedness.

Q—My brother, a World War II veteran, is in a mental hospital. May I pay his national service life insurance premiums for him?

A—Yes. Be sure you identify the payments properly.

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

GREATER RESPONSIBILITY ON MOTORISTS

Congestion of the highways of Massachusetts is continually being increased by the added number of autos and licensed operators, the registry of motor vehicles reminds us.

Its records for the first six months of the year show that registrations were over the 1,200,000 mark and the number of licensed operators increased to 1,687,000, both much higher than the corresponding period a year ago.

This increase adds to the already heavy traffic loads which the highways of the commonwealth must accommodate, and these conditions place greater responsibilities upon motorists and pedestrians to do everything possible to reduce accidents.

"It is imperative," says Registrar Rudolph F. King, viewing the growing congestion, "that every driver exercise complete control of his vehicle at all times. The situation demands that 'one-hand' driving must be stopped - now."

Records of the registry show that serious accidents to other motorists, pedestrians, and the offending drivers themselves, have resulted from this dangerous driving habit.

Vehicle control calls for the use of both hands, unless the operator is specially licensed because of an infirmity, or is actually in the act of giving hand signals.

Frequently the "arm out the window hand on the roof" method of operating is assumed unconsciously as a matter of relaxation by some motorists who do considerable driving, yet accident hazards develop so quickly in traffic that safety demands complete attention and full-time application to driving if accidents are to be prevented.

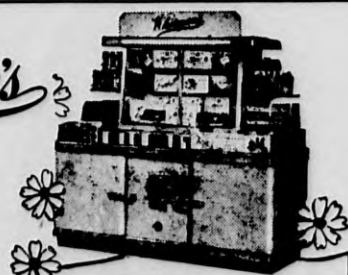

VIEWS OF THE NEWS

LONDON - Government controls seem to produce quaint results. Or perhaps it is the official mind that is to blame. Anyhow, there is quite an official pronouncement in this evening's papers. It comes from Mr. Webb the food minister, a gentleman given to the confusion of tongues. At least, his listeners have trouble in following what is presumed to be reasoning. This one is a gem - if you happen to be on the outside looking in. But put yourself inside and see what you make of it.

The whole business is about rabbits. Probably you have never thought about rabbits as food, and are not much taken with the idea. Neither are we, but we suspect that we may have eaten quite a little recently. Disguised, of course. Sometimes the medium is called rissoles, more often it has a French touch such as we found in a West End French restaurant where it appeared as la terrine du chef. Mr. Webb's topic is rabbits too. Nearly a year ago they were "decontrolled," which means that anyone could buy a rabbit at any time without giving up precious meat ration points. When your meat ration is twenty-eight cents' worth a week, with meat around thirty-six cents a pound, even a rabbit helps to fill an odd corner.

Restrictions for Oversupply

But something's wrong with rabbits - or rather, with Mr. Webb's dealings with rabbits. So tomorrow they go back on ration points again. There must be a shortage, you think? Bless you, no. There's too many of the beasties! Is someone kidding somebody? An overproduction of rabbits and they go back on rationing? Well, here's the clue. "To stop profiteering" Mr. Webb has decided to control them again. Too bad he can't really control their habits. That would solve his dilemma!

Prices Down - And Profiteering!

Presumably the price of rabbits must have risen recently. Come again! "Wholesale prices have slumped" to less than fifty percent of the controlled price. The food ministry has undertaken to buy all the rabbits Australia could pack. The rabbits must have got wind of the agreement. And now today rabbits aren't selling too well. In fact the food ministry estimates that it has lost 1,000,000 pounds on the deal. Now that's a nice tangled tale worthy of the efforts of Lewis Carroll. Too many rabbits, wholesale prices down, the government not covering their expenditures, so create an artificial scarcity. How about bringing the price lower and making up for it by selling more rabbits? Not at all. Wholesalers are now informed that their weekly orders will not be allowed to exceed the average orders since decontrol, and that total orders for the country cannot exceed 30,000 crates a week. It looks amusing from the outside. How would you care to be inside the squirrel cage?

A Peep at Nationalized Efficiency

Labor shortage is quite a problem here. So we thought that the British Railways, as they are now called under the nationalization scheme, would be a good example of efficiency or at least gradually-increasing efficiency. So we thought. We decided to avoid the congestion of August railroad ticket offices and buy our ticket at one of the official branch offices. Not at any old office, but at what may be presumed to be a good one situated in one of London's best streets in the district catering to foreign tourists. Twenty minutes after we took our place at the desk we got

our ticket, actually the second one served by the two clerks. The other nineteen and a half minutes were taken up by their answering questions to a few prospective travelers. We are not criticizing the matter of replacements of worn out rolling stock. That's a major problem that will take some time to solve. This is a matter of merely buying tickets.

One Ticket - 22 Phone Calls

So there we were, ticket in hand innocently asking for a seat reservation from the same fellow. No, sir, that is downstairs. So down we tripped. Literally, by the time we woke up to facts. It's not a matter of swapping money for a seat reservation. This is a far more complicated affair. Our clerk phoned up the main line depot. Subconsciously we counted the first three times. Then we really counted. Ten diallings later we asked the clerk what the trouble was. No trouble at all. Just routine. Of course, it was peak travel time. How many fellows answering phones at the other end? One, and he was selling reservations to the waiting public and in between times answering this telephone. Answering is not the word exactly. Don't you have more men at peak times? No, two from the office were on vacation, and two were out sick. We think they were merely sick of the job, but that's an unsubstantiated opinion. Well, why not hire more men? Can't get them. Pay too low? He wouldn't commit himself but we understood his general idea. In any case, sir, there's only this one phone. This was by now the eighteenth try. Why don't they put in more phones? Hard to get. Who operates and owns the telephone system? The government through the post office. Who owns and operates the railroads? The government. Then why can't the two boards or commissions get together and instal more phones for the railroads? By this time we decided our questions were a little unfair. Only the government could answer them. Or couldn't they? We didn't want the fellow to get dissatisfied with his job. Actually we were doing him a good turn. It took his mind off the twenty-two attempts he made to get through. And it helped to lighten the twenty-five minutes spent facing each other across a table. No, we didn't get our reservation. Only the clerk and I knew that I wanted one, and he was powerless.

We wonder about the state of mind of the average citizen who constantly runs into such experiences. And then we remember there are dozens of such restrictions to come, like rabbits. We only hope that those who started the affair have to live by their own rules. We'd like to send would-be nationalizers to live for a spell in Britain, not at the best hotels but just as an ordinary citizen. And then refuse to let them come out. Their enthusiasm might be dampened. And their spirit too.

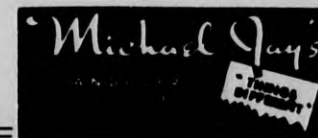

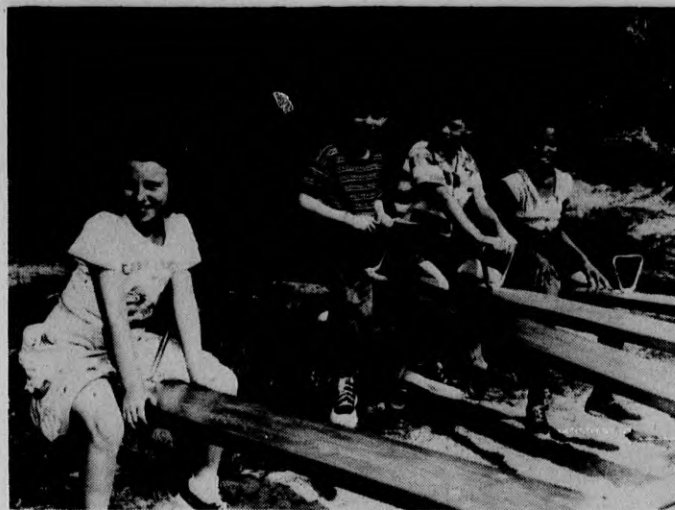

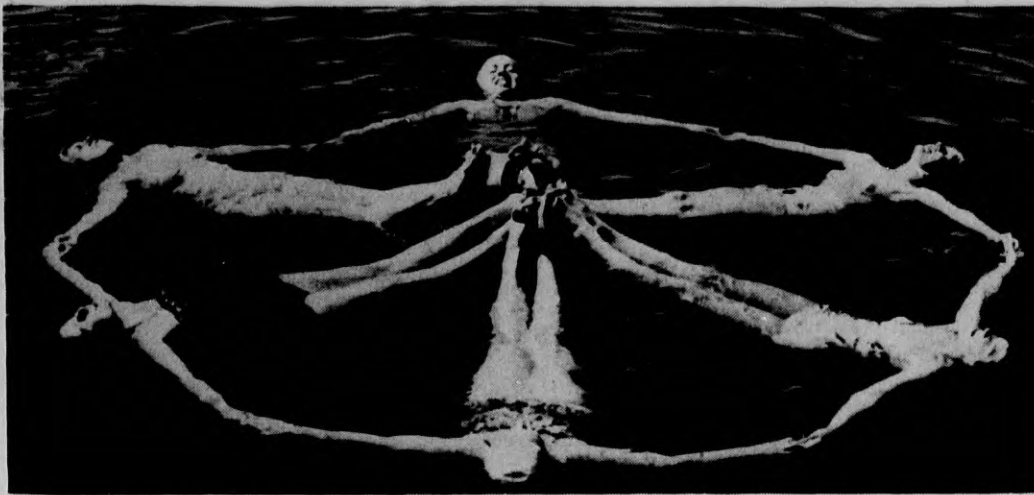
