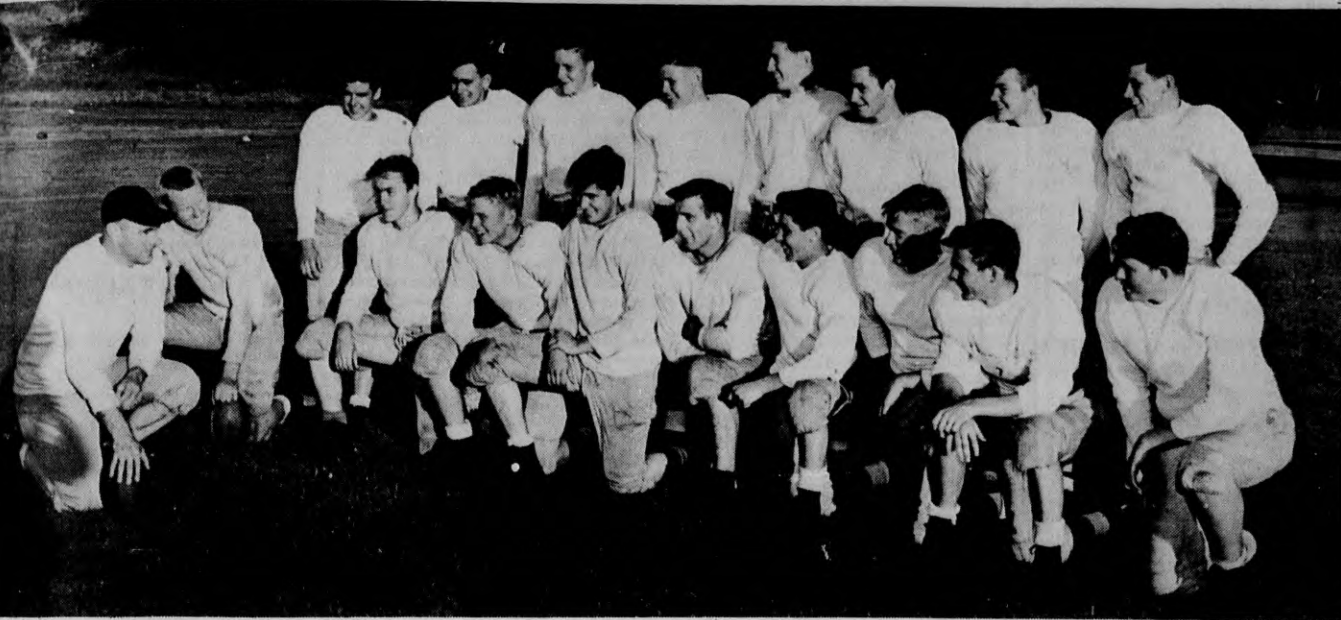

arges Extra Driving Care Over Holiday

The Andover police department will cooperate with the Massachusetts Safety Council in an intensive campaign to prevent needless traffic accidents over the coming Labor day holiday, Police Chief George A. Dane announced today. Chief Dane pointed out that, according to the safety council, holiday traffic deaths have been increasing throughout the nation at an alarming rate during the last few years. Each holiday period has been reaching new heights in tragedy. The Labor day weekend toll last year was 10 immediate traffic deaths, the highest Labor day toll in history. An extensive enforcement and educational campaign was carried throughout Massachusetts over the recent Fourth of July holiday. That it paid off is now common knowledge, for the state had the best holiday safety record in the nation. "We are determined to maintain that record over the coming Labor day holiday," Chief Dane stated.

Asks Names Of All In Service

The Andover veterans' service office requests the names and service addresses of all Andover persons who have entered, been continued in, or recalled into service since June 25, 1950.

This includes all members who are now in the U.S. armed forces.

The families of all persons who were in service June 25 or who enlisted or who have been recalled subsequent to this date, are requested to report the names of such service men or women from now on, until the present emergency has been officially declared at an end.

With the opening of schools Wednesday parents are reminded that the first graders will attend only the morning sessions for the first four weeks.

At the central schools on the opening day there will be just one session for grades 1, 2 and 3. Children in these grades who are transported by bus will be expected to remain at school until the 2.30 p. m. bus unless their parents wish to call for them at 12 o'clock. These children should bring their lunches or plan to eat at the cafeteria.

Pupils of grades 4, 5, and 6 will be dismissed at 2.30 p. m. There will be cafeteria service for those who wish it.

Children who have registered for the morning sessions of the kindergarten will attend the first day of school. Those registered for the afternoon sessions will report for the first time at 1.30 p. m. Thursday.

7116 Eligible To Vote Here In Primaries

A total of 7116 registered voters will be eligible to vote at the state primaries Tuesday, Sept. 19, according to the figures just compiled by George H. Winslow, clerk of the board of registrars.

This is 159 more than the number registered for the state primaries two years ago when 2032 ballots were cast, 1685 of which were Republican and 347 Democrat.

3 Dead, 2 Hurt In Auto Crash

Three persons are dead and three more are at the Lawrence General hospital as the result of an accident in West Andover about 5.50 p. m., Saturday when an auto in which they were riding crashed into a tree.

Lawrence Reed, 21 of Peabody, and William G. Pierce of Salem, were pronounced dead upon arrival at the Hospital, and Philip Hodgdon, 21, of Peabody, died Tuesday morning.

On the danger list are Mrs. Helen Sands, 56, of Peabody, and Warren Brown, 23, of Peabody. Also admitted to the hospital for treatment of shock but not otherwise injured was George L. Sands, 12, of Peabody.

Police are planning to question the survivors as soon as their conditions warrant it. Meanwhile, Chief George A. Dane is of the opinion that a blowout of a left rear tire might have been the cause of the car swerving to the left across Lowell street at a curve near Beacon street, and crashing into the tree.

Schools Will Call 3977 To Studies

School bells of Andover will peal forth next month ending the long summer vacation for the 3977 who will come trooping back to their desks in the town's various institutions of learning.

This is nearly 200 more than the number who answered the call of the school bells last year. The increase is due largely to a new freshman class entering Merrimack college, which will be co-ed for the first time, and an enrollment in the public schools of about 50 more than last September.

First to open will be the public schools and St. Augustine's school on Wednesday, Sept. 6. Enrollment in the public schools is expected to be 1700 on the opening day, a substantial increase over the 1650 who attended on the opening day a year ago.

St. Augustine's will have 385 pupils in its classrooms, a capacity enrollment, just about the same as the previous year.

The Sacred Heart school in Shawsheen Village will have registration Sunday, Sept. 10, and open its school doors Sept. 11, with 230 as it did last year.

Then on Sept. 13, the Pike school will open with 150 students, slightly less than the opening day a year ago, but registrations are expected to continue throughout the month and bring the final figure up to 170, the same as last year.

On Sept. 18, a young army of 725 boys will fill the classrooms at Phillips academy, another capacity enrollment for the town's noted school.

Merrimack college will have registrations Sept. 14 and 15, will start its retreat Sept. 18, and will open its doors to 600 on Sept. 21. This will give the school for the first time its full complement of four classes, the upper three being all men, and the entering class to be co-ed.

Abbot academy will have a capacity enrollment of 187, about two more than last year, when its doors open Sept. 26, thus bringing the town's school population up to 3977 for the coming year.

Red Cross Busy During Summer

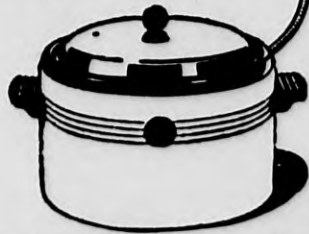

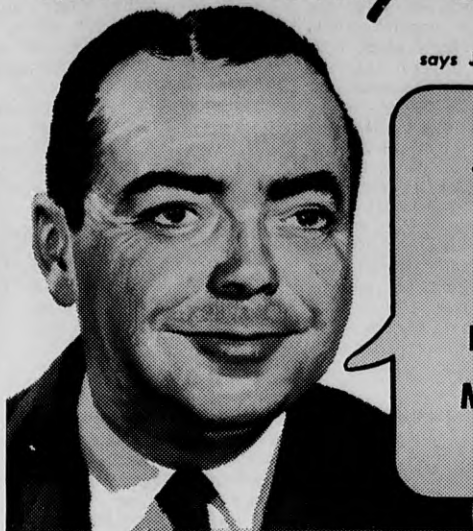

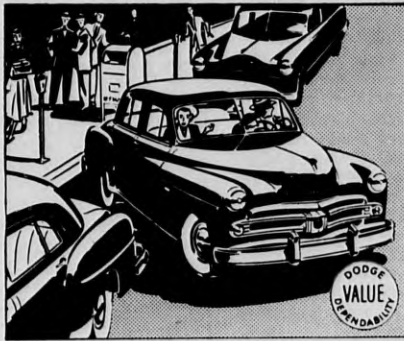

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

HOLIDAY TRAFFIC

The great effort of all law enforcement agencies to cut down traffic accidents over the recent Fourth of July holiday really paid off—Massachusetts had the best safety record in the entire nation.

Now Police Chief George A. Dane and safety officials of the state are calling upon drivers to exercise patience and care over the coming Labor day holiday.

They point out that 95,000 more cars are registered than a year ago, that a great many people will be returning from their summer vacations, and that numerous families will be using the family car to enjoy this last summer holiday.

They also warn motorists that all officers of the enforcement agencies will be watching traffic. They urge extra care, more patience with other drivers, and as much travel as possible in daylight hours. They ask operators to take it easy on the road and not to drive while drinking.

With the terrible toll of highway death and destruction that fill the nation's papers after every holiday it should not be necessary to urge these precautions, most of which are no more than common courtesies.

Drivers ready to "step on it" might well remember that oft-repeated slogan, "The life you save may be your own."

VIEWS OF THE NEWS

By LEONARD F. JAMES

STOCKHOLM—The other day we got away from politics, the problems of nationalization and the like, and headed off by car from Stockholm to Paris. Contrary to expectations, we had no trouble in getting from the Allied military commission our permits to travel through Western Germany. In less than an hour the Stockholm office added one more stamp to our passports.

Headed our way southwards were Swedish busses from the company that runs regular routes to every country in western Europe, many with double sections complete with sleeping quarters. If passports and the car permit are in order there's practically no trouble whatever in traveling by road. We crossed frontiers eleven times, our car packed with baggage. And we did the whole business with more expedition and in less time than it takes a United States citizen to get into his own country, with perhaps the exception of Germany where officialdom still loves to make the traveler feel that a frontier barrier is only raised after a lot of official mumbo-jumbo.

Across The Border To Denmark

Denmark welcomed us with a generous supply of butter coupons for the only rationed product in the country. A friendly place with friendly people, it is a joy to drive through despite the fact that ferries are a necessity and expensive. It is an attractive land with its rolling countryside, magnificent beeches along many roads, with its whitewashed brick houses clean and charming in the sunshine. It is a happy, cheerful land—one can't help liking it.

We arrived rather late at our Danish hotel and were a little startled to find that the beds in our rooms were not made. Or so we thought, until we discovered that the curious article doubled back across the footboard was the Danish equivalent of sheet and blankets. Getting into bed consists merely of lying on the sheet and yanking back over one a sort of sheet-bag filled with feathers and down. It doesn't just cover the sleeper. It snuggles down around him. For a comfortable sleep give us one of these. Waking up in the morning is not too easy, but the hardy Dane can refresh himself at breakfast with a jolt—and we write jolt with conscious deliberation—of ice-cold schnapps. We are not Danish, so avoided what might be a refresher to a Dane but a Mickey Finn to us at eight in the morning.

Into Western Germany—And Out

The German frontier bustled with activity, much of it perfectly aimless. For example, there appears in our passport a German-inscribed statement to the effect that we had a typewriter with us. No one has since deigned to remark upon the fact. We do admit, however, that quite a few Germans are earning a living as frontier officials. One herded us out of the car, another to ok over and shepherded us into the theater of operations, and several more immediately got busy with numerous rubber stamps, not your French kind of worm stamp that leaves an illegible blur, but nice new stamps wielded with vigor if not despatch. One official copied information from passport to card, another

scrutinized our documents again and on a slip of paper stamped a symbolic circle. A third examined passport and circle and added a stamped triangle. Armed with this precious document we approached a terribly important chap at the barrier. He took the slip, tore it up and let us through. Extremely impressive.

Western Germany gave the impression of a dispirited people who had barely got to the job of cleaning up their bombed towns. Shops displayed every sort of food and consumer goods, but prices were stiff for the native pocket. War has left its mark on the self-styled master race, and the herrenvolk by no means resemble their former proud claims. One recalls Thomas Carlyle's remark that a proud king without his clothes is merely a forked radish.

Too Short A Time In Holland

From Hamburg to Bremen we travelled the famed autobahns. For scenery we'll take the Merrimack parkway. But we soon made up for our past hours when we got to Holland and our first good meal since Denmark. Not far inside the frontier we found a delightful little town which we hope we haven't seen for the last time. We walked into what we expected to be a lobby, found ourselves in the drawing-room bar which serves also as reception desk—what more appropriate—asked in English for a couple of double rooms, and within two minutes found ourselves looking at a double bed that would sleep an entire family. The Dutch too believe in comfort. We wonder what they'd do with a modern folding monstrosity. The price for our enormous room and a bouncing breakfast next morning was a little less than three dollars a couple. Which we thought distinctly reasonable.

The immediate urgency was dinner. Apologetically our hostess explained that it was a bit late but that she could push together a simple meal. While waiting for what turned out to be a culinary marvel, we asked in what we later thought was an insular way for a cocktail. If we could ask, then our host could produce—or try. He finished up with our teaching him the mysteries of ice, a shaker and the fixings. Then he tried his hand proudly at it and provided us with one on the house. The magnificent dinner demanded a liqueur at 30 cents the double size, and a perfection of a cigar for a dime. For that meal from cocktail to cigar we paid \$6.50 a couple.

Regretfully we moved on next day, to remember nostalgically that little Dutch town and the charming hotel. The names of both? If you're serious about them we'll give you them. But don't spread the word too far. We want to go back some day before the prices go up.

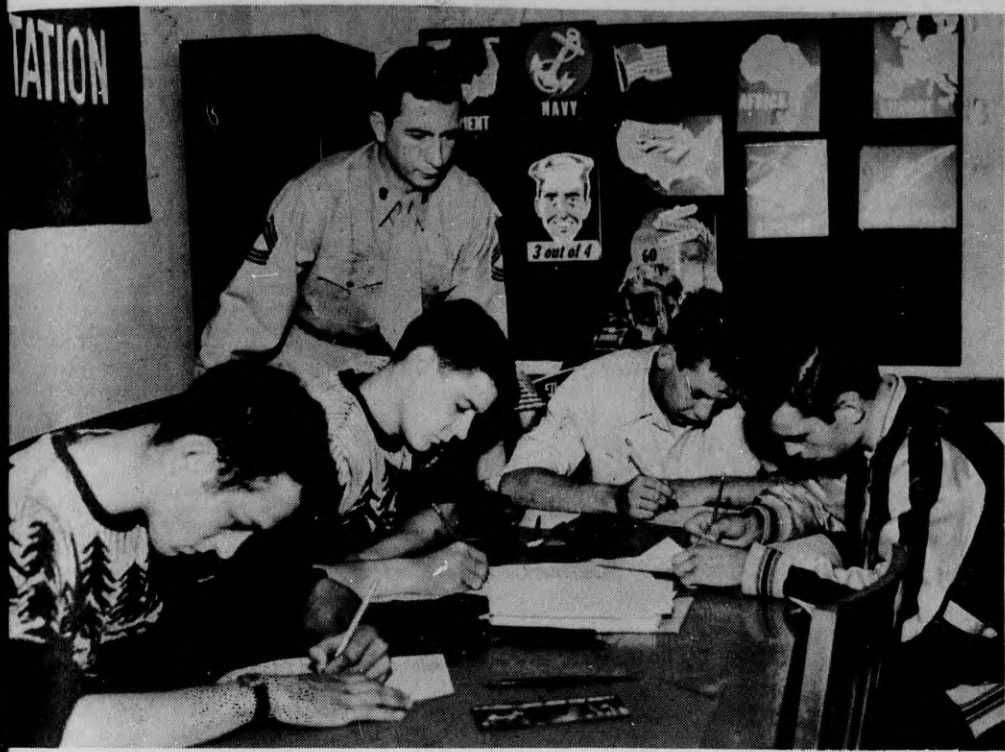

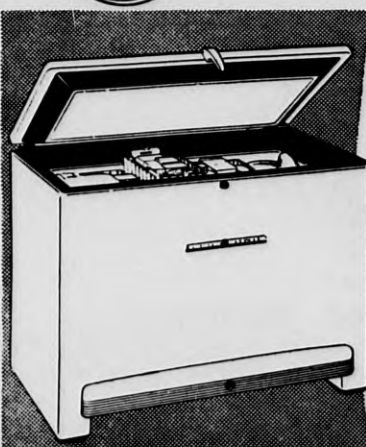

Disaster Chairman John M. Murray and his committee are making plans for a September meeting with local safety department and civilian defense authorities to integrate community-wide disaster relief plans.

Matching the step-up in this emergency service all over the country is the tremendous increase in pressure on the blood program since Gen. Marshall accepted the request of Secretary of Defense Johnson's for a stockpiling of blood for the armed services.

Col. Frank L. Purdon, blood recruiting chairman for Andover, represented the local chapter at a meeting held in Salem to coordinate blood programs in this area. Miss Barbara A. Loomer attended an emergency session in Boston, at which Red Cross obligations to the armed services were discussed. Victor A. Mill Jr. and his committee have already begun preparations for the scheduled visit of the Red Cross bloodmobile to Andover early in November. Quotas will be greatly increased over those formerly assigned.

Staff aides have been giving volunteer service to cover the office desk during both the vacation and the conference absences of the executive secretary. This branch is being expanded by Mrs. David M. Thompson in anticipation of the greater Red Cross responsibility to civilians and the armed forces in the near future.

Mrs. J. J. Tavern and the home service committee are studying the new instructions on handling communications between soldiers and prisoners of war in Korea and their families here. At least three Andover boys are known to be in Korea.

The Red Cross water safety program has been effectively administered all summer at Pomp's pond through Donald D. Dunn and his assistants who were trained under scholarship arrangements provided by Andover chapter at the aquatic school in South Hanson.

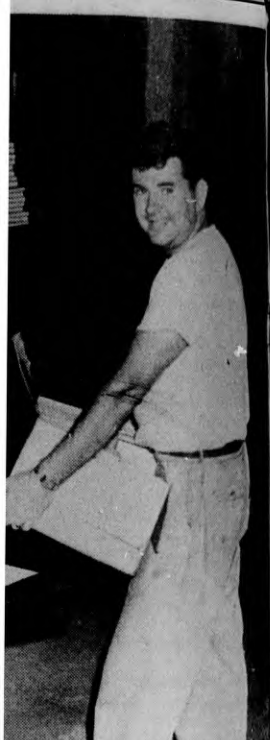

It is generally agreed that rigid enforcement of traffic laws plays a big part in keeping down the toll of highway accidents. But to make enforcement possible the public must be willing not only to accept it, but demand it.

"Traffic officers must know that their efforts will be supported and are, in fact, expected. The Andover police department will do everything in its power to make the streets of the town safe.

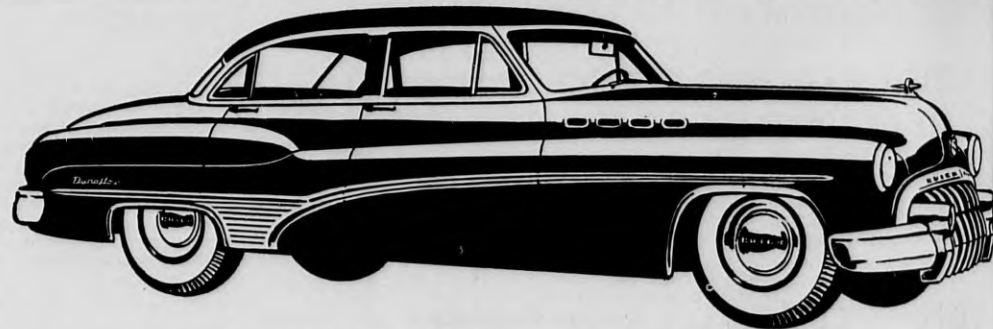
