Juveniles And Crime

In an address before the Women's Rotary club of Boston recently Frederick Ayer Jr., former FBI agent, placed his finger on a sore spot in American life today when he blamed the glamorizing of criminals in movies, television and comic books for the increase in juvenile delinquency.

The responsibility for teen-age sex orgies, narcotic addiction and other crimes, he declared, is shared by parents with motion picture producers and others who glamorize the "quick buck" boys and their mink-coated girl friends. The fact that such stories and pictures may have a moral ending with the villains punished and virtue triumphant does not undo the harm,

He pointed out that a noted child psychiatrist has 'there were no bad children, only inadequate parents." There are parents who place the easy dollar, flashy cars and night clubs above the need of setting a proper example for their own youngsters. The parent whose reading consists of the racing sheet and the lurid crime story and has little or no time for guiding the teen-age son or daughter, is just as much at fault as the corrupt official.

The views of Mr. Ayer are shared by many others who are close to the problem. Police Chief George A. Dane has long held the view that while movies and comic books have a lot to do with it, most of the things that contribute to juvenile delinquency go right back to the homes.

Discussing the subject some time ago he told The Townsman; "Youngsters of today don't have the same home life as we had years ago. They have baby sitters to take care of them now, and some have no one to take care of them. The fathers and mothers run out too ruch. They are interested in their own pleasures, whether it's the movies or the night clubs, and let the children shift for themselves most of the

Adult standards in the past several years have deteriorated to the point that many govern their actions according to what is pleasurable rather than according to what is right. With such examples before them it is not difficult to see how many youngsters get into trouble.

Big Year

The editor of Chain Store Age recently wrote that 1951 will probably be the biggest retail year in history, in terms of dollar sales. It is believed that total volume will exceed \$150 billion as compared with \$140 billion in 1950. This is predicted on the expectation in retail circles that the coming holiday business will exceed last year's.

The significance of this is enormous. It means that more and more goods of all kinds are finding their way into the homes of the American people. It means that, in spite of high prices and taxes and all the other economic problems we face, our living standards are so high they amaze the rest of the world. It means that the American productive machine is still running in high gear.

We are all beneficiaries of retailing's contribution to the economy, though few of us give it conscious thought. The finest farms and factories on earth would be of small service to the nation unless there were an adequate distribution system to buy, transport, advertise, display, and sell the goods. The American family doesn't go to a farm for its food, or to a manufacturer for its clothing and household supplies and all the rest of the things it needs and wants. It goes to some of the hundreds of thousands of retail stores which operate in this country. And, due to competition, it gets fine products at the lowest price which the economic conditions of the time make possible. The retail store is America's vivid show window.

HERE'S TO YOUR HEALTH

WHEN YOUR CHILD IS ILL ...

A mother soon notices anything ususual in a child's behavior which leads her to suspect that he is "coming down with something." Maybe the child just seems out of sorts, or he may show more definite signs of illness. A mother is not expected to diagnose her child's illness or decide how to treat it; she should, however, be quick to recognize signs of illness and secure medical care promptly.

If the child seems ill, put him to bed. Keep other people away from him, expecially other children.

Call your physician. If he cannot come immediately, he will give you instructions to follow until he gets there. Remember that the first hours are often the most important in illness. Prompt medical care may prevent complications. The protective substances which are used to lighten or shorten the attack of certain communicable diseases are of most value when given early. The sooner they are given, the better the results. If the disease is diagnosed promptly, treatment can be started at once.





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
