Postmaster Urges Early Christmas Mailing

Postmaster Stephen A. Boland heralded the approach of the Christmas season today with his annual appeal for early mailing of Christmas cards and packages.

The postmaster expects the greatest flood of Yuletide mail in local history. He predicted it would exceed "by a considerable margin" the record-breaking 1950 holiday season when 64,833 pieces of mail were cancelled in one day.

"This year's deluge of Christmas mail will strain the post office facilities severely," he stated. "But we'll get everything delivered by Christmas if the public cooperates whole-heartedly."

Christmas packages for distant states should be mailed by Dec. 5, he declared. All Yuletide parcel post should be on its way by Dec. 10.

Christmas cards to friends and loved ones in other states should be deposited by Dec. 15. Greetings for local delivery should be mailed at least a week before Christmas.

The directors Monday night voted to send letters of thanks to the police and fire departments for their cooperation in the affair which helped to make all arrangements run smoothly.

The membership committee is now entering into its campaign to build up the organization. President W. R. Hill points out that while this drive is going on everybody engaged in business and industrial activities is invited to join and need not wait until approached.

The Christmas seals support a nationwide, organized attack against TB, a disease which is killing at the rate of 100 persons a day in this country.

Christmas seal sales also make possible the year-round programs of the tuberculosis associations which fight TB on four broad fronts, health education, case finding, rehabilitation and support of medical research.

The community X-ray survey for Andover will take place from Feb. 25 to Mar. 7, 1952.

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Fatally Injured In Holiday Crash

A Lawrence man, father of three children, was fatally injured on River road early last Thursday morning when the automobile he was driving enroute to Lawrence from Lowell struck a tree. Norman B. Blamire, 38, of 119

Andover st., Lawrence, was found by John P. Childs, Lawrence motorist, who saw the wrecked machine as he was returning from Lowell about 2 a.m.

Andover police investigated and Lawrence police were also summoned to the scene. The man was found on the rear seat of the two-door sedan and taken to the Lawrence General hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Police said the car was considerably damaged about the left side. They said that investigation showed that the heavy sedan had struck a tree, then spun around facing in the opposite direction from which it was travelling. Police said the driver's seat was tilted in the crash, allowing his body to topple over it.

Childs said the car had passed him a short time before on Andover street in Lowell. He came upon the car about a mile west of the Everpure Ice company, he said.

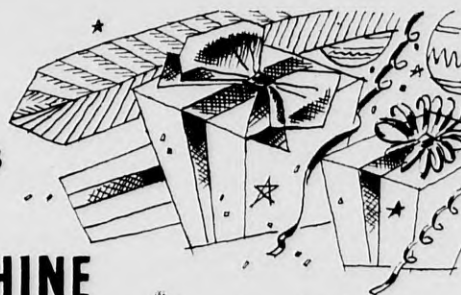

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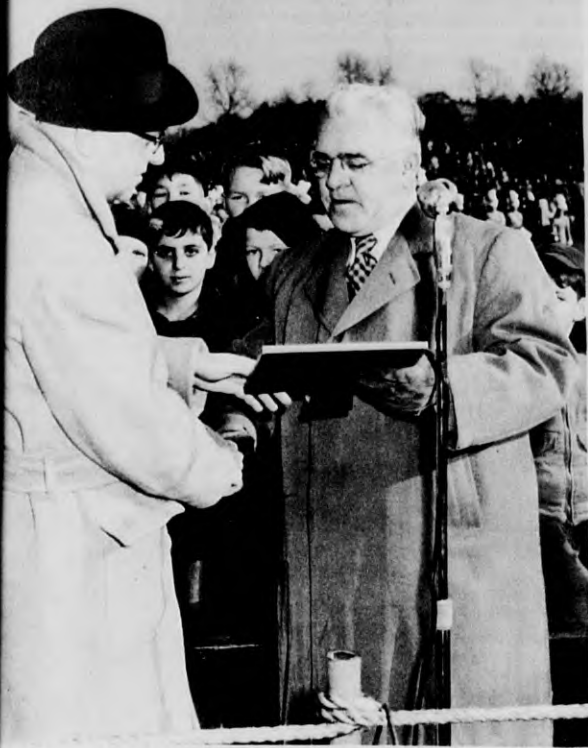

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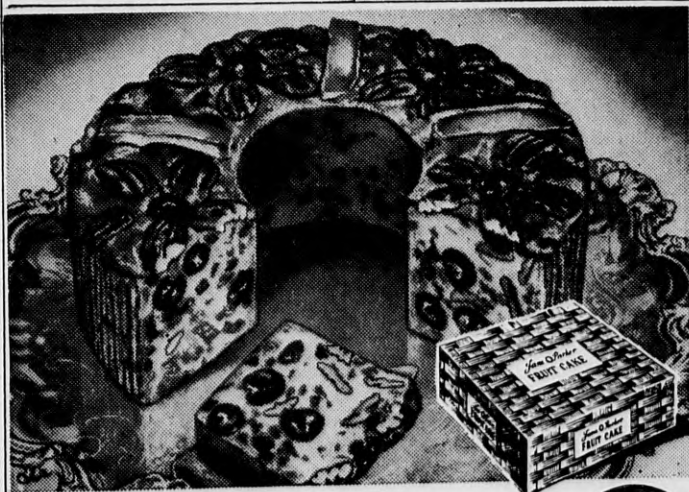

Commuters' Column

Midnight is Pay Day

My seat mate on the 7:58 was chiding me for carrying an umbrella on such a clear, spicy Fall day. I explained I was merely returning a loan, even though it had been kicking around our closet for at least four months. This brought up the subject of general lending and borrowing, but after a few minutes of getting nowhere, my friend pointed out the window and remarked: "Look, we're talking small stuff. How about that Sante Fe box car on the siding? Is that lent to the B and M, borrowed, appropriated, or what?" That was too deep for me, so we called in Jack, the conductor, to set us straight.

Jack grinned knowingly. "A good question," he said, "that car's not borrowed — it's rented. We pay the owner \$1.75 for the use of every car of his that's on our line at midnight, loaded or empty. Of course, if it comes to us after midnight and we can get it off our lines before the next midnight, we don't pay anything. Midnight is pay day, so to speak, and having a definite time like that makes bookkeeping much easier."

"That sounds simple enough," spoke up my friend, "but how do the railroads know just where their cars are every midnight?" "They don't," Jack replied. "All they have to know is what railroad their car is on. You see, every time a freight car is delivered to another railroad, the delivering railroad reports the delivery to the owner, whereupon the owner looks to the receiving road for payment until that line in turn reports delivery to another road. This report is called an interchange report made by the agent at the interchange point to the Accounting Department and settlement is made to the car owner accordingly."

"The way you explain it, that sounds simple enough," I said, "but as a matter of curiosity, how many freight cars are there in the United States?"

Jack laughed. "About 2,000,000. Anyway, there's a lot of bookkeeping in keeping track of all those cars."

"Probably another system you people have worked out," said I.

"It really works, too," the conductor nodded.

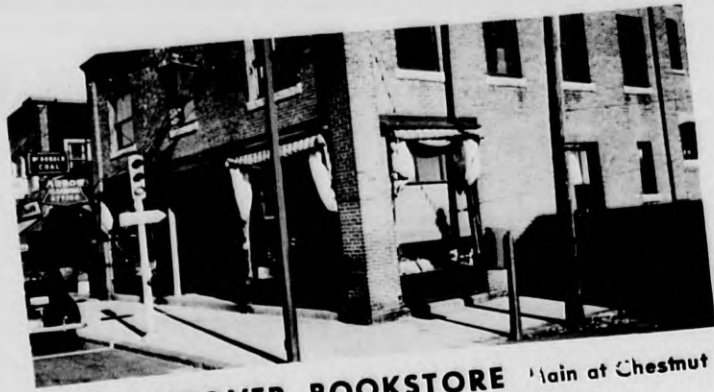

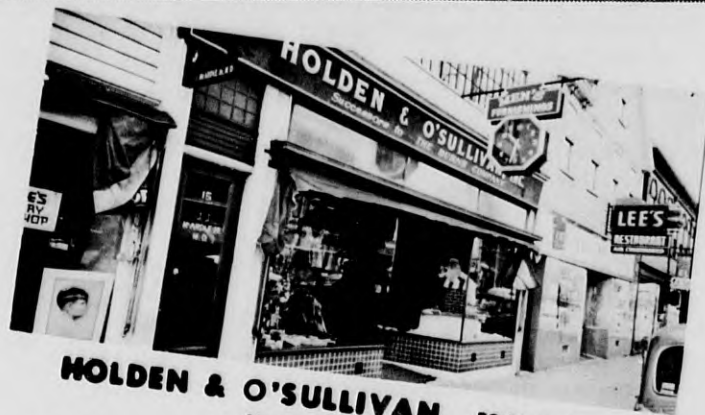

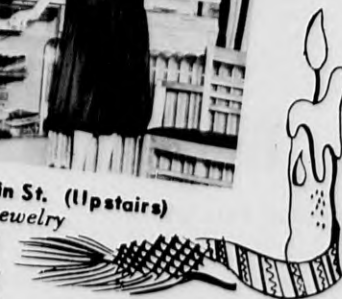

Punchard gave its followers an added thrill a few moments later when it raced to another touchdown in two plays that covered 63 yards. Barous skirted right end for 52 yards to the 11, and then Jim Dolan tossed a pass to Barous for the score. Again Punchard missed the extra point.

This gave Punchard a 12-7 lead and looked like the ball game until the last few moments. Stalled on its own 25, Punchard was forced to kick. Barous booted one into Johnson territory that landed on the 30 where Alexander ran it back to the 38, but a Punchard penalty for unnecessary roughness gave the visitors first down on Punchard's 47. On a pass the home team suffered a penalty for interference and this time Johnson got a first down on the Punchard 29. A running play was stopped and a pass to Knightly brought the ball to the 16. Another running play fizzled but on third down a pass from Doug Alexander to end George Schofield clicked when the receiver, tackled by three Blue and Gold defenders, fell over the goal line for the winning points. Beaudoin added the extra point for the final score, 14-12.

Johnson made 11 first downs, Punchard six; Johnson gained 134 yards rushing and 69 in six complete forwards. Punchard rushed for 148 yards and four forwards were successful for 46 yards. The penalties went heavily against the local lads who lost 70 yards against Johnson's 25.

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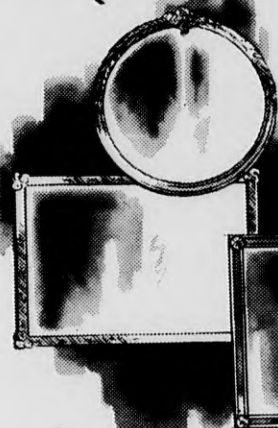
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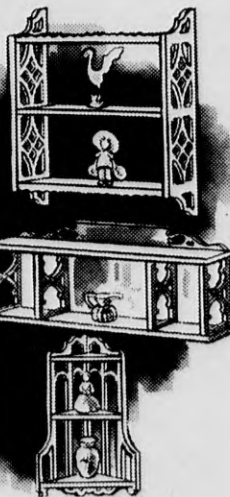

POSTMASTER URGES EARLY MAILING

"Above all," Postmaster Boland said, "please address plainly and completely. Give the full name, house number, street, name of city, zone, and state. And don't forget to write your return address on Christmas card envelopes. Authorities on etiquette say it's perfectly proper, because it helps people bring their address book up-to-date. But a return address is frequently even more helpful to us!"

By way of explanation, the postmaster added, "Most of our grief is caused each year by hastily scribbled addresses that we can't read, or Christmas cards being sent as third class mail which can't be forwarded or returned if the addressee has moved. Loosely wrapped gift packages are other trouble-makers that can be avoided."

"And remember, packages are limited to 70 pounds in weight, and must not exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined."

Special care should be given to writing or printing all names and addresses clearly. Christmas seals may be placed only on the backs of packages. "Do Not Open Until Christmas" stickers may be used.

The postmaster particularly stressed the importance of sending all Christmas cards with three-cent stamps as first class mail.

Actually, you save very little by sending your greetings in unsealed envelopes, because the rate for third class mail has been increased to two cents.

Also, first class mail has these advantages: Your cards may carry written messages; They are dispatched and delivered first; If necessary, they are forwarded to new addresses without additional charge; If undeliverable, they are returned if the sender's address is on the envelope.

Postal regulations, moreover, require minimum postage of three cents on envelopes smaller than 2 3/4 by 4 inches.

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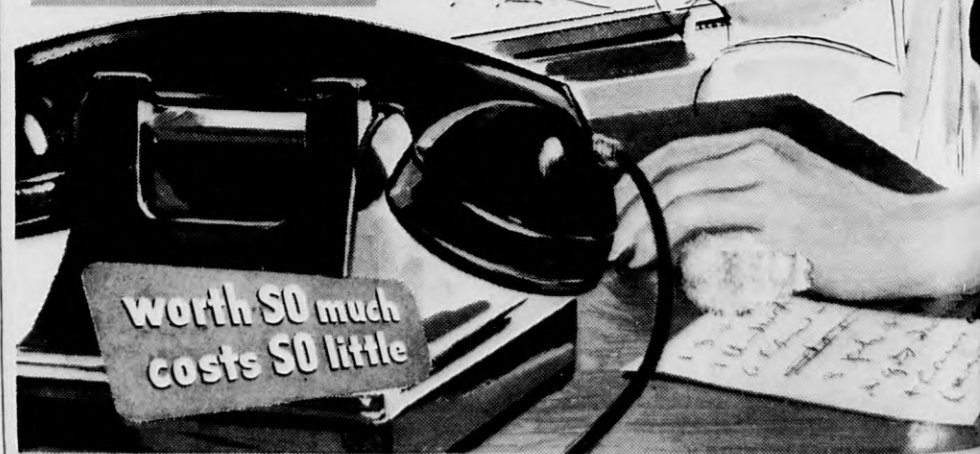
