1952 Auto Rate Jumps \$2 Here

Andover motorists, like almo-all others of the state, will pa-higher rate for their compulse, automobile insurance for 1952, according to the tentative rate schedules announced last week by Insurance Commissioner Dennis E. Sullivan.

The local rate, which is now \$18.50 will be hiked to \$20.50, an e of \$2. Increases as high as \$9 for some communities, have been announced in the schedules, Insurance groups contend that despite the statewide increases the rates are still too low. The base rate of \$15 that applied to rural communities was increased to \$16.50.



(Continued from Page One) "Above all," Postmaster Boland said, "please address plainly and completely, Give the full name, house number, street, name of city, zone, and state. And don't forget to write your return address on Christmas card envelopes. Autho-rities on etiquette say it's per-fectly proper, because it helps people bring their address book up-to-date. But a return address book frequently even more helpful to us!"

frequently even have us!" By way of explanation, the post-master added, "Most of our grief is caused each year by hastily scribbled addresses that we can't read, or Christmas cards being sent as third class mail which can't be forwarded or re-turned if the addressee has moved. turned if the addressee has moved. Loosely wrapped gift packages are other trouble-makers that can be avoided.

"'And remember, packages are limited to 70 pounds in weight, and must not exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined." Special care should be given to

writing or printing all names and addresses clearly. Christmas seals may be placed only on the backs of packages. "Do Not Open Until Christmas" stickers may be used.

The postmaster particularly stressed the importance of sending all Christmas cards with thre e-cent stamps as first class mail. Actually, you save very little by sending your greetings in unsealed ervalues because the rate for

Also, first class mail has these Also, first class main has these advantages: Your cards may car-ry written messages; They are dis-patched and delivered first; If necessary, they are forwarded to new addresses without additional charge; If undeliverable, they are returned if the sender's address is on the envelope.

Postal regulations, moreover, re-quire minimum postage of three cents on envelopes smaller than 2 3/4 by 4 inches.


