Mrs. Katharine A. Baldwin, whose term expires in 1952, announces that she will not stand for reelection. She has served 14 years on the board.

Charles Carleton Kimball, long active in civic affairs of the community, announces that he will be a candidate for the school committee at the election in March.

Mrs. Baldwin Not Seeking Re-election

Mrs. Katharine A. Baldwin of Hidden Field, a member of the school committee for 14 years whose term expires next March, announces that she will not stand for reelection in 1952. She was first elected to the school committee in 1938.

In a statement to The Townsman announcing her intention not to be a candidate for reelection, Mrs. Baldwin said:

"Next March my term of membership on the Andover School committee will expire. I have decided not to stand for reelection. I have enjoyed very greatly my fourteen years of service on the board with all the associations it has brought. I shall retire with a greater sense of the importance of the school committee and its work then ever before.

Dr. P. J. Look Dies After Long Illness

Dr. Percy J. Look, 67, of 115 Main st., died Sunday afternoon at his home after 36 years of medical practice here. He had been ill for more than a year.

Born in New Vineyard, Me., Dec. 7, 1884, he was graduated from Farmington normal school, Boston university and the Harvard Medical school. He interned at the Boston City hospital and subsequently served as resident physician there, coming to Andover in 1915 to establish practice here.

He was a senior member of the Lawrence General hospital staff and until recently was its chief of pediatric service. He had been councilor to the Massachusetts Medical society from the Essex North District Medical society for many years and in 1945-46 was the latter group's president.

Economic Intelligence, a publication of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, points out that our present program of heavy government spending and soaring taxes is threatening the efficient performance and future growth of the American economy.

It is undermining the incentive to work and take risks.

It has reduced the ability and willingness of people to provide venture capital for new undertakings.

It is eliminating opportunity for the individual and for business.

It causes inflation, with consequent loss of confidence in the value of the dollar.

It has led to more and more growth and centralization of government powers.

It has burdened even the low-income groups with a weight of taxation which, up to now, was known only in the days of the greatest despots.

It is a commonplace to justify the ever-increasing tax burden by pointing to the need for a powerful military establishment and for aiding our anticommunist allies. That is a phony alibi. Very heavy cuts in government spending — perhaps as much as \$10,000,000,000 a year — could be made without harming a sound arms or aid-to-Europe program in any way. This is the money which is being wasted on projects which are either totally unnecessary, or which could be indefinitely postponed.

Today it is the "little man" who must bear the main burdens of taxation. He, and he alone, must pay for the bulk of any new tax increases. It remains to be seen whether he will continue to let the government waste his money by the billions — while his take-home pay shrinks and shrinks because of the tax collector.

conservation.
The resolution read:
Whereas, the state commissioner of conservation has announced a public hearing to be held in North Andover at 2 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 13, in connection with a proposal to establish a re-forestation camp in the Harold Parker forest manned by prisoners from state penal institutions; and,

Whereas, the Harold Parker forest contains many recreational facilities such as bathing, camping, picnicking which are patronized by hundreds of women and children of Andover and other communities; and,

Whereas, the Andover board of trade is concerned about the possible detrimental effect of a prison camp so near the town, its schools and private educational institutions;

Be it resolved, that for the best interests of the town we, the Andover board of trade go on record in opposition to the establishment of a prison camp in the Harold Parker forest, and furthermore, instruct the president to appoint a delegation to oppose the plan at the above-mentioned hearing.

The meeting also discussed the problem of securing suitable parking areas in the downtown area. It was announced that the board of selectmen and the board of public works have for some time past been working on the same problem and that three sites were being considered.

It was decided that as the board wished to cooperate with town officials in the solution of this problem, to invite a member of the board of selectmen to a future meeting to discuss the situation with a view of learning how the board of trade could assist in the matter.

Discussing the membership campaign now going on it was reported that 24 firms have already paid their dues for the year.

The board will cooperate with the League of Women Voters in Shawsheen to extend their Christmas lighting to include the Christmas tree in Shawsheen square.

The next meeting of the board will be held Monday, Jan. 14.

Voice Opposition To Prison Camp In Parker Forest

Delegations from Andover several near-by communities registered opposition at a hearing in North Andover last Thursday to a state plan to put prisoner work in the Harold Parker forest. Several persons from Andover representatives for Lawrence, North Andover, North Reading, Middleton and Boxford, as well as county officials and many private citizens were recorded against the idea. No one appeared in favor. Assistant Conservation Commissioner Edward W. Mahan, football luminary at Phillips Academy, conducted the hearing in the absence of Commissioner Arthur T. Lyman, who was unable to be present due to a death in his family. He said that a recent act of the legislature authorized prisoner camps in state forests for the employment of prisoners in reformation, maintenance and development.
