New England Telephone and Telegraph Co. technicians were working around-the-clock, this week, to remedy overloaded wires, which resulted when the Extended Area phone service was placed into effect on Christmas Day in the Lawrence and Andover exchanges.

Company officials anticipated and provided for increased usage up to 300 per cent more than before the changeover was placed into effect, but even this proved to be inadequate. Officials said that the added service demanded after Christmas day was far in excess of 300 per cent.

In the meantime, persons making calls between Andover and Law rence were required to endure delays longer than was pleasing to them and the officials of the company.

A new position on the Andover switchboard was immediately ordered and technicians worked feverishly during the week on its installation. Frank P. Desmond, manager of the Lawrence exchange said that the fault did not lie with the telephone personnel but was caused by the lack of sufficient ee-year term on the local school equipment to handle the increased calls. He requested Andover and Lawrence telephone users to make only necessary calls during this period of emergency and to limit

While the year 1951 was an ventful one in the Andover school department, the school committee looks forward to accomplishment in 1952. In March 1951 the Ando-ver school building committee, with C. Carleton Kimball as chairman, awarded the contract for the building of the two new elementary schools to Walter L. Ritchie as schools to Walter L. Ritchie as the general contractor. In April the work on the buildings got under way to a very good start, and to-day the building at West Center is 82% complete, while the new Cen-tral elementary school is 75% com-plate plete.

Realizing that these two build-ings will be ready for occupancy not later than September 1952, the school committee has been working with the superintendent of schools on plans for the organiza-

tion of the personnel. Our school population continues to grow. In 1945 we had 1300 pu-pils. In the fall of 1952 we expect to open with 1900-an increase of 46%. The increases in enrollment have created a demand for more teachers, more housing. more sup-(Continued on Page Four)

Destruction From Within

Dr. Leo Wolman, professor of economics at Columbia university, recently pointed to England and France as examples of the fact that "it is as easy for a country to weaken or destroy itself from within as from without."

He then said, "Our course since the war is calculated to create and nurture the very evils against which we are supposed to be protecting ourselves. The first of these is large scale financial instability. Our policies are leading straight toward progressive decline in the value of our money, investments and contractual obligations. However much we tax we shall not arrest these trends." Finally, Dr. Wolman observed that if we are to stop statism throughour the world, "the first place to stop it is at home."

By this time, the American people should certainly have awakened to the menace of spendthrift government. It is estimated that one-fourth of the income of a family receiving the modest sum of \$3500 a year goes for taxes, open and hidden, direct and indirect. As income brackets go up, the tax burden skyrockets. And future tax increases must fall mainly on people in the middle and lower income brackets - for the simple reason that this is the only possible source of substantial revenue that is left. It's no longer a case of just soaking the rich. The rich are soaked to the hilt now, and if government took every nickel of their incomes it wouldn't begin to pay the costs.

Fiscal irresponsibility has destroyed thousands of families - and it can destroy nations just as surely.






