The election will be held Monday, March 3.

Simmers Candidate For Planning Board

Richard C. Simmers, attorney and real estate dealer, has announced his candidacy for the planning board and board of survey. Sidney P. White, chairman of the board, whose term expires this year, has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election.

Mr. Simmers was born in Andover, son of the late Henry J. and Mrs. Willimina Simmers. A graduate of Boston university and the B.U. law school, he conducts his law, real estate and insurance business at 358 N. Main st. He is a member of the Massachusetts Bar and the Lawrence Bar associations; St. Matthew's lodge, and the Phi Delta Phi.

Married to the former Joan Hartigan, they have one son, David H., 2½, and live at 169 Summer st.

The year just closed was Andover's banner building year.

Following so closely upon the previous record-breaking year of 1950 it emphasizes the great building boom the town is experiencing while at the same time adding new taxable property to the community.

This growth has been increasing since 1948 and despite rising costs and curtailment of some metals used in home building, is still on the upward trend. Today there are 28 homes here under rough construction, that is between the foundation and being closed in. This is more than at any month during the summer.

According to records of Building Inspector Ralph W. Coleman the permits issued for new dwellings in 1950 topped 1951, the former totalling 130 and the latter 127, but the valuation of new buildings was greater last year. The totals are \$2,982,276 for 1951, and \$2,676,650 for 1950. The sum for last year includes the two new school buildings, while that of 1950 included the Phillips academy gymnasium, both being over a million dollars. As the 27 new homes to be built in Shawsheen have not been started, the estimated cost of these new dwellings will be included in the 1952 totals.

The total number of permits taken for new dwellings since 1941 follow: 1941, 76; 1942, 6; 1943, 1; 1944, 1; 1945, 7; 1946, 54; 1947, 70; 1948, 108; 1949, 80 plus the 56 units in the veterans' housing project; 1950, 130; 1951, 127.

From the above figures it will be seen that since the lean war years the building of new dwellings here has been on the increase.

Schools To Hold Conference Here

A regional conference of headmasters, superintendents and school faculties has been arranged by the school committee to be held here Jan. 23 and invitations have been sent to Phillips academy and the school departments of Greater Lawrence to attend.

The committee at Tuesday night's meeting also voted to join the New England School Development Education council. This organization sponsors conferences of school subjects and school problems and the sessions help solve many common school problems.

Headmaster Harold Howe 2nd., said it was of inestimable value to the schools, especially where

A partial solution of the town's parking problem in the business area will be outlined to the Andover board of trade at its next meeting at 7:45 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 15 in the library.

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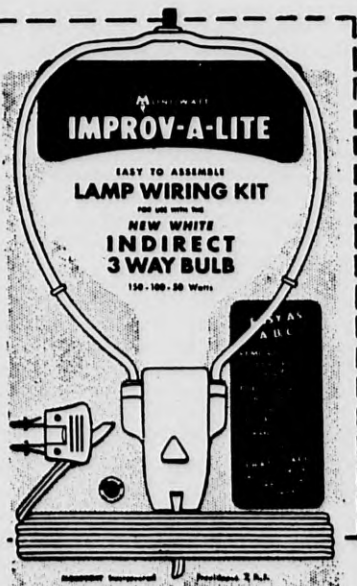
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Church Meeting

**Philip L. Hardy Erected
Flag Pole At Town House**

The late Philip L. Hardy, who died Dec. 31 in Apponaug, R. I., was honored when the flag, which unfurls over the Andover Town hall was flown at half mast.

The honor was the more unusual because Philip Hardy erected that very flag pole 15 years ago.

The honor was bestowed upon the late Mr. Hardy because he had served as a member and chairman of the board of public works.

He was born in Andover Dec. 26, 1890, and lived in this town until 1941 when he left to assume a position in Quonset, R. I. After World War II he established residence in East Greenwich, where he engaged in the contracting business. He was a graduate of Lowell Textile Institute. He was one of five children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. Louis Hardy, who were natives of Andover. His father was a private contractor in Andover and had served as chief of the fire department for 25 years. He started his fire chief's duties at \$50 a year and in 25 years rose to the yearly wage of \$200.

On Aug. 4, 1936, lightning demolished the old flag pole which had towered above the Andover town hall for many years. Shortly afterwards, Philip Hardy was engaged to erect the new flag pole.

It was more than ordinarily fitting that the pole which honored him in death by setting to the breeze the flag which he loved so well was ordained to be the one which he erected.

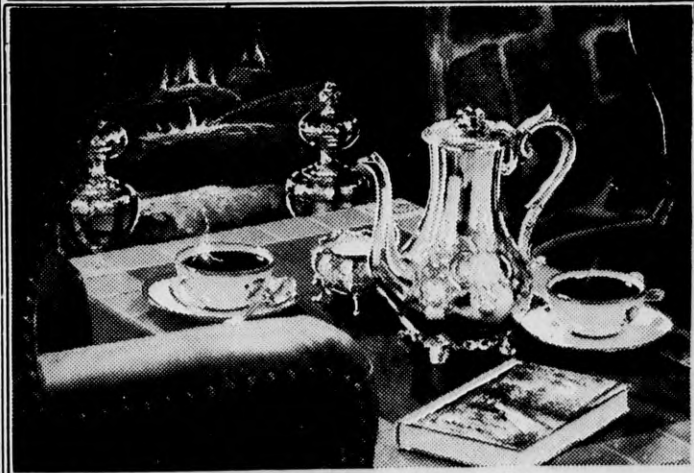

Short stories by well-known and little-known writers. Some are taken from current newspapers and magazines, some are chapters from popular books.

Fees for the rental of school auditoriums, gymnasiums and rooms were increased and a scale established.

Discussing transportation of pupils in Shawsheen, Supt. Kenneth L. Sherman said some are obliged to walk more than a mile four times a day for morning and afternoon sessions, and while the state requires transportation of those walking one and one-half miles or more, some just come under that limit. He also mentioned that the increased building construction in Shawsheen and the prospective number of new pupils may make an addition to the school necessary.

Whether single sessions would relieve the transportation problem

was discussed but no action was taken.
