### New Blood Center For Civil Defense

The state committee of the blood section for civil defense has designated sites for establish-ment of one or more bleeding centers in cities and towns with a population that can furnish sufficient donors to maintain such centers.

Christ church officials have generously offered the facilities of the church for this purpose. The personnel required to operate such a center totals 116 persons, viz; 2 doctors, 6 phlobotomists, 12 clerks, 72 blood agitators, 15 drivers, 3 auxiliary police and 6 custodians.



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### An Ultimatum

It was a blunt and challenging talk that Francis W. White of Andover, president of the American Woolen company gave at Lawrence last week.

Combined with the warning that the country's largest manufacturer of woolen and worsted fabrics may move all of its mills out of this area was the promise that a sincere effort would be made to give New England workers "one last chance to meet Southern competition."

He made frequent reference to the difference that higher wages paid in the North, higher taxes, higher unit costs resulting from a lower work-load, and the new synthetics have made on the New York market where southern competition can sell their products "from 30 to 50 cents a yard cheaper than we can sell them. The work that should be flowing into our plants is going to southern workers for that important reason."

He made it clear he wanted to keep the American Woolen company mills running in New England, but just as clearly said that this could be done only if the company could meet competition. They cannot "unless our meet this competition, he pointed out, workers and the labor organizations which represent them realize they are in a deadly struggle with workers who are willing to work harder."

To reduce the cost of his company's product, Mr. White said greater productivity "on the part of our machinery and the part of our workers will accomplish this vitally important unit cost reduction in our nothern mills....If we want to retain our jobs and our benefits, we must from now on earn them.

He said newer and more modern machines are being introduced and "we are asking our workers and their union representatives to help us make the most effective possible use of these machines and their time so as to increase productivity."

Mr. White said that the "New England know how" intextiles is "the most powerful weapon we have at the moment" and told his audience that "we need help, not opposition, from our workers and their leaders to meet and beat our competition wherever it

The head of the great company closed on a hopeful, yet challenging note, when he said "I will join you in the fight of our lives to keep our mills here. I will be at your side slugging it out as long - but only as long - as you stand beside me in this, our fight for survival as a New England textile employer."

SLEEP . . .

To recover from the fatigue of life's activities, the average healthy adult spends about one-third of his time sleeping. Far from being a waste of time, those ten years asleep will make possible what he does during the twenty years he is awake.

Some people need more sleep than do others. Thomas Edison is said to have managed on four hours of sleep at night. Woodrow Wilson required nine or ten. Loss of sleep for a night or two can be made up, but too little sleep night after night will undermine the health of a rugged person and turn a cheerful individual into a cross, irritable one. Of all the experiments which have been made on sleep, perhaps the most valuable are the ones each individual makes on himself to find out the amount of sleep he needs in order to feel well, to do efficient work, and to keep in good humor the next day.

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#### Social Security Information

Although most farmers who employ regular hired help are now filing quarterly social security tax returns, the social security ad-ministration is again reminding farm operators of their responsibili-

ties under the amended law.

Beginning Jan. 1, 1951, for the first time farm employees were included if they worked for the same employer on a full-time basis for at least 60 days during a calendar quarter and earned \$50 or more. Quarter and earned \$50 or more.

During the first or "qualifying"
quarter no tax deductions are made
but in each succeeding quarter it
is necessary to withhold 1½% of
the worker's wages which is his
contribution toward his old-age
and survivors insurance account. and survivors insurance account. His employer contributes a like amount and forwards the quarterly tax return with his remittance to the collector of internal revenue. This is due within 30 days follow-ing the quarter in which the wages were earned.

submitting these returns promptly and correctly the farm operator will be doing his part to provide for insurance payments to the wage earner at his retirement or to his dependents in the event of the worker's death. Many farm workers who have been employed on a full-time basis during the past summer harvest season completed their qualifying quarter by Sept. 30. For these workers the first tax deduction began on Oct. 1 if they remained in the employ of the same farmer on a full-time

For those workers who have also worked in commerce or industry or

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who may also be operating their own trade or business during part of the year, the social security administration wishes to remind them that all wage credits will be combined and credited to their individual social security account no matter where or when earned.

If you are a farm operator and have not contacted the collector of internal revenue to obtain your federal tax identification number, or if you as a farm worker have no social security card, be sure to write, phone or visit your nearest social security field office. The office serving this area is located at 202 Broadway in Lawrence.
